Berlin, March 11. N. S. The King of Prussia, with the Margrave Albert, went yesterday Morning to Schonhausen, a Royal Palace near this Place, to see the Czarewitsch who arrived there the Evening before: It is not yet known how long he intends to stay. His Majesty hath reduced the Horse-Guards from four Troops to two, each of which is to consist of Seventy five Men. One of them is to be commanded by Lieutenant General Tettau, and the other by Major General Grote. He hath likewise lessen'd the Salaries of most of the Officers of the Household, and made a great reduction in the Stables, and in every other Branch of Expence. It is believed the Swiss-Guards will be dismiss'd, after they have attended at the Ceremony of the late King's Funeral, which is appointed to be on the first of May, and in the mean time his Body is deposited in the Chappel of the Castle. Major General Gromkau and Monsieur Creutz have been declared Counsellors of State, and are to have the direction of the Military Affairs. Count Truchses, Chamberlain to the late King, is appointed to carry back the Order of the Garter, which his Master was possess'd of, to the Queen.

Paris, March 15. N. S. This Morning, at Eight of the Clock, the Parliament of Paris assembled at the Palace. The Duke of Bourbon, Prince of Conti, Duke of Maine, and Count de Toulouse, Princes of the Blood, with about twenty Dukes and Peers of France, were then present. The Temporal Peers were in rich Cloaks, and the Bishops in their Habits. There were also Seven Presidents at Mortier, and a great number of the King's Advocates and Counsellors in their Robes. About an Hour after the Dukes of Berry and Orleans came likewise in rich Cloaks, and being seated, they all put on their Hats. Monsieur de Mesmes, first President, made a Compliment to the Duke of Berry in the Name of the Assembly upon his entering the Parliament for the first time. Then one of the Advocates General made a Speech upon the Occasion of their Meeting, and delivered to the Attorney General the King's Letters Patents about the Renunciations, and they were read by one of the Counsellors, after which
