**T**HE following Address from the County of Hereford, was presented to Her Majesty by the Right Hon. the Lord Viscount Scudamore and Sir Thomas Morgan, Bart, Knights of the Shire for the said County.

*To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty,*

The humble Address of the Justices of the Peace, Gentlemen, and Grand Jury of the County of Hereford, assembled at the Quarter Sessions.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

**W**E Your most loyal Subjects, beg leave to Congratulate Your Majesty upon the invaluable Blessing of Peace, which is so peculiarly glorious to Your Majesty, so advantageous to Europe, that even those Few, that were Enemies to their own Welfare, must at length join with us in a grateful Sense of Your Charitable Goodness which, in spite of themselves, hath made them happy.

The Care Your Majesty has taken, in securing to Posterity the Protestant Succession in the illustrious House of Hanover, demonstrates, That Your Majesty's Goodness is too Extensive to be confined by the Period of Your own Life.

We shall gladly embrace all Opportunities, to demonstrate our profoundest Duty and Loyalty to Your Sacred Person and Government, by Cultivating the Arts of Peace, and continuing to return faithful and loyal Persons to represent us in Parliament; and hope Your Majesty will never want a Ministry as Zealous and Able to serve You, as what You now employ, so distinguishing a Part of which, 'tis the Honour of our Country to have produced.

That GOD will long continue Your Majesty's Life a Blessing to these Kingdoms, and all Europe, is the hearty Prayer of Your Majesty's most grateful and obedient Subjects.

The following Addresses were presented to Her Majesty by his Grace the Duke of Ormond, Lord Lieutenant of the Kingdom of Ireland.

The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons and Citizens of the City of Dublin, at their General Quarter Assembly, held at the Tholsell of the said City, the 17th of July, 1713.

The humble Address of the High Sheriff, Justices of the Peace, Grand Jury, and Gentlemen Freeholders of the County of Kildare, at a General Assizes and Goal Delivery held at Naas, in and for the said County, on the 10th of July, 1713.

The humble Address of the Nobility, High Sheriff, Justices of the Peace, Grand Jury, Gentlemen and Freeholders of the County of Waterford, at an Assize held for the said County, the 9th of July, 1713.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Sheriffs, and Commons of the Town and County of Drogheda, the 10th Day of July, 1713.

Which Addresses Her Majesty received very graciously.

*Hanover, August 1. N. S.* Count Schonborn, the Emperor's Minister, hath left this Place in order to return to Hamburgh. We have receiv'd advice from Pomerania, that Sixteen hundred Muscovite and Saxon Foot have made a Descent in the Isle of Rugen with the Loss of only six Men. The Swedes that endeavour'd to oppose their Landing, were dispers'd by the Guns of their Frigats. They immediately sent back their Transport Ships to bring the same number of Forces to join them from Gripswalde. The next Day they advanced in the Isle without meeting any Swedish Troops, and have posted themselves in an advantageous Place, where they expect a Reinforcement. These Letters add, that Matters were preparing to besiege Stetin in Form, the Garrison of which is said to consist of Two thousand Men. It was thought, that the King of Prussia would have furnish'd the Artillery for this Siege, but we are now assur'd that his Majesty is resolv'd to remain Neuter, and the Besiegers expect twenty Pieces of Cannon, and twelve Mortars from Copenhagen. The Danish Troops are marching out of Holstein into Pomerania, and it is said they are to blockade Stralsundt. There is likewise a Danish Squadron at Sea, to facilitate the reduction of Swedish Pomerania.

*Hamburgh, August 4. N. S.* We have receiv'd advice, that on the 26th past, the King of Prussia signify'd in Writing to Prince Menzikoff, Count Flemming, and Monsieur Dewitz, that he was resolv'd not to concern himself any way in the War of the North; upon which, Prince Menzikoff went from Berlin the next Day. The Muscovites and Saxons having taken Possession of the Isle of Rugen, are preparing to attack the Fort of Daunholm, situate in the extreme part of that Isle. Seventeen Deserters are lately come from Toningen, to the Danish Camp before that Place. They all agree that the Garrison is reduced, by Sickness and Desertion, to Five hundred Men, and that the Fortres can't hold out above three Weeks at farthest. Major General Ranck, who went to the King of Sweden at Adrianople to propose a Marriage between the Princess his Sister, and the Hereditary Prince of Hesse Cassel, has left that Place without having succeed'd in his Negotiation. Letters from Poland inform us that King Augustus had receiv'd an account from his Ambassador at the Ottoman Port, that on the 25th of June, a Treaty of Peace was concluded between the Grand Signior and the Czar. The next Day it was publish'd, and the Turks have observed a Day of Thanksgiving for it. The King of Sweden continu'd at a Village within two Leagues of Adrianople.

*Hague, August 9. N. S.* On the 7th the Earl of Strafford was in Conference with the Deputies of the States-General, as likewise with the Ministers of the several Princes engaged in the War of the North; and this Morning his Excellency presented, a Memorial to the States-General on that Subject. We have received Advice from the Camp before Landau, that the French had lately set the Arsenal of that Place on Fire with their Bombs, and had brought their Approaches so near, that they thought within a

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
