To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of several of the Justices of the Peace, Clergy, and other Gentlemen of the County of *Huntingdon*, on the 11th of *August*, 1712.

Most Gracious Sovereign!

WE Your Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects beg leave to offer our most grateful Acknowledgments for Your Majesty's Royal Favour and Condescension, in communicating to Your Parliament the happy Progress of Your Majesty's vigorous Endeavours, for procuring a General Peace upon Terms so very Honourable to *Great Britain*, and so Reasonable with respect to all Your Allies, and particularly for obtaining the Possession of that most important Fortress of *Dunkirk*; and likewise for the peculiar Care Your Majesty has taken in securing to us a Protestant Succession. And as we are sufficiently satisfied with the wonderful Proceedings of Your Majesty's present Council, so we are confident that nothing on Your Majesty's part will be wanting for bringing this necessary and important Affair to a speedy Conclusion. And we beg leave to assure Your Majesty, that notwithstanding we are part of that County which gave Birth to that Grand Traytor and Usurper *Oliver Cromwell*, we are not all abandoned to those Rebellious Principles, or such other as have of late been too Indastriously and impudently advanced. We take this Opportunity to repeat our Assurances to Your Majesty, of that Fidelity and Obedience which all Dutiful and Loyal Subjects owe to so Good and Gracious a Prince; and shall ever pray that Your Majesty may long enjoy the Fruits of these prosperous Labours in this Life, attended with a constant Series of Glory, until that Glory be Consummated in a better.

The following Address from the Town and Port of *New Romney*, was presented to Her Majesty by *Robert Fensie*, Esq; one of their Representatives in Parliament.

To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Mayor, Jurats, and Commonalty of the Town and Port of *New Romney*.

WE Your Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, humbly presume to approach Your most Sacred Person with our most unfeigned Thanks for Your great Condescension, in communicating to Your Parliament the Terms on which a General Peace may be had; as also to express our Gratitude for Your Majesty's great Care and Concern for the Protestant Succession, as by Law Establish'd, in the most illustrious House of *Hanover*.

That Almighty God may bless Your Majesty with Success in this great Work, to the Happiness and Security of Your Kingdoms, and grant You long to Reign over us, to enjoy the Fruits of Peace, are the most fervent Prayers of us Your Majesty's most Loyal and Obedient Subjects.

Genoa, August 18. N. S. We have received Advice from *Barcelona*, that *Marshal Staremberg* had taken the Field on the 28th of July, and that he had detached a Body of Troops to *Cervera*, which had made themselves Masters of that Place, the Enemies Garrison retiring upon the approach of the Germans.

Milan, August 23. N. S. Letters from *Syitzerland* confirm the Accounts we had before, that a Treaty of Peace was concluded between the five Roman Catholick Cantons on the one part, and those of *Zurich* and *Bern* on the other. The Terms are very Advantageous to these two latter, since the whole Country of *Baden*, together with the City of *Rapperschwyl*, on the Lake of *Zurich*, and

several other Places are to be yielded to them in Perpetuity.

Venice, August 26. N. S. The great Council is employ'd in chusing new Magistrates as is usual every Year before the great Vacation. They write from *Rome*, that upon the Emperor's recommendation, the Pope has disposed of the Archbishoprick of *Milan* to *Monfignor Odescalchi*, Nuntio in *Poland*, and has also granted him a Dispensation, without which he had not been qualify'd for this Preferment, because he is not Forty Years old. There hath been for some time a great Mortality among the Cattle in the Pope's Territory, the Kingdom of *Naples*, and several parts of *Lombardy*.

Hamburg, Sept. 9. N. S. On the 6th Instant the Garrison of *Staden* surrendered at Discretion. *Monfieur Stakelberg*, the Commandant of the Place, made his escape from thence the Day before, for fear of being delivered up to the Czar, to whom he had paid Homage as a Subject of *Liesland*. The King of *Denmark* has appointed Major-General *Van Enden*, to be Commandant of the Town, General *Scholten* Governour General, and *Monfieur Wasmar*, Chancellor of the Dutchy of *Bremen*. The Emperor has renewed a Commission which was in force two Years ago, for adjusting the Affairs of *Mecklenburg*, and accommodating some Differences which have arose between the Duke of *Swerin* and his Nobility. The Commissioners are to be Ministers from the Emperor, *Sweden* and *Wolfenbuttel*. The Plague is spread to *Weedel*, a Village belonging to the King of *Denmark*, two Miles distant from hence. Upon Notice of this, *Baron Grote*, the Elector of *Hanover's* Minister, has declared to the Magistrates of this City, that if they do not immediately shut up the two Gates, which lead to those parts of the Danish Dominions which are Infected, his Electoral Highness will forbid all Communication between his Country and *Hambourg*. But the Magistrates have not hitherto come to any Resolution upon this Matter.

Utrecht, September 13. N. S. On Friday the 9th an Expres from *Nimeguen* brought an Account here, that a Party of French had made an incurfion within a few Leagues of that Place, whereupon the Regiment of *Nassau Woudenbourg*, which was in Garrison here, march'd the next Morning with all Diligence to prevent any Disorders which might happen on that Occasion. The same Day the Earl of *Stafford* went to the *Hague*, from whence he is expected back very soon, together with several other Ministers of the Allies, who are likewise gone there during the present interval of Business.

Whitehall, Sept. 5. Whereas it has been maliciously inserted in the *Amsterdam Gazette* of the 13th Instant, N. S. in the Article from *London*, That several Subaltern Officers belonging to Her Majesty's Regiments lately Disbanded, begin to rob upon the Highways; it is thought proper to do Justice to all the Gentlemen who have served in those Corps, by publishing to the World, that upon the strictest Enquiry it does not appear that any of them have given the least Occasion for this great Scandal so injuriously cast upon them.
