THE following Address from the Governor and Council of *Jamaica*, was Presented to Her Majesty by the Rt. Hon. the Lord Viscount *Bolingbroke*, One of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

To the *QUEEN's* most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Governor and Council of *Jamaica*.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE Tour Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, the Governor and Council of Tour Majesty's Island of *Jamaica*, humbly crave leave, with Hearts full of Joy, to Congratulate Tour Majesty upon the happy Conclusion of so Glorious and Honourable a Peace, which not only Extends Tour Dominions, but must make them all Flourish.

It is with the most dutiful and submissive Admiration we behold Tour Majesty's consummate Wisdom (seconded by a most Able and Faithful Ministry) superior to the greatest Difficulties, accomplishing that great End, the preserving the Balance of Power in Europe, and obtaining the most solid Advantages and Security to Tour People and their Posterity, which has ever been the Motive of all Tour transcendent Actions.

Nor can we conceive any but the most obstinate and irreconcilable Enemies to our Church and Constitution, capable still of fomenting groundless Fears and Jealousies after what Tour Majesty has so effectually done for securing the Protestant Succession in the illustrious House of Hanover.

But as Words are faint Expressions of the Happiness we enjoy under Tour auspicious Reign, our Actions, to the utmost of our Ability, shall always demonstrate our Loyalty.

That Tour Majesty may live long possessed of the Hearts of dutiful and grateful Subjects to the Greatest and Best of *QUEENS*, Arbiter of Europe, to reap the blessed Fruits of Tour Labours, are the united Acclamations of all Tour People.

Florence, October 31. N. S. On the 29th Instant the Great Prince was seiz'd with a Fit of an Apoplexy, and tho' with great Difficulty he was brought to recover some Sense and Motion, he continued so ill, that it was thought proper to administer extreme Unction to him. His Highness died Yesterday, and is extremely lamented, as well upon account of his Personal Qualifications, as also because it is apprehended this State may probably be involved in great Troubles, if the House of Medicis should be extinct, Prince John Gaston, the present Heir, being yet without Children. We are inform'd, that the Marechal de Theſſe is come from France, to exhort the Italian Princes not to pay Contributions to the Emperor, which it is said the Most Christian King will Interpret to be a Breach of the Treaty of Neutrality.

Hanover, Nov. 14. N. S. The Dutcheſs Dowager of Zell is returned to Lunenburg from Gohre. The King of Prussia is expected very soon at this Court, where he is to have an Interview with his Electoral Highness, in order to communicate to him the Measures he has taken for restoring the Prince of Holstein to the Government of that Dutchy. We don't hear that the Prussian Troops design'd for that Expedition, are actually upon their March, and his Majesty has not yet sent to the Elector to desire Leave for them to pass through the Country of Saxe-Lawenbourg, which is the way they are to take, if they enter into Holstein. It is said the King of Denmark is resolved to maintain himself in the Possession of that Dutchy, and has sent Orders to his Generals to oppose the Troops of any Prince that attempts to enter into it without his consent. They write from Brunswick, that the Duke of Wolfenbittel, accompanied by his whole Court, and by the Administrator of Holstein, was returned from Gandelheim, where he had assisted at the Installation of the Princess of Saxe-Meiningen, his Grand-daughter, created Abbess of that Place. Letters from Vienna bring an account, that the Contagious Distemper was so much abated there, that for some time not above Five and thirty Persons had died in a Week. But the Infection was encreased very much in the neighbouring Places.

Hamburg, November 17. N. S. The number of those that died last Week amounts to no more than Two hundred ninety two. We have received Advice, that the Prussian Troops are still assembling at Lenzen, and the King is expected there in Person. His Equipage is preparing, as if he intended to make a Campaign, but it is thought he will go no further than Lenzen, and that the Command of the Army will be given to the Prince of Anhalt-Deſſau, in case his Majesty should think fit to engage in a War. Count Flemming has projected a new Plan for an Accommodation, in which it is believed both Parties will find their Account. Towningen, by this Expedient, will be constantly supplied with Provisions, which are to be sent in for a Fortnight at a time, and all Acts of Hostility are to cease till the Conferences are ended. Letters from Copenhagen bring an Account, that an Express was arrived there from the Czar, with Assurance, that he would continue firm to his Alliance with the King of Denmark; and that he had order'd his Troops, which were gone out of Pomerania, to halt on the Frontiers of Poland, in order to observe the King of Prussia's Motions; and in case that Prince should attempt to restore the Duke of Holstein by Force, they were directed to march into Prussia, and invade that Kingdom. His Danish Majesty has erected a new Tribunal at Gottorp, composed of his own Ministers. Monsieur de Jessen is appointed to be President of it, and Baron Koningstein to be Vice-President. He has likewise declared, that since the House of Holstein has made such continual Complaints of him in all the Courts of Germany, and so earnestly sollicitated the King of Prussia to declare War against him, he did not think himself obliged to observe any further Measures with them. In Answer to the King of Prussia's Letter he has writ him word, that tho' he could not approve of the Treaty



Treaty concluded with Prince Menzikoff, in relation to Stetin, yet, out of regard to his Majesty, he had commanded his Admirals and Sea Captains not to Molest the Swedish Garrisons in their Passage from Pomerania. We have received Advice, that the Polish Ambassadors had been admitted to an Audience of the Grand Signior, after which they were in Conference with the Reis-Effendi, who desired to know of them, Whether the King and Commonwealth would allow Chochim to be fortified without breaking the Peace? Whether King Stanislaus and his Adherents should be received into Favour, and restored to their Estates? Whether a free Passage should be granted to the King of Sweden through Poland? The Ambassadors replied, They had not yet receiv'd sufficient Instructions in these Points, but that they would give in their Answer before they had their Audience of Leave of the Sultan.

Hague, November 21. N. S. The States of Holland and West-Friesland met on the 14th, and continue still assembled. On the 15th Monsieur Marshal de Bieberstein, one of the King of Prussia's Plenipotentiaries at the Congress of Peace, set out from hence, in order to return to the Court of Berlin. The same Day Monsieur Van der Dussen, one of the Plenipotentiaries of the States General, came hither from Utrecht, and has since been in Conference with the Deputies of the States, upon the Subject of the Treaty of Peace between his Catholick Majesty and their High Mightinesses. Monsieur Buys is likewise arrived from the same Place, and intends to set out very soon with Monsieur Gossling, his Colleague, for the Court of France, where they are to reside as Ambassadors of this Republick. Letters from the Upper Rhine bring an Account, that the Governor of Fribourg has receiv'd Orders from Prince Eugene not to surrender the Castle, upon which Marschal Villars was preparing to Attack it with the utmost Vigour.

Dublin, November 7. Yesterday came on the Election of Members of Parliament for this City. The Sheriffs perceiving the Electors were going into a Riot, sent to the Guard for a File of Miqueleers to prevent it, and a Tumult arose, in which there was a Man kill'd and some of the Soldiers were wounded. His Grace the Lord Lieutenant has appointed a Committee of Council to enquire into this Disorder, and has directed the Sheriffs to take more effectual Care for the future. The Poll is adjourn'd till Monday.

Windfor, November 15. This Day Seignior Giraldi, Envoy Extraordinary of the Great Duke of Tuscany, had a private Audience of Her Majesty, in which he delivered to Her Majesty a Letter from his Highness, and another from the Princess, notifying the Death of the Great Prince; being introduced by the Right Hon. Mr. Secretary Bromley.
