

# The London Gazette.

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Westminster, July 6.

**H**ER Majesty having granted a Commission under the Great Seal, empowering the Lord Chancellor of *Great Britain*, the Lord President of Her Majesty's Council, and the Lord Steward of Her Majesty's Household, to Pass the Royal Assent, in Her Majesty's Absence, to some Bills agreed to by both Houses of Parliament; this Day the Lords Commissioners sent a Message to the House of Commons by Sir *William Oldes*, Gentleman-Usher of the Black-Rod, to desire the House to come up to the House of Peers with their Speaker, to be present at the Passing the Bills into Acts. The Speaker and the House went up accordingly, and the Lords Commissioners Passed the Royal Assent to

*An Act for continuing the Acts therein mentioned, for preventing Theft and Rapine upon the Northern Borders of England.*

*Gibraltar, June 11. N. S.* The Emperor of Morocco has sign'd a Cessation of Arms between Her Majesty and him, for three Months, to commence from the 26th of May last, with Captain Paddon, Commander of Her Majesty's Ship the Ruby.

*Venice, June 23. N. S.* We have received advice from Rome, that the Pope having found himself much better, since his removal to Castell Gondolpho, resolv'd to continue there for some time longer. Cardinal Paolucci was come from thence for a few Days, intending to return with Cardinal Albani. The Queen Dowager of Poland was indispos'd at Frescati, and the Physicians having judg'd that an improper Air for her, she was preparing to set out for Rome. The Marquis de Prie, Ambassador from the Court of Vienna, had sent the Abbot Baur to

give the Emperor an account of his Conduct in the Disputes with the Pope, relating to the disposal of the Bishoprick of Tournay, and to the Affairs of the Church in the Kingdom of Naples. The Differences between the Courts of Madrid and Rome, are in a fair way of being accommodated, and it is thought they will be thoroughly adjusted by Signor Aldovrandi, at his arrival in Spain. They write from Naples, that they are making great Preparations for War in that Kingdom. The People are very much pleas'd with Count Thaur, their new Vice-Roy, who has distributed large Sums of Money among the Poor. The Nobility admire his impartial Administration of Justice, and exprels great Satisfaction at the Declaration he has made, that he will no longer suffer the Abuse of Ecclesiastical Immunities; under pretence of which, the Churches were made use of to protect Assassins, and others guilty of enormous Crimes. The German Recruits, amounting to Two hundred and fifty Men, are arrived from Croatia in the Isle of Tremiti, where they are performing their Quarrentine, after which they are to pass over to Naples.

*Berlin, July 1. N. S.* The King and Queen are gone from hence to Potsdam, where it is said they will reside most part of the Summer. Prince Menzikoff and General Flemming are expected here in a few Days. Count Denhoff, one of his Majesty's Plenipotentiaries at the Congress at Utrecht, is arrived from thence. It is said some of our Troops are to take Possession of the Fortresses in Pomerania, in order to keep them in Sequestration, till a Peace is concluded between the Princes of the North.

*Hanover, June 30. N. S.* Letters from Holstein bring an Account, that the King of Denmark hath left Husum, and resides at present at Gottorp. He hath offer'd to withdraw his Troops from the Diocess of Eutin, and consents that the Administrator shall live in the Bishop's Palace. These Advices add, that Prince Menzikoff hath demanded One hundred thousand Crowns of the Magistrates of Lubeck, threatening them with Military Execution in case they refuse to pay that Sum. Part of the Muscovite Army under his Command hath pass'd through the Country of Saxe-Lawenburg towards Pomerania, where it is to be divided into two Bodies. One, consisting of Eight thousand Men, is to join the Danes and Saxons, in pursuance of the Treaty made between the Allies, but there are yet some Difficulties relating to the Maintenance of those Forces. The other Body is to march into Finland, to augment the Czar's Army, which is to be commanded by Prince Menzikoff, and he is ordered to go thither as soon as possible, his Majesty intending to return to Petersburg. We have received Advice, that Twelve thousand Prussians are upon the Frontiers of Pomerania, in order to Garrison the Towns of Stetin and Wiltmar, with the consent of the Swedes.

*Versailles, July 10. N. S.* On the 4th, a Courier arriv'd from Rome with a Dispensation for the Marriages of the Duke of Bourbon with Mademoiselle de Conti; and of the Prince of Conti her Brother



brother, with Mademoiselle de Bourbon, Sister to the Duke. The Contracts were Sign'd on the 8th in the King's Closet, and yesterday the Ceremony was performed in his Majesty's Chappel, by the Cardinal de Rohan, Great Almoner of France. At Night, the Brides and Bridegrooms, with the Princes and Princeesses of the Blood, Supp'd with the King in Publick, and afterwards his Majesty conducted them to their own Apartments. On the 12th, the Duke of Bourbon intends to set out towards the Army on the Rhine, and he will be follow'd very soon by the Prince of Conti. The King will go in a few Days to Marli, where it is said he will reside two Months, and one Month afterwards at Fontainebleau. We are inform'd by Advices from Landau, that the Siege of that Place advances; and that the Marquis de Biron, a Lieutenant General, had his left Arm taken off by a Cannon-shot.

London, July 4. This being the Day appointed by Her Majesty, for the Publick Audience of the Duke d'Aumont, Ambassador Extraordinary from the most Christian King, the Earl of Salisbury and Sir Clement Cotterel, Master of the Ceremonies, with six Gentlemen of the Privy Chamber, brought him from Somerset-house to St. James's in her Majesty's Coach, follow'd by the Ambassador's Coaches, in the same Order as was observ'd at his Entry. His Excellency was receiv'd at the Palace-Gate by Sir Philip Meadows, Knight Marshal. Her Majesty's Foot-Guards were drawn up in the Court, and the Officers saluted his Excellency with Pike and Colours, and afterwards with their Hats as he pass'd by, the Drums beating a Call. He was receiv'd at the Door of the Guard-Chamber by the Lord Paget, Captain of the Yeomen of the Guard, and conducted by him to the end of his Command: After which he was receiv'd by the Duke of Beaufort, Captain of the Band of Gentlemen Pensioners, who were rang'd on each side of the room, and conducted by him in the same manner to the Door of the Room of Audience, where he was met by Mr. Vice-Chamberlain, in the absence of the Lord Chamberlain of Her Majesty's Household. The Audience being over, his Excellency was reconducted in the same manner to Somerset-House by the Earl of Salisbury, the Master of the Ceremonies, and the Gentlemen of the Privy Chamber.
