*Ratisbon, September 24. N. S.* Letters from Baden of the 16th advise, that the Magistrates of that Town had received and registred several Protections against the Peace lately concluded there; the French Ambassadors having declared to the Imperialists, that tho' they would not receive any themselves, yet it was not fit to hinder those who might think themselves aggrieved by the Treaty, from entering their Protections in a third Place. The Pope's Minister has protested against the Peace of Westphalia, and against the present King of Sicily's Title to that Kingdom, since he is said to refuse to hold it as a Fief from the See of Rome. The Diocese of Liege has made a Protection with respect to the Dukedom of Bouillon, the Duke de la Tremouille, as to the Kingdom of Naples; the Princess of Condé, about the Montferrat; the Roman-Catholick Prince of Nassau-Siegen, about Orange; all the French Families who lay Claim to the Succession of Chaaons, about Orange and Neufchatel: And the like Protections are expected from several others. The Imperial, French, and Bavarian Ministers affirm, that there is no Design of exchanging Bavaria. A Protection will be drawn up here by the Ministers of the Protestant States of the Empire against the Treaty of Baden, as far as it relates to Matters of Religion, which will be kept ready to be entred on Occasion. The Director of Mentz arrived here Yesterday, as some other Ministers did the close of last Week; so that the Diet being now pretty full, will probably enter on Business in a few Days. We have Advices from Vienna which say, that a Staffette was arrived there with Letters from Constantinople of the 27th of August, importing, that the Grand Visier had acquainted the Emperor's Resident, that the King of Sweden would depart the Turkish Dominions about the beginning of October, and take his way through the Imperial Territories. Upon this Notice, an Express had been sent back to Constantinople from Vienna, for a particular

particular account of the Road his Swedish Majesty intends to take, that suitable Preparations may be made, in the Places he is to pass through, for his Reception.

*Paris, September 29. N. S.* The Queen Dowager of Poland arrived the 14th Instant at Nevers, the Place of her Birth, where she was received by the Magistrates in their Habits of Ceremony, the Townsmen being under Arms. Her Majesty set out from thence the 22d for Blois, where she is to reside. The Court continues at Fontainebleau: It has been judged proper to inform the Publick of the Motives which have induced the King to commit to the Care of the Parliament the keeping of his last Will, and of the Solemnity with which the Parliament took upon them that Trust; and this has been done by publishing the Edict, which, together with his Will, his Majesty sent to the Parliament, and their Proceedings thereupon. This Edict sets forth in Substance, that it would have been a great Comfort to the King in his old Age, to have had the Prospect of his Crown's passing after him to the Dauphin his Son, or to the Dauphin his Grandson, whose Virtues and great Abilities had given all his Subjects just Hopes of a wife and happy Government: But having had the Affliction to lose those two Princes both almost together; and the Dauphin his Great-Grandson, who is the Presumptive Heir of his Crown, being so young, that 'tis very uncertain whether he shall live to see him enter into his 14th Year, at which Age his Majority commences; his Majesty thinks himself indispensably obliged to prevent the Disorder and Confusion which might happen in the Kingdom, if against the time it shall please God to call him to himself, he should not have settled the Guardianship of the Minor King, and fixed a Council of Regency in such manner as he judged necessary for the good Administration of the State during the Minority of the King: That however, for good and just Reasons, his Majesty does not think it convenient to declare publickly before that time the Choice he has made of the Persons whom he deems capable of discharging such great and important Employments; but that for accomplishing his Design, he ought to use all the Precautions which Prudence requires. That therefore his Majesty orders, that an Instrument written and signed with his own Hand, inclosed in a Packet sealed with the Arms of France, and annexed to this Edict, be looked upon as his last Will and Testament, and that it be kept in the Registry of the Court of Parliament of Paris till his Decease; that the Moment it shall please God to take him out of this World, all the Chambers of the Parliament assemble, with the Princes of the Royal Family, and the Dukes and Peers of the Kingdom, as many as can be there; the Packet to be then publickly opened, the Will read, and the Contents published and put in Execution. The Proceedings of the Parliament, upon the Receiving of this Edict, terminated in an Ordinance that it should be registered, that as well the Edict itself, as the sealed Packet annexed to it, should be deposited in the safest place of the Registry of the Court, and inclosed in a Chest with three different Locks, one of the Keys to be kept by the first President, another by the King's Procurator-General, and the third by the chief Register of the said Court. The Mortality among the large and lesser Cattle in divers Provinces of this Kingdom has been so great, as to have occasioned the publishing of two Arrêts of the King's Council of State; the one allowing for a time, from the 4th of this Month, the bringing in of foreign black Cattle, Sheep, Swine, and Goats, free of all Duties of Entry, and exempting the Cattle bred in this Country from all manner of Tolls and Imposts; the other permitting the Importation of Butter and Cheese from foreign Parts Custom-free.

*Brussels, Sept. 27. N. S.* The Count de Konigsbeck, the Imperial Minister, has written Circular Letters to the States of these Provinces, to acquaint them that he is empowered by the Emperor to regulate the Barrier, and to settle the Commerce of these Countries, and to desire that two Deputies from each Province may be sent without Delay to Antwerp, to inform him of

what is necessary to be stipulated for them in the Agreement about the Barrier.

*Hague, October 2. N. S.* The four Deputies of this State who are appointed to treat with the Emperor's Minister at Antwerp for settling the Barrier, &c. set out from hence the 30th past.
