#### To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons and Citizens of the City of Dublin, at an Affembly held at the Tholfell of the fand City on the third Day of November. 1714.

W E humbly beg Leave to congratulate your Majefly on your bappy Acceffion to the Crown of these Realms, with Hearts filled, on this glorious Occasion, with such an unspeakable foy as will be better testified by our Duty and Obedience, than 'tis in the Power of Words to delare; your Majefly's Leyal Subjects of this City being highly affected with that Esteem for your Person and Government which is due from a grateful People to the confummate Wislom, Jufice, and Experience of the greatest and best of Princes.

fice, and Experience of the greateft and beft of Princes, When we confider that the Proteftant Intereft of Europe is ftrengthemed, our Fears of Popery and Arbitrary Power diffelled, and our Liberties fecured to us upon fo firm and lafting a Foundation, by your peaceable Accession to the Grown, we cannot fufficiently admire that Providence which accomplished it, nor do Honour enough to the Memory of that Prince, who fettled the Crown in your Royal Family.

We of this City early felt the happy Effects of it, when our Civil Liberties were invaded, our Endeavours to defend them traduced as factious, and our Persons and Reputations exposed to the Insults and Reproaches of the vilest of the People, when the Administration of Justice in this City had been for many Months suspended. and we (for want of Magistrates) reduced to a State of Confusion by the unaccountable Administration of fome Men, who made it a Merit to opprefs us; win this Extremity your Majesty's Royal Justice relieved us.

Stockholm, Odob. 30. N. S. The King's Orders relating to the Taxes, and the furnishing Men for the Regiments which are directed to be made compleat, have not yet been published by the Regency; 'tis thought that they may expect his Majesty's further Pleasure upon his Arrival in Germany; becaufe thefe two Articles feem to be very difagreeab'e to the whole Kingdom in their prefent Circumstances, it was refolved fome time fince to melt down a confiderable Number of Brafs Canon, which were taken by Juffavus Adolphus, and the two last Kings of Sweden in their feveral Wars, in order to coin them into Plates, which is a fort of Money currant here for Rixdollars. But the King not approving that these Trophys of his Royal Ancestors should be destroyed, a stop has been put to this Work, and the Canon which were not already fplit were car-ried back into the Arfenal. However there is about 80000 Rixdollars of this Coin Struck. The King has given ftrict Order for remitting & confiderable Sum of Money to Hamburg forthwith, to be ready for his Majefty's Service when he comes into Germany. This Remittance will be very difficult, especially fince the Bank here, which used to be the Resource on all fuch Emergencies, is at prefent very low in Credit. General Taube has not yet adjusted with the Magi-firates the Settlement of the Winter Quarters for the Troops which were defigned to ludge in this Town next Winter, the Burghers refusing to receive above 1600 Men, Foot Forces. The late Chancellor Count Oxenstierna's House is fitting up for the Recep-tion of the Hereditary Prince of Hesse Cassel, the''tis faid that he is not expected here till next Spring. The French Refident prefented lately a Memorial in his Mafter's Name, demanding Satisfaction for all the Ships and Effects of the French Subjects, which have been feized and confifcated, for offering to go to the Ports in the Baltick now in the Polleffion of the Czar. The 23d being the Birth-Day of the Queen Grand-mother, on which the entred into the 79th Year-of her Age, her Majesty received the usual Compliments upon this Occation.

Warfaw, Novemb. 10. N. S. We are in daily Expectition of hearing of the King of Sweden's Arrival in Germany; in the mean while we are under great Uncertainties as to that Prince's Intentions, and confequently in much Sufpence what turn Affairs in the North, and

King is daily giving Audience to the Deputies of the fe-veral Palatinates of this Kingdom, who all reprefent after one and the fame Manner, the great Mifery of the Country, the Burthen of the Contributions, and the unanimous Defire of the Poles to have the Saxon Troops fent away: The Answer returned to them is in Subftance much the fame as that which was formerly mentioned to have been given to the Palatinate of Sendo-mir, Major-General Goltz, one of the two Ministers whom his Majefty lately had at the O toman Port, arrived here to Day; and the other, the Palarine of Mazovin, is expected to Morrow. The Velt-Maishall Flemming is preparing to go to Brunfwick, to affift at the Conterences for the Peace of the North. Major-General Goltz reports, that the Turks make very great Preparations for War, effectially by Sea, and he fup poles their Delign is against the Morea.

