We have nothing more but to pray to Heaven, that after fo burthenfome and bloody a War, your Majefty's long Life may fecure the Bleffings of Peace and Plenty to all your Dominions, and that your Majesty after all your Care, may enjoy an easy and long Reign over a loyal, obedient and united People.

Berlin, Aug. 27. N.S. The Elector of Hanover's Minister Highnels hath taken to prevent the Plague from fpreading into his Dominions, and hath also defir'd that the fame Care may be taken on this fide. Major Gen. Army by his Preferce. Hambourg, Aug. 30. N. S. The Trenches before Staden were opened the 20th at Night, and the Batternes began to play on the 27th. The King of Prufia and the Duke of Wolfembuttle in quality of Directors of the Lower Saxony, had put a fmall Number of Troops into Staden in the Name of the Circle, of which it is a Member, in hopes the King of Denmark would not commit any Hoftilities againft a place where they had a Garrifon, but the Danes facwing no regard to their Protection, and the Troops being too few to make any confiderable Refiftance, withdrew at the approach of the Army. They are fince arrived in the Neigh-bourhood of this City, but are not permitted to come in till their Quarentine is performed. Lieut. Gen. Denitz has been fent by his Danifh Majefly to the Cour of Hanover, to en-deavour to perfuade the Elector to quit the Pofts of Otterf-berg and Verden which they had poffelfed themfelvesof, in order to fecure the Country from the Danger of the Con-tagion, but his Electoral Highners feems refolved not to part tagion, but his Electoral Highness feems resolved not to part with them, fince the Plague is already within three Mile of those places.
