May it please Your Majesty,

THE Glorious Successes wherewith it has pleased the Divine Providence to bless Your Majesty's Arms, in Conjunction with those of Your Allies, having put it into Your Power to give France a Peace on safe and honourable Terms, We beg Leave, with all Humility, to Congratulate Your Majesty on this happy Occasion, not in the least doubting but the Peace You have out of Your great Goodness and Wisdom accomplish'd will in the Event be equally Glorious to Your Majesty, Beneficial to Your Subjects, and Safe to all Europe.

Permit us also to render to Your Majesty the utmost of our Acknowledgments for the great Care You have taken to render Secure the Protestant Succession (as Establish'd by the Acts of Settlement) in the Illustrious House of Hanover, on which the Religion, Liberty and Welfare of Your People so entirely depend.

May all Attempts to divide Your Majesty and that August Family, prove vain and ineffectual; may Your Majesty long enjoy the Blessings and Comforts of Peace; and may Your Reign be long and prosperous, Your Subjects united in Loyalty and Affection, is and shall be the constant Prayers of Your Majesty's Dutiful and Faithful Subjects.

The following Address from the Borough of Blechingly, was presented to Her Majesty.

To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Bailiff, Burgesses, Clergy, Freeholders, and Inhabitants of the ancient Borough of Blechingly, in the County of Surrey.

Most Gracious Sovereign!

WE, Your Majesty's most Loyal and Faithful Subjects, humbly beg Leave to return our most Dutiful Thanks to Your Majesty, for Your great Condescension in Communicating to Your Parliament the happy Conclusion of so long, and so necessary a War; and hope, by the many Advantages that Your Majesty assures us You have obtained for Your Subjects, to retrieve our Losses, and so forget the Burden of the War, since we

are persuaded that Your Majesty has happily accomplish'd the End You propos'd.

We admire Your Majesty's Wisdom, as well as Goodness, in securing the Protestant Succession, and keeping a perfect Friendship with the Illustrious House of Hanover.

We apprehend, that the fixing the Succession of the Crown in that Royal Family, is the surest Means to quiet the Possession of it against the Contrivances of Your Majesty's Enemies at home and abroad: This will despel all Jealousies, compose Party Rage, abate the Insolence, and disappoint the growing Hopes of those, who endeavour to separate Your Majesty's Interest from that of the House of Hanover, and to withdraw the Duty and Affections of Your Subjects from Your Majesty and Your Lawful Successors.

Our most hearty Prayers, for the long Continuance of Your Majesty's Life, are the least Return we can make Your Majesty's Endeavours to preserve the Church of England, as by Law Establish'd, and the Protestant Succession, as by Law limited.

Which Addresses Her Majesty received very graciously.

Stockholm, May 31. N. S. Two Days ago Colonel Wolfraad arrived here, and brought an account, that Count Steinbock had been obliged to surrender himself and his Men Prisoners of War: Whereupon the Senate immediately propos'd to the Burghers, to contribute One hundred thousand Crowns for their Ransom before the Term is expired. They have already paid Eight thousand for that of the General, and are now employ'd in raising the Sums that are necessary to redeem the Troops. We have receiv'd advice from Funen, that Twelve thousand Muscovites had made a Descent there near Helsingfort; but the Inhabitants of that Place having burnt it themselves, and withdrawn with their Effects, the Muscovites returned to their Ships, taking with them two Vessels, one of Holland, and another of Lubeck, that were at Anchor in that Port. Their Fleet having been since seen off of Borgo, it is thought they design for Wibourg. In the mean time the Militia of Funen is assembling, and the Squadron of Nine Men of War, that went lately out of Carlscroon, is expected back in a short time, by which we hope to be in a Condition to hinder that of the Czar from returning. Major General Ecklebadt, who was present at the Battle of Gadebusch, and was afterwards prevented by Sickness from going with Count Steinbock into Holstein, returned hither a few Days ago.

Venice, June 16. N. S. The Magistrates of Health hath reduced the Quarantine to be performed by all Vessels which comes from Morea, and the Venetian Islands, to Eight and twenty Days. The Procurator Lorenzo Tiepolo, late Ambassador from this Republick to the Court of Rome, is returned hither. Letters from thence bring an account, that the Pope was gone to Castel Gondolpho for the recovery of his



his Health, having committed the Government, during his absence, to Cardinal Albani his Nephew. A Congress was said to be forming there, to which all the Princes and States of Italy were to send Plenipotentiaries, in order to establish a Tribunal for the Countries on this side the Mountains. It was reported that the King of Spain would break off all Correspondence with the Pope, and recal his Subjects who are in the Ecclesiastical Dominions. Count Boromeo, late Vice Roy of Naples, was set out towards Milan. We are inform'd by several Ships lately come in here, that the Seas are very much infested with Privateers of Algiers and Tripoli.

Vienna, June 22. N. S. On the 10th, the Emperor left the Castle of Laxemburg, and came to reside in this City. The same Day he receiv'd an Express, with advice of her Imperial Majesty's arrival at Lintz, Thirty six Leagues distant from hence. Two Days ago, another Express brought an account, that her Majesty was so much indisposed, that she should not be able to pursue her Journey till she found her self better. Upon which, the Emperor went Post yesterday with a small retinue to Stein on the Danube, and intends to proceed to Lintz in case her Imperial Majesty's disorder should continue. We have of late had violent Storms of Rain and Hail, which have caus'd great Inundations, and done much damage to the Vines and other Fruits of the Earth.

Hanover, June 23. N. S. Some Days ago an Officer arrived here from the Bishop of Munster, in order to be informed upon what Foot the Elector hath placed his Troops in the Emperor's Service, that he may conform himself to the Regulations made on this Subject with the Court of Vienna. We have received Advice, that the King of Prussia's Troops are in motion to enter into Pomerania, and that their Rendezvous is at Fredelant. The same Letters add, that the Swedes have given the Sequestration of what they hold in that Province to his Prussian Majesty, in order to be preserved from the Insults of their Enemies. They write from Adrianople, that the Port had declared to the King of Sweden, that in case he persists in refusing the Convoy with which they offer to guard him to his own Dominions, they shall be obliged to take other Measures which will not be agreeable to him. But other Advices say on the contrary, that the Grand Signior was resolved to espouse his Majesty's Interests with Vigour, and to declare War against the Muscovites.