Hambourg, Nov. 20. N. S. The Imperial Ministers at Bruntwick, in a late Conference with M. Rofenerantz the Danish Minister, acquainted him by Order from the Emperor, that his Imperial Majesty has approved the Refolutions paffed by the Diet of the Empire on the following Points. 1. That Holftein ought to be reflo-red. 2. That the Duke of Mecklenbourg ought to be reimbursed the Losses fustained by the Passage of the Danish Troops and others through the Dutchies of Swerin and Guffrow, which by an Accompt taken amount to two Millions of Crowns. 3. That the Loffes fuf-tered by the Towns of Lubeck, Bremen, and Hambourg, from the faid Troops, be made good to each Town respectively. The Danish Minister promised to communicate this to the King his Master. Tis advised from Corenhagen, that the 17th Instant the Swedifi General Count Steenbock was committed to clofe Confinement in the Citadel of that Place; and the King of Denmark's Minister here has received Ordet's to declare, that his Majefty will caufe the Reafons of this rigorous Proceeding against the faid Count to be made publick. 'Tis reported, that on the earnest Instances of General Dukker, the Duke of Mecklenbourg has given Leave for 4 Regiments of Swedes, which are in Pomerania, to pais into his Territories for their more commodious Subfistance, Pomerania being no longer able to fublist fo many Troops:

Ratisbon, Nov. 15. N. S. On the 5th and 6th Infant the Diet was affembled to draw up full Powers for General Roht to take Poffeffion of Fort Kehl for the Empire, the Emperor having nominated him for that Employment. On the oth the Ministers who have the Care of the Affairs ot the King of Great Britain as Elector of Hanover and Dake of Zell, entred a Protesta tion in the College of the Electors, and in that of the Princes. for preferving his Rank as Eighth Elector, and his Office of High-Treasurer of the Empire, which must return to the Elector Palatine, if the Elector of Bavaria should be intirely reftored to the Dignities he formerly enjoyed In a Meeting of the Diet on the 12th the Swedish Minister gave in a Protestation against the plenary Reflitution of the Elector of Bavaria, purfuant to particular Orders which he had received. to fecond the Protestation made in the Name of the Elector Palatine, for preferving the Rights of the Palatine Family, to which the King of Sweden is nearly related. We have no Advice yet of that King's being come into Tranfyl-

fide at the D.et on the Part of his Britannick Majelty, as Elector and Prince of the Empire, arrived here the

Paris, Nov. 24. N. S. We have Advice from Nancy, that on the 12th of this Month the French Troops evacuated that place, and retired to Toul: The fime Day the Duke of Lorrain's Troops entred Nancy, and took Poffifion of the Citadel, and of the Gates of the Town. The Queen of Spain arrived at Montpelier the 7th Inftant, and on the 9th proceeded on her Journey. She takes her way by Toulouse, and St. Jean Pied de Port, to Pampelona. M. Fabius Bruflart de Siliery, B thop of Soiffons, one of the Forty of the French Academy, died here the 20th.

Hague, Nov. 23. N. S. The 21ft Baron Dalwick Minifler of the Landgrave of Heffe Callel, let out from hence for Paris, in order (as is given out) to compliment the French King in the Name of the Landgrave his Matter, on the Conclusion of the Peace between the Empire and France. The faid Minister is from thence to pass over to Englard, by the way of Calais, to Congratulate his Britannick Majefty on his Acceffion t the Throne. Cours Effcren, Minister of the Elector Palatine, waits still for Letters from his Court, before he proceeds to England for the fame purpole. Lieutenant General Cadogan having delivered his Credentials to the States-General, and had two or three Conferences on the Subject of the Barrier, defigns to make a Tour to Amfterdam, and from thence to go back to Antwerp. M. Vander Duffen and Count Rechteren, their High Mightineffes Deputies for regulating the Barrier, having received new Instructions, will likewife fet out to Morrow for Antwerp. We are informed, that the March of part of the Imperial Troops into the Provinces of Limbourg and Luxembourg, is fulpended 'till further Orders, Don Lewis d'Acunha, Plenipotentiary of the King of Portugal, came hither this Morning from Utrecht, and his Collegue Count Tarouca is expected this Evening.
