Upon Her Death the Lords of the Privy-Council immediately affembled at S.. James's, Privy-Council immediately affembled at S. James's, and gave Orders for Proclaiming the Moît High and Mighty Prince George, Elector of Brunfwick-Lunenburg, King of Great Britain, France and Ireland, &c, His Majefty was accordingly Pro-claimed with the ufual Solemnity before the Gate of His Palace at St. James's, at Charing Crofs, at Temple-Bar, at the End of Woodftreet in Cheap-fide, and laftly at the Royal Exchange. Great Numbers of the Nobility and Principal Gentry affided at each Proclamation and attended in their affisted at each Proclamation, and attended in their Coaches during the whole Solemnity.

W Hereas it hath pleafed Almighty God to call to His Mercy our late Sovereign Lady Queen Anne, of Bleffed Memory, by whole Deceafe the Imperial Crowns of Great Britain, France, and Ire-Anne, of Bieljea Memory, by whole Deceale the Imperial Crowns of Great Britain, France, and Ire-land, are Solely and Rightfully come to the High and Mighty Prince George Eleftor of Brunfwick-Lunenburg: We therefore the Lords Spiritual and Temporal of the Realm, being here Affifted with those of Her late Majesties Privy-Council, with Numbers of other Principal Gentlemen of Quality, with the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Citizens of London, do now hereby, with one full Voice and Consent of Tongue and Heart, Publish and Pro-claim, That the High and Mighty Prince George Eleftor of Brunswick-Lunenburg, is now, by the Death of our late Sourceign, of Happy Memory, be-come our only Lawful and Rightful Liege Lord, George, by the Grace of God, King of Great Britain, France, and Ireland, Defender of the Faith, &c. To whom we do Acknowledge all Faith and con-stant Obedience, with all hearty and humble Affe-dion : Beseching God, by whom Kings and Queens do Reign, to Riefs the Royal King George with Long and Happy Tears to Reign over us.
