Copenhagen, November 21. N. S.

THE King has consented, that the Letters Her Majesty's Subjects may have occasion to write to Sweden, shall pass through his Dominions and be sent from Elsinore to Elsinburg by an Express who is to bring back the Answers. The small Squadron and the Artillery which had been for some time in Pomerania, is returned to this Place. Three Days ago the Fleet likewise arrived, and is to be laid up for the Winter.

Berlin, December 2. N. S. This Morning the King went to Kepnick to review the Artillery-men, and from thence he proceeded to Potsdam. A great number of People having retired from hence into other Countries, for fear of being pressed into the Service, his Majesty has published an Edict, in which he prohibits his Subjects from leaving his Dominions for the future without a License, and enjoys those who are gone away, to return to their former Dwellings upon Pain of having their Estates and Goods confiscated, and their Names posted upon the Gallows. Count Flemming set out a few Days ago for Warsaw, and intends to be here again in three Weeks. The Saxon Troops that were in Pomerania are to march into Poland, except one Regiment of Horse that is to return into Saxony. Monsieur Marshal de Bieberstein arrived here Yesterday from the Hague.

Hanover, November 28. N. S. Since the Court came from Gohre, some of the Elector's Troops in the Emperor's Service have been sent for home, and their Quarters are already appointed. It is thought the whole Body will likewise be recalled in a short time. The King of Denmark has declared, that he is willing to renew the Negotiations relating to the Affairs of Holstein, and that he will allow a sufficient quantity of Provisions to be sent into Tonnigen once a Week, which shall be continued as long as the Treaty lasts. It is believed the King of Prussia will suspend the March of his Troops designed for that Dutchy, till he is informed of the Czar's Sentiments, in relation to Prince Menzikoff's Negotiations in Pomerania, and at Berlin. Some Letters from Constantinople bring an account, that the Grand Signior had renew'd his Promises to assist the King of Sweden. But we have since received certain Advice from Warsaw, that the Turkish and Tartarian Envoys had given Assurances of their Masters Intentions to observe the Treaty of Carlowitz, and continue in Peace with Poland.

Hamburg, December 1. N. S. The Danish Envoy at Berlin has declared to the Ministers of that Court, that the King his Master, to shew the Regard he has for his Prussian Majesty, and his sincere Desire to continue in Friendship with him, would consent to renew the Negotiations with the Ministers of Holstein, either at Gottorp, Copenhagen, or Brunswick. He has likewise intimated, that the King of Denmark might be prevail'd on to evacuate Holstein, and to raise the Blockade of Tonnigen, provided the Troops of some Neutral Prince were placed in Garrison there during the War, but that he was resolv'd to keep Possession of the Dutchy of

Sleswick till he was reimburs'd of his Expences, or received some other Equivalent. The Ministers of Holstein are not at all pleas'd with this Declaration, and pretend they can't enter upon any Treaty, having put their Affairs into the Hands of his Prussian Majesty, who has taken them into his Protection, and may dispose of them as he thinks most convenient. The Saxon Forces in Pomerania have receiv'd Orders to march into Poland. The Governor of Wismar persists in his Resolution not to admit any Troops but those of Mecklenbourg into that Place, unless he is compell'd to it, as Monsieur Meyerfeldt was in his Government. They write from Copenhagen, that Advice was brought there from Peterburg, of Prince Menzikoff's being Arrested, by Order of the Czar, for the Treaty he had made with the King of Prussia, in relation to Stetin. Letters from Sweden bring an Account, that their Army in Finland had been defeated by the Muscovites between Tavasthaus and Vasa. The Loss of the Battle was imputed to the Horse, that went away upon the first Discharge, leaving the Foot exposed to their Enemies, who kill'd a great number of them, and took Fifteen hundred Prisoners. The Senate of Stockholm being inform'd of this Misfortune, immediately countermanded Six thousand Men that were ready to be Transported into Finland, as being of no further use in that Province, which is now look'd upon to be entirely lost. The States of the Kingdom were very pressing with the Senate to make a Peace. The same Letters confirm our former Accounts, that the Princess of Sweden had accepted of the Regency. The Nobility were very much divided in their Opinions about the Succession, in case any Accident should happen to the King; some being for the Princess, and others for the young Duke of Holstein.

Brussels, December 7. N. S. The States General have sent five Battalions of their Troops from Mons, Charleroy, and Namur, to reinforce their Garrisons upon the Meuse in the Upper Quarter of Guelderland. We have receiv'd advice from Paris, that Prince Eugene and Marschal Villars were arriv'd at Radstadt, in order to treat of a Peace between the Emperor and France. Prince Eugene assured the Marschal, that his Imperial Majesty's Intentions were sincere to agree to reasonable Terms, but that the Treaty should be carried on without the intervention of any Foreign Power. On the 16th, the Capitulation of the Castle and Forts of Fribourg was Sign'd, by which it was agreed, That the Garrison should march out in three Days, with all Marks of Honour, and be conducted to the Imperial Camp at Rothweil; that they should take with them four Pieces of Cannon, and two Mortars; that Waggons should be provided for them to carry away their Baggage, and whatever they had lost during the Siege, should be restored; that the Prisoners should be set at liberty in the same Condition in which they were taken; that the Sick and Wounded should remain in the Town, and be furnished with all Necessaries gratis; that the Townsmen might have leave to go away at any time within three



three Months, and to remove or sell their Effects; that the Debts contracted by the Officers and Soldiers for Provisions should not be paid, and only Monsieur Dalberdorff, first Commissary of War, be left Hostage for the Payment of other Debts; that a Courier should be sent to Prince Eugene, to give him notice of their March to Rothweil. The bad Weather hinder'd the Garrison from going out till the 20th. It was compos'd of Thirteen thousand Men at the beginning of the Siege, and only Seven thousand of them remained.

Hague, December 8. N. S. Some Days ago Monsieur Buys, one of the Plenipotentiaries of the States-General, went from hence to Utrecht, and is expected back very soon, in order to set out on his Embassy to France with Monsieur Goslinga, his Colleague, who is come hither from Friesland for that purpose. Monsieur Renfwoude, another of the Plenipotentiaries of their High Mightinesses, and Baron le Begue, Minister of the Duke of Lorraine, are arrived here from Utrecht. The States of Holland were assembled on the 6th, to deliberate upon the remaining Difficulties in the Treaty of Peace between his Catholick Majesty and this Republick. Letters from the Rhine bring no other Account of the Negotiations between Prince Eugens and Marschal Villars, than that the Towns of Franckfort, Spire and Basil had been propos'd for Places to treat in.

Windsor, November 29. This day Monsieur le Baron Schutz, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Hanover, had his first private Audience of Her Majesty; to which he was Introduced by the Rt. Hon. William Bromley, Esq; One of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and Conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell, Master of the Ceremonies.
