An humble Address of the Protestants released from the Gallies of France; prefented to his Majesty by the Right Honourable the Earl of Galloway, introduced by the Right Honourable Mr. Stanhope, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Address of the High Sheriff, major part of the Justices of the Peace, and Grand Jury of the County of Hereford at the Quarter Sessions; presented to his Majesty by Philip Jackson, Esq. High Sheriff of the said County, the Lord Coningsby Custos Rotulorum,

Ambastador, Count Gallas, celebrated his Imperial Majesty's Birth-day by a Magnificent Entertainment; the Square of Sant Apostoli, and all the Front of his Palace were illuminated with Torches of white Wax, and an Amphitheatre was erected for the Musick, which was performed by the most excellent Voices, with all forts of Instruments. The Count having invited the Cardinals, and the principal Nobility and Ladies of this Court, their number was too great for the Palace to h ld them all conveniently, and therefore Seats were raifed along the whole Front of the Palace, and were covered and adorned very Splendidly. After the Musick, the numerous Company were ferved with plenty of Fruits, Sweetmeats, and Liquors; and then they removed to a Ball which lasted all Night. A Congregation of divers Car-dinals and Prelates was lately held, to examine whe her there might be any Danger in executing a Grant made to the Prince of Caserta, of leave to sell the Woods of Cisterna; which is contested with him, tho' he has actually contracted with Undertakers, who are to give him four hundred and fifty thousand Crowns. Opinions were different; some arguit g, that as the Ma-lignity of the Air when the Wind is long at South, which occasions Distempers here, proceeds (as is vulgarly and traditionally believed) from the felling of certain Woods in the Pontificate of Sixtus V. which sheltred the City from that Wind; so the like Effects are to be feared, should those of Cisterna (which stand South of this City) be cut down: Others were of a contrary Judgment, and so nothing was concluded, but the Matter was referred to further Examination. The number of the Inhabitants of this City was lately taken by order of the Government, and they were found to amount to one hundred forty three thousand and odd hundred Souls. Some Overture has been made for putting an end to the long Contests with the Neapolitans, about the Nomination to Benefices, and the affigning Pensions out of the Ecclesiastical Revenues in that Kingdom, which the Neapolitans affert ought not to be bestowed on any but Na ives of the Country; and that all Foreigners are unqualified to possess them under any Pretext. The Expedient proposed is, that the Neapolitans should present a Petition to the Pope, in which they should ask of him as a Favour, what they pretend to be common Right, and a part of their Liberties. In the mean while the Sees of Satriano, Melfi, and Catanzaro in the Kingdom of Naples, having been long vacant. the Pope named three Neapolitans to those Bishopricks the 17th Instant. The Duke of Parma has given the Cardinal Acquaviva the full and free use of the Palace Farnele, during his Life. A Courier dispatched from Parma by Cardinal Gozzadini, has brought an Account, that he having given the Benediction to the Queen of Spain, and finished all he had to do as Legate a Latere, has laid down that-Character. Madrid, October Y. N. S. The 27th of last Month the King came from the Palace of Pardo to the Church of our Lady of Atocha, where Te Deum was sung in Presence of the Grandees who had been invited thither, in Thanksgiving for the taking of Barcelona, and of the

Rome, Sept. 25. N. S. The 28th past, the Emperor's happy Issue of the War in Catalonia, where all is now perfectly quiet, some Troops of Miquelets and Volunteers, who were the last that kept the Field and committed great Disorders, having separated, delivered up their Arms, and retired to their Habitations. We have Advice, that the Officers of the Queen's Houshold arriving at Valencia, received Orders foon after to go to Alicant, because that Port is more safe and commodious for her Majesty's Landing than Vinaroz, which was first chosen. However, the Inhabitants of Valencia having made great Preparations for her Reception, they have fent Deputies to the King, to defire him to allow of her Majesty's passing through this City, where they have sitted up the Count de Parsent's House for her to lodge in. An extraordinary Courier is arrived from Parma, an Account of the Queen's being on her Departure from thence for Sestri di Levante, and that the Squadron commanded by General Don Andrez de Pez, who is to bring her to Spain arrived at Genoa the 19th of September. The King for celebrating this News, has ordered Mourning to be laid afide, and Illuminations to be made four

Nights successively throughout this City.

