hazard both by a fruitless desence, where they had no hopes of any succor or relief: the Garison upon composition marched out with their Arms and Baggage, and was conducted to Biche, leaving the whole Countrey of Lorrain in the possession of the French. The Duke of Lorrain has been lately at Hambourg, where he left such Orders as he thought necessary, and went thence the 4th instant with 30 Horse only for Baden, with intention to pass from thence for Vienna in person, to represent his condition to the Emperor, and to press him to his assistance.

His Excellency the Count de Monterey having considered the great oppression under which the people of the plain Countrey have laboured by the Quartering of the Army upon them, is endeavouring to perswade the Cities to contribute towards the maintenance of the soldiery, that so they may for the future be drawn and Quartered in the great

Towns.

.His Excellency has ordered the making of 1500 Red Cloaks lined with Blew, with the Burgundy Cross upon them, which tis believed are deligned for a Guard which is to be made up out of the Reformed Officers.

Paris, Ottob. 8. On Munday the 6th instant his Majesty with the Court went away from St Germains towards Chambourg, to continue there about Three weeks, and at his return to settle here in Paris for this

winter.

Of Seven French Officers who were taken at the furrender of Epinal, Four of them were presently hanged upon the place, and the Three others before Chastel, which place was surrendred before any of our Canon were fired against it, but the Governour the Sieur de Beaufort is since dead of the Gout.

Fifteen hundred of the Countrey people of Lorrain who refused to work in the Trenches were by a Council of war, in which the Mareshal de Crequy presided, ordered to be sent away to Metz, and were condemned to the Gallies, but the King has been

fince pleased to pardon them.

Paris, Otheb. 11. The 4th instant the Sieur Gabel, Envoye Extraordinary from the King of Denmark, was admitted to his last Audience from their Majesties at St Germains, with the usual Ceremonies, and afterwards took his formal leave also of Monsieur.

The 6th instant their Majesties lay at Chastres, the 7th at Toury, the 8th at Cleri, and were the next day expected at Chambourg; the Dauphin continues at St Germains well recovered from his Ague, with Madam, and Monsieur the Duke of Anjou.

The 5th instant returned hither the Princes Palatine from her journey into Germany, and has been complimented upon that subject by most of the prin-

cipal persons of the Court.

The Articles granted to the Garrison of Chaftel in Lorrain upon its surrender. 1. That the Sieur Mo Beaufirs the Governor with all the Officers and Soldiers of the Garrison, should march away with their Families, Baggage, led Horses, Equipage, and ordinary Arms, the Trumpets sounding, Drums beating; Colours slying, Bullet in mouth, and Match lighted at both ends, other people who were in Arms only upon that occasion, to pass quietly without Arms to their several homes; the Garrison to have Twelve Waggons allowed them for the carriage of their Baggage; That Four days was to be allowed them before their surrender, to expect succor, and free passage given to Two persons whom they should send to the Duke of Lorrain within that space of time; That upon their surrender the Garrison should be safely conducted to Biche, and surriss the safely conducted to Biche and surriss the safely con

afly of the Garrison to retire to their homes, and there to live quietly, without Passport. That the Towns-people, their Families and Goods should not be injured, or their priviledges infringed. That their Canoneers, Miners, &c. may be admitted to the same Articles as the Souldiers. That no Hostilities pass during the four days, and that no Officers or Souldiers should be searched for what they should carry out with them; The Souldiers which marched out were about 600, and the other persons which went away without Arms 300.

We have now news also of the Surrender of Longuny and Biche to the Marshal de Crequy.

The Two Lyons put on shoar and burnt by the Resolution, and Milford, Ge. together with his Prize.

The Guilt Fish of 24. Guns cast away about the same time below Tetuan.

The Dolphin of 14 Guns cast away at Sallese Mustava Rais of 16. Guns cast away upon Capt Palos, being embayed to avoyd the English Floot the last day of December.

The Half Moon of 40. Guns burnt by accident at Algiers.

The Rose of six Guns and six Pederoes, taken by the English.

The Spread Eagle of four Guns and four Pederoes taken by the English.

Two Sayties of four Guns apiece, and one of 12, the other of eight Pedereroes, taken by the Granoueses or Spaniards.

Two Brigantines taken by those of Ivica.

The Duan's Brigantine of one Gun and four Pederoes taken by the English.

Two Brigantines more taken, one by those of Ceuta, the other by the Genoueses.

From all which may be gathered, that the last year hath not been very fortunate to Algiers, and that their Force by sea hath been much weakned.
