I heartily Thank you for the Assistance you have given Me therein; and I Promise My Self that with your Concur-

rence, it will be Lasting.

To this End I Recommend it to you all, to make my Subjects truly Sensible what they Gain by the Peace, and that you will Endeavour to Dissipate those Groundless Jealousies which have been so Industriously Fomented amongst Us, that Our Unhappy Divisions may not Weaken, and in some sort Endanger the Advantages I have Obtained for My Kingdoms.

There are some (very few, I Hope) who will never be Satisfied with any Government; it is Necessary therefore that you hew your Love to Your Country, by Exerting your selves, to Obviate the Malice of the Ill-minded, and to Undeceive

the Deluded.

Nothing can Establish Peace at Home, nothing can Recover the Disorders that have happened during so long a War, but a Steddy Adhering to the Constitution in Church and State.

Such as are True to these Principles are only to be Rely'd on; and as they have the best Title to My Favour, so you may Depend upon My having no Interest nor Aim, but your Advantage, and the Securing of our Religion and

Liberty.

I Hope, for the Quiet of these Nations, and the Universal Good, that I Shall, next Winter, Meet My Parliament, Resolved to Act upon the same Principles, with the same Prudence, and with fuch Vigour, as may Enable Me to Support the Liberties of Europe Abroad, and Reduce the Spirit of Fastion at Home.
