Berlin, January 14. N. S. His Majesty hath been pleased to appoint Monsieur Kameke, Great Master of the Wardrobe, to be Great Master of the Houshold. This is a new created Employment, which entitles the Person that enjoys it to have precedence of all the Officers of the Crown. Some time ago the King ordered Ten Men out of each Troop in all his Regiments of Horie to be ient hither, and on the Ninth they were affembled at Spandau, and disbanded there, to the number of Six hundred. On Wednesday last Monsieur Marshall set out for Utrecht. His Majesty hath named him to be his Ambassador to the Court of France as foon as the Peace is concluded; and at the fame time he is to have the Title of Privy Councellor of State, being at present only Privy-Councellor of War. Monfieur Bruce, General of the Muscovite Forces, who had been kept here for some time by an Indisposition, is gone to join the Army.

Hanover, January 17. N. S. Advices from Hol-stein bring an Account, that after the burning of Altena, the Swedes withdrew to Pinnenberg, and from thence to Gluckstad, and having drawn out the Troops which were in Garrison in these two Places, they went on to Itzehoe. These Leisers add, that the Czar was returned from Hamburgh to his Army in Holstein, which was marching in conjunction with the Danes and Sexons to attack the Swedes, but it is thought the latter will retire under the Cannon of Toningen, upon the approach of their Enemies, whose Forces are said to amount to Fifty five thousand Men. The Confederate Generals have made great Complaints to Count Stein+ bock of the burning of Altena, representing to him that they did not act after that manner in Pomerania, and desiring to be informed what Redsons in duced him to it, that they may take their Measures accordingly: He answered at first, that it was done by way of Reprizal for the Danes having burnt the City of Studen, but as that happened during the Siege, he said afterwards it was because he could not carry off such large Magazines as were in the Place, and that for the suture he would not destroy any Town, if he was not forc'd to it by the like Practiles of his Enemies.
