The first not succeeding according to Your Majesty's just Desires, we most heartily Congratulate the Success of the last beyond all Expectation. The Peace given by Your Majesty in a manner to all Europe, shews Your Influence when You are pleased to exert it: And we depend upon it to continue in the most advantageous manner to Your Subjects, since those who

might become Your Enemies by past Experience may know, with what Zeal we shall always be ready to support Your Majesty, when any just Occasion offers, with our Lives or Fortunes.

We most heartily pray for Your Majesty's Life, which secures our present Peace and Happiness; and as we acknowledge Your Majesty's present Conduct with most grateful Hearts, so those that follow us will bless Your prudent Care for our Posterity, to whom Your Wisdom will have secured the Protestant Succession in the illustrious House of Hanover.
