But the fort which we have born in the profe-cution of this War, entituling us to some Distip-aion in the Terms of Peace, I have insisted and on-tained, that the Assention or Contract for furnishing the Spanish West-Indies with Negroes, shall be made with is for the Term of Thirty Years, in the same manner as it has been enjoyed by the French for

Ten Tears past.

I have not taken upon me to determine the Interests of our Confederates, these must be adjusted in the Congress at Utrecht, where my best Endea-vours shall be employ'd, as they have hitherto conflantly been, to procure to every one of them all just and reasonable Satisfaction: In the mean time I think it proper to acquaint You, that France offers to make the Rhine the Barrier of the Empire, to yield Brisack, the Fort of Kehl and Landau, and to race all the Fortresses both on the other side of the Rhine and in that River.

As to the Protestant Interest in Germany, there will be on the part of France, no Objection to the re-settling thereof, on the Foot of the Treaty of

Westphalia.

The Spanish Low-Countries may go to his Imperial Majesty; the Kingdoms of Naples and Sardinia, the Dutchy of Milan, and the Places belong-ing to Spain on the Coast of Tuscany, may likewife be yielded by the Treaty of Peace to the Emperor.
