Warsaw, September 19. N. S. This Morning an Express arrived here from *Adrianople* with an Account, that the Grand Signior had declared he would religiously observe the Treaty of *Carlowitz*. The King of *Sweden* was perfectly recovered of his late Indisposition, but it was very difficult to get Access to him, and the Polanders of his Retinue were not suffered to go any where without a Guard of two Janisaries. King *Stanislaus* and the *Palatin* of *Kiovia* were still in Confinement at *Bender*.

Hanover, September 22. N. S. Monsieur de *Schulenburg* is gone to reside at the Court of *Gottorp* with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary from his Electoral Highness to the King of

Denmark. Letters from *Pomerania* bring an Account, that Major-General *Buek*, a Native of *Mecklenbourg*, but at present in the Service of the *Czar*, had left the Camp before *Stetin* with Four hundred *Muscovite* Horse, and advanced to *Niebstad*, the Residence of the Duke of *Mecklenbourg*. Upon his approach to the Town, his Highness ordered the Gates to be shut, but at the same time sent him word they should be opened to him, provided he would be content to come in alone. He accepted of this Condition, and being admitted to the Duke, demanded a very large quantity of Corn for the Subsistence of the *Muscovite* Forces: The Duke told him it was impossible for his Subjects to furnish so much, his Country having been already destroyed by the *Czar's* Troops, and those of his Confederates. Upon this Answer the General withdrew, and in his return to the Camp he took several Hostages with him, to secure the Payment of the Contributions he has established in that *Dutchy*. The same Letters add, that the *Muscovites* had made themselves Masters of *Fort Star* before *Stetin*, and had erected a Battery there, from whence they play on the Town, though hitherto with very little Success. They write from *Hollstein*, that *Tonningen* was reduced to the last Extremity, but it was believed the King of *Denmark* would consent that a *Prussian* Garrison should be received into the Place, especially since the *Saxon* Troops are retired from *Pomerania*, and the *Swedes* are preparing to make a Transportation of Forces, and have Twenty large Men of War, besides some Frigats, ready to set sail from *Carlsroon*.

Berlin, Sept. 23. N. S. His Majesty is expected here this Day from *Potsdam*. Letters from *Elsingfos* bring an account, that on the 11th past the *Czar* set Sail from *Cronstet* with a Fleet consisting of fifty Vessels laden with Ammunition and Provisions for the Use of the *Muscovite* Army in *Finland*. In their Passage they met with so violent a Storm, that twelve Ships ran a-ground, and the *Czar* apprehending the same Misfortune would happen to the Frigate he was in, Landed with great Difficulty and Danger in a small Boat. But the Storm being over, his Majesty went on board again the next Day, and on the 17th he arrived at *Elsingfos*, where he found his Troops in a very good Condition. It is said they amount to Eighteen thousand Foot and Five thousand Horse and Dragoons, all which were to march towards *Abu* on the 26th of August. The *Swedish* Forces consist of no more than Nine thousand Men, who upon the approach of the *Muscovites* divided themselves, and the

Infantry towards Tavasthuys, the Cavalry towards Abo. Their Fleet lies at Hangus, between the latter Place and Elsingfos.

Brussels, September 30. N. S. Monsieur Vandenberg, the Dutch Deputy residing at this Place, has received Orders from the States-General to notify to the Pope's Nuncio, that they had conferred the Bishoprick of Ypres upon Monsieur Cuper, a Curate of Bruges, and to desire he would obtain a Confirmation of their Choice from the Pope. We have received advice, that on the 21st Marechal Villars forced the German Lines near Fribourg, upon which General Vaubonne, who was posted with a Body of Men to guard them towards the Black Forest, thought fit to retire to Hohen Graven. The same Letters add, that the Army under Prince Eugene was marching with great diligence to prevent the Designs of the French on that side, but its thought they will hardly arrive time enough to be able to hinder the Siege of Fribourg, for which the necessary Artillery and Ammunition are ready at Brisac.

Hague, October 4. N. S. On the 30th past, the Earl of Strafford, in conjunction with the Deputies of the States General, was in Conference with all the Ministers of the Princes engag'd in the Northern War, and on the 1st, a Conference was again held upon the Subject of a Suspension of Arms propos'd to those Princes. The same Day the Count de Tarouca and Don Lewis d'Alcuna, Plenipotentiaries of the King of Portugal, arrived from Utrecht, and were in Conference with the States General. Mr. St John, Her Majesty's Secretary at the Congress at Utrecht, who came hither lately from thence, set out this Day for Aix la Chapelle.
