Nothing could have supported us under the unspeakable Loss we have sustain'd by the Death of our late most Excellent Sovereign, but the immediate Succession of a Prince whose Royal Virtues, and declared Affection to our Constitution in Church and State, give us the greatest Assurance of becoming under his Government a happy and flourishing People.

As the Laws we profess and practise instruct us in the Principles of Loyalty and Obedience. so it shall be our constant Study inviolably to preserve our Duty and Fidelity to

your Majesty's Royal Person and Issue, to defend your Majesty's Supremacy, to maintain your Ecclesiastical and Maritime Laws, to assert your Sovereignty of the Sea, and to Support your Majesty's Crown and Dignity among all Nations; and we humbly hope for your Majesty's Favour and Encouragement in this our Profession and Study.

May the Great God grant your Majesty a long and happy Reign over this Church and State.
