Falmouth, Octob. 5.

Esterday put to sea the Town of Hlushing, a Dutch ship which came lately from Holland, bound for St Hubes to lade Salt, tellingus, that about 50 more vel-fels are fitting up, designed for the same place and the same account.

The Prince William of Middlebourg having sprung a Leak, put in here to mend, and is failed with a

fair wind for Burdeaux.

Legern, Sept. 29. This morning arrived here the Dutch Convoy, with the Morning-Star and Lyon, Two English ships, all of them from Smirna: here is also arrived the Italian Merchant from England,

and the Lawfon from Cyprus.

A Barkarriving here in 30 days from Napoli di Romania, and in 14 from Maltha informs us, that the Turks had raifed lately two Forts, one at the Port Caloquilia, and the other at Port Cerif, and placed in them Garisons of 4000 men for the better securing of the peace of that Country, which was lately mutinous and revolting; but in Quaglia, Vitolo and Ceri the people are still in rebellion.

The Captain Bassa is with 40 Gallies gone back again to Candia, and has sent to Napoli di Romania for a confiderable fum of Money for the payment of

the forces in Candia.

Ratisbonne, Octob. 2. The States of the Three Colledges are much concerned at the late invasion of Lorrain, they have some time since granted the Emperor the extraordinary Contribution, called the Roman Months, and that upon confideration of his great expenses upon the late rebellion in Hungary; but withall, ordering, that out of the first Moneys which shall be raised upon this account, the Duke of Lorrain shall receive the sum which was promised to him upon the restitution of Hombourg and its dependencies: they are now fallen with much vigor upon the Treaty for the raising forces for the safety of

the Empire, which they hope in little time to finish.

Dantzick, Offeb. 4. From Warfaw we are told,
that the Lower Honse has lately pressed hard and infifted on it, that General Sobietsky should lay down his Office of Grand Marshal of Poland, alledging that one person ought not to enjoy two charges of so great importance; whereupon the Army (having been lately particularly obliged by him, for several sums of Moneys, for the supply of their necessities) have entred into a confederation, and sent several of their Deputies to the Diet, declaring that they are ready to maintain him in both his Charges, against all the opposition of his enemies.

The Militias of some of the Counties in Poland are pailed, tis yet incertain with what intention, but tis believed if this Diet, like several of the preceding ones, should not conclude peaceably according to expectation, they will endeavor by some o-

ther methods to fettle the kingdom.

The Commons still infist upon the bringing the Grand Treasurer Morstein to a Trial; yet the King has shown himself sarisfy'd with what has been acted by him, and has so far admitted him to his favour as to depute him amongst other persons to fetch the

Regalia from *Cracow* in order to the Queens Coreznation on the 18th inftant.

The Archbishop of Gnesne, though he has had his Audiences and a favourable reception at the Court, stands still upon his defence, and affirmed openly to several of the Senators, that he was ready to prove the truth of what he had written concerning the King, as that he had sworn to the Pasta Con-venta with a mental Reservation.

The Nobless seem wholly obedient to his Majeand to have no other thoughts but what do tend to the good and peace of the kingdom; and the Prince Lubomirshy, their Marshal or Speaker, takes care to prevent all disturbances and disagreements, and that nothing may pass but what aims at the publick interest. that he may merit the glory of being instrumental in bringing this Assembly to a happy conclusion.

The 30th past arrived here Jean Stanislaus of Sbonzin Sbonsky, with the Character of a Commissioner from the King of Poland, and sent out his Citations against the Heers de Veer Simisson, Beuninghen, and Winbold, Dutch Merchants in this City, intending to proceed against them upon the account of Religion, they being suspected Anabaptists, but that the Magistrates have hitherto protected them upon account of their priviledges in fa-

vour of Trade and Commerce.

Venice, Off.4. Our last Letters from Constantine-ple give us but little news, onely that a severe Proclamation was there issued out, forbidding the Turks the use of Wine or Aquavita, upon pain of death; and this procured by the Visier, who upon consideration of the present state of affairs, attributes, with much reason, most of the mischiefs which are daily practised, to their present debauchery.

The Visier is taking care for the Recruits of his Army, which is much lessened by the Infection.

Proveditor Bernardo has sent home all his Turkish prisoners, and expects suddenly the exchange of the Venetians.

The Captain Bassa has landed many people at Candia, where the Plague is not yet ceased. That City is now in great measure rebuilt, with a Pallace, feveral Mosques, and Fountains; and they are now

busie in raising the Walls of the Town.

Vienna, Octob. 5. On Sunday last arrived hero the Staroste Razanki, Envoye Extraordinary from his Majesty of Poland, and the next day had his Audience from their Imperial Majestics, whom he acquainted that the Queen of Poland was to be solemnly Crowned at Warfam on the 19th of this month; whereupon the Emperor immediately difpatched his Orders and Commission to the Count de Schafgots in Silesia, impowring him to go to Warsam, and in his name to assist at the said Coronation; the said Envoye farther informed, that the States of Poland were so well pleased and satisfy'd with the Kings Alliance by his matriage, that they were resolved to settle 25000 Liures a year more upon the Queen, then was ever formerly allowed to any of their Queens her Predecessors, and had assigned her Joynture upon several parts of the Revenues belonging to the Crown.
