*Petersburg, June 18. N. S.* The Tenth of this Month being the Czar's Birth-day, when he enter'd on the Forty second Year of his Age, his Majesty received the Compliments of the Nobility, and gave them an Entertainment in the Evening in his Garden at the end of the Town: On the Eleventh a Courier arrived here from Constantinople, with Letters dated the Sixth of May, bringing an Account that the Turks resolved to observe the Treaty they had lately confirmed; and were preparing to send the King of Sweden Home through Poland, with a Convoy as soon as the Conditions for securing his Passage could be adjusted.

*Lisbon, June 24. N. S.* Two thousand of the Enemy attempted, on the Seventeenth Instant, to take Arrouches by Escallade, but the Garrison, consisting only of Three hundred Men, took away their Ladders, and repulsed them with the Loss of Forty Men.

*Venice, June 24. N. S.* They write from Rome, that the Pope was still at Castle Gondolpho, and intended to visit the Port of Nettuno. The Differences about the Ceremonial between the Ambassadors and the Governor of Rome, are fully settled to the Satisfaction of the former, who will now soon appear in Publick. The Venetian Gally commanded by Signior John Querini, was lost near St. Vito by Ortona on the 13th Instant, and two Galleots of this Republick perished likewise by the same Storm, but the Men were saved.

*Milan, June 25. N. S.* On the Twenty-first Instant, Marechal Taun arrived here from Vienna, and the next Day set out for Turin, to confer with his Royal Highness, but is expected back in a few Days to dispatch some Affairs before he takes the Field. The Duke of Savoy has put strong Garrisons into Alexandria, Valencia, and other Places of the Milanese, yielded to him by his Treaty with the Emperor.

*Hanover, July 1. N. S.* The Ministers of this Court have had a Conference with those of the Duke of Wolfenbuttel at Borgdof some Miles from hence, upon the present conjuncture of the Affairs of the Circle of Lower Saxony, concerning the intended Expedition of the King of Denmark against the Dutchy of Bremen. Baron Grote, the Elector's Minister, went by his Highness's Order to see the King at Colding and dissuade him from that Design, but his Majesty was gone to Holstein before Monsieur Grote arrived: However it is not doubted but this Minister will continue his Journey, to acquit himself of his Commission. Letters from Warsaw bring an account, that since the Palatin of Kiovia entered Poland, he has considerably augmented his Troops; and that the Staroste Grudmsky was advanced at the Head of Twelve thousand Men to the River Wasta near Posen, threatening to destroy all those who should refuse to acknowledge King Stanislaus, which caus'd great Consternation in those Parts, the rather because the Army of the Crown continu'd unactive, as if they were in doubt what Part to take. These unexpected Events have obliged the Czar to change the Design he had formed against Pomerania, and the Troops which he had appointed for that Service, are now to remain in Poland, to represent the Favourers of Stanislaus, who are encouraged to discover their Inclinations to the Interests of that Prince, by the Assurances they have of the King of Sweden's speedy return to his own Dominions, and the powerful Succours he will then send to their assistance.

*Extract of a Letter from Capt. Blinnton, Commandet of Her Majesty's Ship Lynn, dated on Board her, at Gibraltar-Bay the 12th of June, 1712.*

On the 14th of April I was, with Vice-Admiral Baker's Orders, to sail with Her Majesty's Ship Lynn, joined by Capt. Feild of the Ludlow-Castle, to see the Trade into O-Porto and Viana; in performing which Service, I took a small Ship laden with Canary and Snuff; the Weather was such as sprung the Lualow's Mizon-Mast, and split most of her Sails, which obliged me to put into Lisbon to Refit, where I made little stay, but proceeded with the two Ships to Gibraltar, where I join'd the Royal Anne Galley and Port Mahon with four Ships. I on the 10th Instant got sight of seven Sail of Ships, five Gavilans and two Cettes, off Estonopa; the Royal Anne Galley I sent to stretch to Westward, to prevent any getting out of the Straights: Four she forced into Suta Road under their Cannon, and the others weather'd him and got away. The Port-Mahon I sent to Eastward, and with the Lynn and Ludlow-Castle I stood to the Northward, and forc'd into Estonopa Road three Martineco Ships, a Cettee and Gavilan, and a Spanish Man of War, carrying Thirty six Guns, Two hundred and fifty Seamen, and One hundred Soldiers, designed for Cadiz. The Ludlow-Castle weather'd the Man of War, who, to avoid her Boarding him, cut his Cable and run ashore: all which Ships I in the Morning Summon'd the Governor to deliver me up, which I readily believed would have been done, had not Colonel Forbes (who commanded the Man of War) vigorously opposed it; but after eight Hours Cannonading them with our other four Ships, the Man of War and the Cettee her Prize, and one Martineco Man, they set on Fire, another we sunk, who with the swift of the Sea turn'd bottom up: In the Morning I again summoned the Governor to deliver me the Ships and Gavalan left undestroy'd in the Road: Having found it not practicable to burn or bring away the same in the Night, the Shore being lined with Horse and Foot to prevent the same; by the return of my Summons, I found the Ships to be sunk, and turned bottom up: The Gavalan laden with Rusk and Tiles, they fired, whole Cable burning, she drove ashore, and bulged on the Beach. Our Damages were little: The Port Mahon lost one Man; three wounded slightly in the Royal Anne Gally, and some small Damage, received in our Rigging.
