Warsaw, Dec. 26. N. S. King Augustus is expected in this City within two or three Days, in order to be present at the opening of the general Diet. Several of the Senators and Deputies of the Palatinates have been here for some time, and they continue to arrive daily in great Numbers. A Royal Mandate hath been lately published, and fixed on the usual Places of the Town, as also on the Palace of King Stanislaus, citing that Prince, the Palatine of Kiowia, and above fifty others of the same Party, to appear before the Assembly of the States, within six Weeks, upon Pain of being declared Enemies of the Kingdom, and forfeiting their Estates and Goods. General Ribinski hath caused a Manifesto to be printed, in which he sets forth the Reasons of his entering into the Territories of Dantzick, and raising the Money he pretends to have been due to his Army for some Years, by military Execution. The Magistrates of that City have answered him by another Manifesto, containing the antient Rights and Priviledges of their Town. They write from Caminiec, that a Party of the Palatin of Kiowia's Troops had taken three hundred of our Men Prisoners, and had seiz'd two Couriers sent by our Ambassador at the Ottoman Court to this Place, so that we are without any certain Account of him, but some Advices from Valachia say, he is stop'd at Adrianople by Order of the Port. Letters from Bender of the 20th past, inform us, That the Seraskier Bacha hath had an Audience of the King of Sweden, in which he acquainted him that the Grand Signior had declared War against the Muscovites, and had commanded him to assure his Majesty, that the Port would espouse his Interests with Vigour, and take effectual Measures to bring him home in safety to his own Dominions.

Vienna, January 4. N. S. On Sunday last the Foreign Ministers, Nobility, and other Persons of Distinction were at Court, where they made their Imperial Majesties the usual Compliments upon the New Year. The Emperor finding it impracticable to raise the Taxes higher, hath required a Loan from each of the Provinces in his Dominions, and the States are to engage themselves for the repayment of it with Interest. Those of Austria have already consented, and it is thought the rest will do so likewise. Baron Zumjungen, General of the Artillery, having received his Dispatches from this Court, is gone Post to Milan. His Imperial Majesty hath sent Orders to his Minister at Constantinople, to continue there as long as his Character is respected, but to come away as soon as the least Violation is offer'd to it. We have been alarm'd with a report of the Plague's breaking out in one of the Suburbs of this City call'd the Rossau, but upon Examination it proves to have been without any Grounds, and the Physicians, who were sent to Bruck and Presburg, the two most suspected Places, assure us, that they are at this time more

healthy than they have been for many Years; however the Passages to those Parts of Hungary are still kept shut, which hath raised the Price of Corn here to an excessive Rate.

Dresden, January 8. N. S. A Detachment of Prussian Troops pass'd by this Place a few Days ago, in their way from Italy to the Dutchy of Magdebourg, and we are assured they will be follow'd very soon by the remainder of those Forces. Count Vitthum, Great Chamberlain of this Court, is gone from hence to the King at Warsaw, where we are inform'd his Majesty arriv'd on the Twenty ninth past, and was Complimented by the Bishops and Secular Senators who were in the Town. On the One and thirtieth the Diet met, and adjourn'd to the Week following, because some of the Deputies were stop't on the Road by the Frost, which hinder'd them from passing the Vistula. Count Flemming is still at Berlin, and it is said he is to go from thence to Poland, to give the King an Account of the Success of his Negotiations.

London, January 19. On Friday last John Lord Vaughn of Emlyn in the Kingdom of Great Britain, and Earl of Carbery in the Kingdom of Ireland, died of an Apoplexy at his House in Chelsea. He marry'd the Daughter of George late Marquis of Halifax, by whom he hath left issue only one Daughter, the Lady Anne, so that his Honours are extinct.
