St. James's, November 19. The following Address from the City of Dublin, was presented to his Majesty by John Eccles Esq; one of the Aldermen of the said City; introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Sunderland, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons and Citizens of the City of Dublin, at an Assembly held at the Tholsell of the said City on the third Day of November. 1714.

WE humbly beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty on your happy Accession to the Crown of these Realms, with Hearts filled, on this glorious Occasion, with such an unspeakable Joy as will be better testified by our Duty and Obedience, than 'tis in the Power of Words to declare; your Majesty's Loyal Subjects of this City being highly affected with that Esteem for your Person and Government which is due from a grateful People to the consummate Wisdom, Justice, and Experience of the greatest and best of Princes.

When we consider that the Protestant Interest of Europe is strengthened, our Fears of Popery and Arbitrary Power dispelled, and our Liberties secured to us upon so firm and lasting a Foundation, by your peaceable Accession to the Crown, we cannot sufficiently admire that Providence which accomplished it, nor do Honour enough to the Memory of that Prince, who settled the Crown in your Royal Family.

We of this City early felt the happy Effects of it, when our Civil Liberties were invaded, our Endeavours to defend them traduced as factious, and our Persons and Reputations exposed to the Insults and Reproaches of the vilest of the People; when the Administration of Justice in this City had been for many Months suspended, and we (for want of Magistrates) reduced to a State of Confusion by the unaccountable Administration of some Men, who made it a Merit to oppress us; in this Extremity your Majesty's Royal Justice relieved us.

May your Majesty long live to enjoy the Reward that is due to those who vindicate the Cause of the Oppressed, and after many, very many Years, may your Memory be transmitted to Posterity under the glorious Character of having been a Father of your People, a Terror to your Enemies, and the Support of the Protestant Interest of all Europe; and may these Kingdoms ever want one of your Royal Progeny to rule and govern them. In Testimony whereof we have caused the Common Seal of the said City to be herewith affixed.

Which Address his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously; and at the same time conferred the Honour of Knighthood upon Alderman Eccles.

An humble Address of the High Sheriff Justices of the Peace, and Gentlemen of the County of Fermanagh; presented to his Majesty by the Right Honourable the Earl of Sunderland, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland.

An humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, Common-Council, Freemen, and other Inhabitants of the Corporation of Liverpool in the County Palatine of Lancaster; presented to his Majesty by the Right Honourable James Earl of Derby, Lord Lieutenant and Custos Rotularum of the said County, attended by several Gentlemen Free of the said Corporation.

All which Addresses his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Stockholm, Octob. 30. N. S. The King's Orders relating to the Taxes, and the furnishing Men for the Regiments which are directed to be made compleat, have not yet been published by the Regency; 'tis thought that they may expect his Majesty's further Pleasure upon his Arrival in Germany; because these two Articles seem to be very disagreeable to the whole Kingdom in their present Circumstances, it was resolved some time since to melt down a considerable Number of Brass Canon, which were taken by Justavus Adolphus, and the two last Kings of Sweden in their several Wars, in order to coin them into Plates, which is a sort of Money current here for Rixdollars. But the King not approving that these Trophies of his Royal Ancestors should be destroyed, a stop has been put to this Work, and the Canon which were not already split were carried back into the Arsenal. However there is about 80000 Rixdollars of this Coin struck. The King has given strict Order for remitting a considerable Sum of Money to Hamburg forthwith, to be ready for his Majesty's Service when he comes into Germany. This Remittance will be very difficult, especially since the Bank here, which used to be the Resource on all such Emergencies, is at present very low in Credit. General Taube has not yet adjusted with the Magistrates the Settlement of the Winter Quarters for the Troops which were designed to lodge in this Town next Winter, the Burghers refusing to receive above 1600 Men, Foot Forces. The late Chancellor Count Oxenstierna's House is sitting up for the Reception of the Hereditary Prince of Hesse Cassel, tho' 'tis said that he is not expected here till next Spring. The French Resident presented lately a Memorial in his Master's Name, demanding Satisfaction for all the Ships and Effects of the French Subjects, which have been seized and confiscated, for offering to go to the Ports in the Baltick now in the Possession of the Czar. The 23d being the Birth-Day of the Queen Grand-mother, on which she entered into the 79th Year-of her Age, her Majesty received the usual Compliments upon this Occasion.

