And We do hereby Declare, That any Person who has been or shall be Inlisted or Entertained for the Service of the Pretender, and shall discover the Person who Inlisted him before any Justice of the Peace, the first Discoverer of every Person so Inlisting, shall have his Pardon for the same. And if the Person who Inlisted him shall be Apprehended and Convicted thereof, then such first Discoverer shall have and receive the Reward of Fifty Pounds for his Service.
