THE following Address from the Colony of Connecticut, was presented to Her Majesty by the Right Hon. the Lord Viscount Bolingbroke, One of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

To the *QUEEN's* most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Governor and Company of Your Majesty's Colony of Connecticut, in New England.

May it please Your Majesty,

WE Your Majesty's most dutiful Subjects, having, in Obedience to Your Command, Proclaim'd the Peace Your Majesty has made with France, humbly beg leave, on so joyful an Occasion, to approach Your Sacred Presence with our most dutiful Acknowledgments of Your Majesty's great Wisdom and Goodness, which have so bright an Appearance in the happy Fruits of this great Blessing to Your People.

In the midst of Your Triumphs over the utmost Force and Power of Your Enemies, Your Majesty has prefer'd the Ease and Tranquility of Your Subjects to those increasing Glories of Your Arms.

While we adore the Favour of Heaven, which has inspir'd Your Majesty's Councils in this great Affair, and crown'd them with a Success so Desirable and Glorious; We come with a profound Devotion to render at Your Feet, our Tribute of Gratitude and Obedience for the tender Regard Your Majesty has therein shewn, to the most valuable Interests and Prosperity of Your People.

This must remain a Testimony to all the World, of the Satisfaction Your Majesty has in the Weal of Your People.

And there is now no greater Blessing for us to wish to our selves, than that Your Majesty may long enjoy the Comfort of so Divine a Pleasure, increas'd by the fervent Zeal of Your happy People, to express, with the greatest Constancy, a most entire Acquiescence in Your Majesty's consummate Prudence, and a most chearful Obedience to Your Government, as the only way to perpetuate so great an Happiness.

For this we make our incessant Vows to Heaven, and are, with a most devout and resolv'd Fidelity, Madam, Your Majesty's most dutiful and most obedient Subjects.

Which Address Her Majesty received very graciously.

Venice, April 13. N. S. Count Provana, late Envoy of the King of Sicily to the Court of Vienna, arrived here some Days ago, and this Morning he set out for Turin. The Magistrate of Health has again reduc'd the Quarantine from Forty to Twenty eight Days for all Persons, excepting those who come from Monteba. Signor Tron, who is appointed to go Ambassador from this Republick to Her Majesty, has taken his Leave of

the Senate, and intends to set out very soon for Great Britain. They write from Rome, that Cardinal Carpegna, who had been Forty Years Vicar of the Popes, died there on the 6th Instant. On the 7th the Marquis de Prie had his Audience of Leave, and was preparing to return home. A Decree of the Inquisition had been posted up in the publick Places of the City, condemning the Pastoral Letter of Cardinal Noailles, as Schismatical, and injurious to the See of Rome. Letters from Naples bring an account, that Count d'Atalaya, Vice-Roy of Sardinia, was embark'd for that Kingdom on board the St. Leopold Man of War. We have receiv'd advice, that Signor Memo, Bailo of this Republick, was arrived at Constantinople, where he was received with the Honours due to his Character.

Hamburg, April 24. N. S. The King of Denmark has assur'd the Emperor's Secretary at Copenhagen, that, in regard to his Imperial Majesty, he will raise the Blockade of this City in a few Days. The Squadron of Norway, that has been expected for some time at Helsingohr, is at length arrived there, and is order'd to proceed to Petersbourg and Riga, in order to take on board the Troops that are in a readiness to embark at those Places. Monsieur Goertz has repeated his Instances with the Court of Berlin to make some Attempt in favour of his Master, and to engage in Measures for putting a stop to the growing Power of the Czar. The Danish Minister at the same Court has already had his Audience of Leave, but he has put off his departure from thence, upon some Suspicions the King his Master has lately entertain'd of the King of Prussia's Proceedings. Count Flemming is return'd to Dresden. During the time of his continuance at Berlin, he was often in Conference with the Prussian Ministers, as well in relation to the Evacuation of Elbing, as upon the Subject of some Proposals that are to be made to the Assembly at Brunswick. It is thought King Augustus will appoint other Plenipotentiaries to the Congress in the room of those he had already named, with whose Behaviour the Czar and the King of Denmark have seem'd very much displeas'd. The Swedish Ministers in the several Courts of Germany have received Orders to complain of the House of Gottorp, for intermeddling in the Affairs of Sweden, without the Knowledge or Consent of the Regency. The Senate of that Kingdom hath likewise sent a Memorial to his Majesty in Turkey, accusing the Ministers of Holstein of having concerted the Sequestration of Stetin with the King of Prussia of their own accord; as also that they had not observed the Engagements they had made with Count Steinbeck, who by the means of their neglect was obliged to surrender himself and his whole Army Prisoners of War. The Ministers of Holstein being inform'd of this Accusation, have drawn up another Memorial in Defence of their Conduct, and have sent it in like manner to the King of Sweden at Demotica.

Hanover, April 24. N. S. Yesterday Mr. Harley arrived here, and to Morrow he is to have an Audience of his Electoral Highness.
