Madrid, Sept. 28. The Baron de Batteville, our Ambassador in the Court of Portugal being lately dead at Lisbonne, the Marquis de Liche is to be suddenly dispatched thither with the same Character; and Don Manuel de Lyra, Master of the Ceremonies to the Queen Regent, is to be employed as Envoye to the States-General of the United Provinces.

Since the Cardinal d'Arragon has been made Colonel of the Regiment of Guards, he has taken care to see them constantly paid out of the 18000 Ducats a month which is allowed for this service; upon which account the soldiers of the said Regiment are kept in so strict an Order and Discipline, that no complaints have been brought in against them, especially since Two of them were ordered to be shot to death for attempting only to abuse a Citizen.

The Count de Montreney, Governor of the Netherlands is established in that Government by the Queen Regent for Three years, and tis said that Alexander Prince of Parma is to be made Viceroy either of Navarra or Galicia.

Genova, Octob. 1. Several Spanish Officers lately arrived here from Milan, went hence this last week on their way for Spain to raise men for the completing of Three Regiments of Spanish Foot, having before their departure from Milan, received by particular Order from the Duke d'Osuna the Governour, Six months pay before hand, for the expenses of their journey; at their arrival in Spain, they are to be furnished with Moneys necessary for the said Levies.

Signior Hippolito Centurione is departed hence with his Gallies, and all his Family, to settle himself at Marseilles, and carries with him an hundred Turkish Slaves which he brought at Malaba.

Paris, Octob. 22. His Majesty arriving the 9th instant at the Castle of Chambray, was the next day attended and complimented by the Lieutenant General of Blois at the head of the Corporation of that City, who afterwards performed the like Ceremony to the Queen, Monsieur, and Madamoiselle d'Orleans.

The Chevalier de Bouillon being lately dead of a wound received in a late encounter in Bell Isle, the whole Court seems much concerned at the loss of him; the King has been pleased to visit and condole with the Duke de Bourbon, and the Queen to do the same Honour to the Duchess of Beaufort, upon this subject.

Brom Bartholmeve is informed, that the Marquis de Crequy having continued some time about Chastel after his surrender, he gave such Orders as he thought necessary, went thence the 6th instant to Haidonville, from whence he dispatched away a Regiment of 4000 Horse to Longwy, himself marching more slowly with the rest of the Army to lay siege to it, and should refuse to surrender, but the 6th instant passed by this place a Courier, intending for the Court, to give his Majesty an account that that place is also reduced, but as yet we know not upon what terms.

Hague, Octob. 21. His Highness the Prince of Orange is in daily expectation of the arrival of the Earl of Offory with the Yachts, appointed to attend His Highness for his transportation, which (the Wind being now West) are expected every moment.

Several Ingenieurs are sent away with the States Deputies to Maffrich and other places upon the

Frontiers, to take a view of the Fortifications, and to give necessary orders to put them in a posture of defence.

Six ships are about a week since put to sea from the Texel bound for the East-Indies, having on board them several Families, which intend to settle themselves in those parts.

Another Fleet lies ready to sayl for Cadix with the first fair wind, but the Smyrna Convoy will scarcely be ready yet this Month.

Brussels, Octob. 19 The 17th instant arrived here Two Couriers from Luxembourg with Letters to his Excellency the Count de Monterey, informing him, the French forces had made themselves masters of Biche, and Longwy, where they are at present busie in throwing down the Fortifications, and intend after three or four days of rest to march towards Hombourg. The Duke of Lorrain thus stripped out of all his Countrey, is gone forwards to Ratisbonne on his way for Vienna, in all places pressing for assistance to restore him to his Dominions. The Prince de Nassau Sanbruck is said to have sent lately to the Duke to make a tender of the Moneys for which Hombourg was formerly mortgaged to him, and tis feared, upon delay or refusal, the French forces may be ready to enter and take possession for him.

From Paris we are told, that his most Christian Majesty is resolved to Quarter 22000 men this winter in Lorrain, and is hastening his new Levies.

On Thursday last arrived here Sir John Chicheley, Envoye from His Majesty of Great Britain, and the next day in the afternoon had his Audience from his Excellency the Count de Monterey.

The University of Louvain has lately sent away Two Doctors to the Court of Rome, to sollicite, that the Pope would be pleased to revoke the Bull of the late Pope his Predecessor, which was procured by the late Sieur Franciotti for a suspension of the privileges of the said University.

The Commissioners which were sent to Antwerp to put in execution the old Edict against Excess in Apparel, Coaches, Liveries, &c. and to inquire into the usurpation of Titles, Coats of Arms, and pretended Gentility, have been complained of for proceeding too rigorously against some persons; whereupon an Order is sent to them, not to put their sentences in execution till farther order from his Excellency.
