Venice,



Venice, July 7. N. S. The Procurator Thiepolo to make his Publick Entry on the 10th. Monsignor Mathei, the Pope's Nuntio, is preparing to set out for his Archbishoprick of Fermo, in order to which he only waits for the arrival of Monsignor Aldobrandini his Successor. Several Venetian Vessels are lately come in here, and bring an account, that the Gallies of Malta had chased the Capitana of Tripoli into Durazzo. They write from Rome, that the Pope was arrived there in good Health from Castel Gondolpho. Don Alessandro Albani, his Nephew, was not able to come with him, by reason of an Indisposition. The Pope hath bestowed on him the Abbey of St. Lorenzo in Campo, which is one of the richest in Italy, and was enjoy'd by the late Cardinal Negroni. It is said he is likewise to have the Canonry of Santa Maria Maggiore, lately vacant by the Death of Monsignor Francipani. The Marquis de Prie, Ambassador from the Emperor, hath had a long Audience of the Pope, upon the Affairs of Italy, immediately after which he dispatch'd an Express to the Court of Vienna.

Vienna, July 12. N. S. On the 5th the Emperor went Post with a small Retinue to meet the Empress at Lintz, and to accompany her from thence to this City, where their Majesties arrived Yesterday in perfect Health. The Emperor hath called together a Diet of the States of Hungary at Odenburg. A great number of black Cattle has been lately brought from that Country, for the use of the Army on the Upper Rhine. Baron Kirchner is to go from hence very soon with a Commission to several Courts of the Empire. Letters from Valachia bring an Account, that the Grand Signior hath at length declared War against the Czar, and the Muscovite Ambassadors have been sent back to Constantinople, and confined in the Seven Towers. The Han of Tartary, who is thought to have contributed very much to this Resolution, was upon his departure with an Army to invade Muscovy. The King of Sweden was to return to Bender as soon as a new Grand Vizir was appointed. But as our Advices from Turkey have differ'd very much of late, we don't yet give an entire Credit to these Accounts.

Hamburg, July 21. N. S. We have receiv'd advice, that the Conferences at Swedt, about the Sequestration of Holstein and Pomerania, began on the 19th, at an Entertainment the King of Prussia gave the Ministers that were there. Monsieur Ploto, one of his Privy Counsellors, is appointed Envoy to the King of Denmark, with Directions to forward the evacuation of Holstein. Baron Goertz hath offer'd to pay his Prussian Majesty Two hundred thousand Crowns, if he will furnish the Administrator of Holstein with Ten thousand Men, and Four hundred thousand more if he is restor'd to the Government by his assistance, but his Majesty hath rejected these Proposals. Letters from Pomerania bring an account, that Stetin is invested on all Sides by the Muscovite Troops. On the 23d past the Czar arriv'd at Petersburg, where he intended to stay but a Fortnight, and then return to his Army in Finland. The Swedish Vice Admiral is arrived on the Coasts of that Province with six large Men of War, and the Rear Admiral is likewise expected with five more, and three Frigats. The Muscovite Fleet consists of twelve large Ships, and six Frigats.

Hanover, July 21. N. S. The Elector of Trier hath sent an Envoy to this Court, upon some Complaints the Protestants of the Diocese of Osnabrug have made here against him. His Electoral Highness's Troops, that were posted on the Frontiers, when the Danes entered into the Dutchy of Bremen, are returned into their former Quarters, and part of them are come to this City. We have receiv'd advice, that the Administrator of Holstein hath ordered the Governor of Tonningen to behead Monsieur Wederkop, who is kept Prisoner there, if he

finds himself under a Necessity of Surrendering the Place to the Danes: But it is thought he will not dare to execute this Order, since the King of Denmark hath declar'd, that if he does, he shall suffer an ignominious Death, and the Garrison shall have no Quarter. The same Lettets add, that the Swedes have not yet redeem'd their Troops that were made Prisoners in Holstein. They write from Petersburg, that the Czar is return'd thither, having left a strong Garrison in Abo, to secure his Conquests in Finland.