Genear October 9. N.S. The 6th Instant in the Morning came into this Port the Milford a British Man of War, Captain Goodall Commander, and failed again that Afternoon for Leghorne and Messins. He came eleven Days before from Port-Mahon, where he left Sir James Wishart, who we hear has ordered all the King of Great Britain's Ships in these Parts to repair to him at Port-Mahon. His said Majesty's Ships Romney and Kinsale continue here, but will shortly put to Sea for Port-Mahon. The Queen of Spain, who arrived here the 30th past, was so much incommoded by the short Voyage from Sestri di Levante hither, that after her landing she had some Symptoms of a Feaver, but it pass'd off: She was conducted to San-Pier d'Arena by Ambassadors nominated by this Republick to receive and compliment her on her Arrival, and during her Stay a Regiment in the Service of this State kept Guard at the Palace in which she lodged. Cardinal Acquaviva, the Marquis de los Balbases, the Duke de Tursis, the Marquiss de Villamajor, the Princesses of Piembino and Pio, with other Persons of Quality, came with her hither; but while the was at San-Pier d'Arena the chose to keep wholly incognito, and excused her self from admitting any Vifits from the Ladies of this City. To Day her Majesty proceeded from hence by Land, the Cannon round the City making a triple Discharge at her Departure, as they had done at her Reception. The six Men of War and two Gallies which came from Spain to setch her, and the Duke de Turlis's fix Gallies, put off at the same time, and are to keep along the Shore till she comes to the King of Sicly's Dominions, when ('tis faid) they are to take her on Board, and to land her again on the nearest Territories of France; and then they are to make to Toulon, there to wait her Majesty's Resolution whether she will take her way from thence by Sea or Land.

Hambourg Off. 16. N. S. The Emperor has written a Letter to the King of Denmark, in which he earneftly Defires him to restore Duke Charles Frederick of Holstein to his Dominions, which are dependant on the Empire; intimating, That if his Danish Majesty has any Cause of Complaint against the Conduct of the Duke-Administrator

and his Miristers, he may use proper Means to procure; Satisfaction. In the same Letter, his Imperial Majesty preffes the King of Denmark to withdraw his Troops which are now quartered in the Villages belonging to Lubeck. Major General Baffewitz has follicited the Bifhop of Munster to grant the Swedish Troops from Deux-Ponts, Puffige to Pomerania, but has been refused. 'Tis advised from Poland, That the Nobility of the Palatinate of Sendomir, had met at a Rendezvous in order to mount on Horseback, but had separated without attempting any Commotion. Letters from Petersbourg of the 28th of September relate, That the 19th the Czarissa, his Czarian Majesty's Consort, was brought to Bed of a Princess. Ruffian Fleet which returned with the Czar to Cronflot, is to Winter there; 7 other Ships of the Line, and 3 Frigates of the Czar's, are at Revel.

Paris, Od. 20. N S. The Accounts published here by Authority of the Duke of Berwick's Proceedings fince the taking of Barcelona, confirm, That the 16 Battallions which he has put into that Town, are not only lodged for their greater Security in the Monasteries, but those Monasteries are fortifying with Pallisades; adding, that new Batteries were railing on the Ramparts, and turned towards the Town to command it. Sig. del Poal and his Brother were in Cardona when it surrendred on Capitulation, by which the Inhab, ants were affired of their Lives, and of the free and peaceable Possession of their Estates and Effects; but those two Brothers not thinking it safe to rely on tha Capitulation, and attempting to make their Escape by Sea, were stopped, and put under Arrest at Arens de Mar. The other 14 Chief Leaders of the Barcelonians, whom the Marshal Berwick caused to be seized the 22d of September, were carried by a Guar of Granadiers, and put aboard a Man of War lying in the Road of Barcelona, which the Night between the 24th and 25th failed for Alicant, where these Prisoners are to be kept separate from each other. Monsieur de Tourriel one of the Forty of the French Academy, died here the Isth of this Month.

On Saturday the 20th In-Rant the Princess of Wales being informed by the Earl of Berkeley, that the Wind was come to the North East, Orders we e immediately given for the getting all in read ness for her Royal Highness's Departure that Afternoon. Her Highness, after having received the Compliments of the Duke d'Ossuna, as well as of the other Foreign Ministers, and Persons of Distinction, set out about five a Clock for Rotterdam in a Yacht of the States of Helland, accompanied by the Earl of Albemarle, and the rest of the Deputies of this Province; as likewise by the Count of Hanau, and the Countess her Highness's Sifter, Prince William of Hesse, and the Prince of Anhalt-Koeten, who came lately hither to and the meet her Highness. The Earl of Strafford accompanied her Highnels likewise part of the way to Rotterdam where her Highness being arrived, imbarked immediately on the Mary Yacht, and failed at three a-Clock the next Morning. On Sunday about Noon the Yacht got to Sea, and joined the Squadron of Men of War appointed to Convoy her Highness. The States of Holland and West Friescland have ordered another Lottery of six M lions of Florins at twenty five Guilders a Ticket . It h to be drawn on the 3d of June 1715; and in order to encourage it, they have forbid all private Lotteries. There are five Blanks to one Prize, and fixteen per Cent. is to be abated out of all the Prizes. Baron Heems, the Imperial Minister, being returned from Antwerp. was in Conference the 21st with the Deputies of the States General.
