N humble Address of the High Sheriff, Deputy Governours, Justices of the Peace, Grand Jury, Gentlemen and Frecholders of the Queen's County, affembled at a General Affizes held at Maryborough, having been transmitted from Ireland by his Grace the Duke of Shrewsbury, Lord Lieutenant of that Kingdom, was presented to Her Majesty by the Right Hon. the Lord Viscount Bolingbroke, One of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State:

Warfaw, May 5. N. S. The Primate hath received an Answer to the last Letter he writ to King Augustus. His Majesty assures him, that the the Interests of his own Hereditary Dominions, which were to be debated at the Congress of Brunswick, required his Presence, he was nevertheless determined to return foon into Poland; That he had nothing more at Heart than to procure such a Peace for the Kingdom, as would leave it in a Condition to have the Saxon Troops withdrawn from thence without Danger to the Commonwealth: But that in the present conjuncture, while the Nation was perpetually alarm'd by the frequent Changes and Inconstancies of the Ottoman Port, it was by no means safe to recall those Forces, which the Republick had fent for, and maintained hitherto at a great Expence. We have received an account that on the 16th past, Monsieur Pocici was elected Mareschal of the Tribunal of Lithuania. On the 17th the States of the Great Dutchy affembled, and agreed to fend two Deputies to King Augustus, to desire he would convene a general Diet on Horseback, and to represent to him the Exactions of the Saxon Troops, which the Republick was refolv'd not to bear any longer. They have likewise sent three Deputies to the Czar, with Instructions to beg he will imploy his Intercessions with the King to observe the Statutes of Lithuania, as he is obliged to do by his Coronation Oath, and consequently to withdraw the Saxon Forces, not only out of the Great Dutchy, but out of the whole Kingdom. Letters from Podolia confirm our former accounts, that the Turks were affembling a powerful Army near Chocim, and their Preparations give us the greater Uneafiness, as we have receiv'd advice from Constantinople, that the Rebellion in Asia is entirely quelled. A confiderable Body of Coffacks is late. ly returned into Ukrain, upon which a Detachment of the Army of the Crown has been fent to drive

them out of that Country.

Vienna, May 9, N. & The Emperor continues still at Laxembourg, where he holds frequent Councils upon the present Situation of his Affairs. It is said, his Imperial Majesty will not return to this Place till towards the end of July, and that soon after his arrival here he will set out for Presbourg, in order to put an end to the Diet of the States of Hungary, which hath been affembled near two Years. Count Torresini, Envoy of Guastalla, hath received an Express, with an Account, that on the 28th past the Duke his Master died of an Apoplexy, in the Eightieth Year of his Age. Yester-

day Count Goes fet out for Baden, and Count Seilern intends to follow him very foon. Count Wrataflaw is arrived here from Prague, and General Mercy from Lorrain. It is faid, the Imperial Troops, which are now in Bavaria, will be fent into Hungary, and that those in the Diocese of Hildesheim are to march towards Philipsbourg. Letters from Constantinople bring an account, that the Turks continued their warlike Preparations both by Sea and Land, which hath given great uneasiness to the neighbouring Princes and States. The same Advices add, that the King of Sweden had at last resolved to return home through the Emperor's Hereditary Dominions, and that King Stanislaus would retire into France.

Berlin, May 12. N. S. The King continues still at Potsdam, from whence he is expected in a Day or two in this City. His Majesty intends to set out soon for Cleves, and Baron Herreveld is alrea by gone before, in order to prepare Matters for his Reception. Baron Spar continues to hold frequent Conferences with the Ministers of this Court, but it is not yet known upon what Subject. The Regiments of Horse of the Margrave Lewis and Brigadier Blankenheim, are ordered to hasten their March from the Rhine towards this Country. Monsieur Achenback, formerly the king's Secretary at the Hague and at Utrecht, is appointed to be his Resident at the Court of Mustovy. It is said his Majesty hath resolved to publish an Edict, descard those who retired out of this Country for fear of being press'd into the Service, shall be pardon'd if they will return to their Houses.

Brussels, May 20. N. S. Mon sieur Pesters, the Dutch Intendant, is lately gone from hence, in order to adjust some Accounts of the Contributions raised the last War in the Districts of Netz and Cologre, with the Intendants of France and Prussa at those Places. Last Week Major General Sabine came hither from Gand, and Brigadier Sutton from Bruges, to define the Regency would send Directions to the States of Flanders to regulate the Quarters of those Garrisons upon the foot of the preceding Summers, which they have accordingly obtained, and intend to return in a few Days to their respective Commands. this Republick. Yesterday the States sent an Express to the Duke d'Ossuna at Utrecht, with an
Answer to a Letter they received some time ago
from the King of Spain, notifying the Death of his
Queen. They have likewise sent the most Christian
King a Compliment of Condoleance upon the Death
of the Duke of Berry. Last Night Mr. Harley arrived here from Hanover, and intends to embark
for Great Britain in a sew Days.
