

Notice is hereby further given that pursuant to the provisions of the Planning (Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas) Act 1990, the designation of the area in the village of Escrick as a Conservation Area included the extended controls requiring the prior consent of the Local Planning Authority to the demolition of any building within the area and also requires six weeks' notice to be given of an intention to fell, top, lop or in any way damage a tree within the Conservation Area other than trees contained in an existing Tree Preservation Order.

The plan has been deposited at the Civic Centre, Portholme Road, Selby, North Yorkshire, and may be inspected free of charge between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. on Monday to Thursday inclusive and 9 a.m. to 4.30 p.m. on Fridays.

The Boundary of the Elvington Conservation Area

The Conservation Area is centred upon the historic core of the village centred around the village green. Commencing at Rose Dene on the western most point of the defined area the Conservation Area boundary runs as follows.

At the western edge of the conservation area are four new dwellings, Wheatley Cottages and Rose Dene to the north of Main Street and the two properties either side of Becksides on the southern edge of Main Street. Whilst these are modern buildings and therefore of no historic value, they perform an important townscape function in that they constitute the actual perceived entrance to the village.

The boundary on its northern edge follows the rear curtilage of properties fronting Main Street. These include Chequer Farmhouse, Roxby Farmhouse, the Grey Horse Public House, 5 properties and their outbuildings (not numbered on ordnance), Rosedene, Prospect House, Ivy Cottage, Ivy Dene, South View, 2 detached dwellings set back from Main Street, a detached dwelling in its own plot, Nos 1-4 the Larches, a plot of land (reference: BM 10.21m), Elvington House, the telephone exchange, 3 plots of land (reference of one; 7.3m), Derwent House and its 2 outbuildings.

From the end of the Derwent House plot the boundary runs along Main Street to meet the River Derwent at Sutton Bridge. Travelling along the Parish boundary the eastern boundary crosses the footbridge over the River Derwent crossing back onto land at West Carr Masks.

Following the southern limb of the drain where Elvington Beck enters the River Derwent the boundary then follows the northern edge of the field boundary (1636, 2.305 ha, 5.70 acres) until it reaches Church Lane.

From here the boundary follows along the southern edge of Church Lane, crossing the lane to envelope Sycamore Farm and its immediate outbuildings including the doctors surgery. This western boundary continues along the western edge of Church Lane as far as the electricity sub station.

The boundary then follows the rear curtilage of the dwelling behind the Post Office and the rear curtilage of Nos 2-5 The Green to include the outbuildings. Following the rear curtilage of Belvoir House the boundary terminates to the rear of the property to the east of Becksides.