Warsaw, Novemb. 10. N. S. We are in daily Expectation of hearing of the King of Sweden's Arrival in Germany; in the mean while we are under great Uncertainties as to that Prince's Intentions, and consequently in much Suspence what turn Affairs in the North, and

and particularly in this Kingdom will take; Count Virzthum who has been sent by his Polish Majesty to the Czar, will endeavour to remove such Misunderstandings as may have arisen between the two Courts. The King is daily giving Audience to the Deputies of the several Palatinates of this Kingdom, who all represent after one and the same Manner, the great Misery of the Country, the Burthen of the Contributions, and the unanimous Desire of the Poles to have the Saxon Troops sent away: The Answer returned to them is in Substance much the same as that which was formerly mentioned to have been given to the Palatinate of Sandomir. Major-General Goltz, one of the two Ministers whom his Majesty lately had at the Ottoman Port, arrived here to Day; and the other, the Palatine of Mazovia, is expected to Morrow. The Velt-Marshal Flemming is preparing to go to Brunswick, to assist at the Conferences for the Peace of the North. Major-General Goltz reports, that the Turks make very great Preparations for War, especially by Sea, and he supposes their Design is against the Morea.

Hambourg, Nov. 20. N. S. The Imperial Ministers at Brunwick, in a late Conference with M. Rosenerantz the Danish Minister, acquainted him by Order from the Emperor, that his Imperial Majesty has approved the Resolutions passed by the Diet of the Empire on the following Points. 1. That Holstein ought to be restored. 2. That the Duke of Mecklenbourg ought to be reimbursed the Losses sustained by the Passage of the Danish Troops and others through the Duchies of Swerin and Gustrow, which by an Account taken amount to two Millions of Crowns. 3. That the Losses suffered by the Towns of Lubeck, Bremen, and Hambourg, from the said Troops, be made good to each Town respectively. The Danish Minister promised to communicate this to the King his Master. 'Tis advised from Copenhagen, that the 17th Instant the Swedish General Count Sreenbock was committed to close Confinement in the Citadel of that Place; and the King of Denmark's Minister here has received Orders to declare, that his Majesty will cause the Reasons of this rigorous Proceeding against the said Count to be made publick. 'Tis reported, that on the earnest Instances of General Duker, the Duke of Mecklenbourg has given Leave for 4 Regiments of Swedes, which are in Pomerania, to pass into his Territories for their more commodious Subsistence, Pomerania being no longer able to subsist so many Troops:

Ratisbon, Nov. 15. N. S. On the 5th and 6th Instant the Diet was assembled to draw up full Powers for General Roht to take Possession of Fort Kehl for the Empire, the Emperor having nominated him for that Employment. On the 9th the Ministers who have the Care of the Affairs of the King of Great Britain as Elector of Hanover and Duke of Zell, entered a Protestation in the College of the Electors, and in that of the Princes, for preserving his Rank as Eighth Elector, and his Office of High-Treasurer of the Empire, which must return to the Elector Palatine, if the Elector of Bavaria should be intirely restored to the Dignities he formerly enjoyed. In a Meeting of the Diet on the 12th the Swedish Minister gave in a Protestation against the plenary Restitution of the Elector of Bavaria, pursuant to particular Orders which he had received, to second the Protestation made in the Name of the Elector Palatine, for preserving the Rights of the Palatine Family, to which the King of Sweden is nearly related. We have no Advice yet of that King's being come into Transyl-

vania. M. Frischberg, wlb is newly appointed to reside at the Diet on the Part of his Britannick Majesty, as Elector and Prince of the Empire, arrived here the 10th.

Paris, Nov. 24. N. S. We have Advice from Nancy, that on the 12th of this Month the French Troops evacuated that place, and retired to Toul: The same Day the Duke of Lorraine's Troops entered Nancy, and took Possession of the Citadel, and of the Gates of the Town. The Queen of Spain arrived at Montpellier the 7th Instant, and on the 9th proceeded on her Journey. She takes her way by Toulouse, and St. Jean Pied de Port, to Pampelona. M. Fabius Bruflart de Silery, Bishop of Soissons, one of the Forty of the French Academy, died here the 20th.

Hague, Nov. 23. N. S. The 21st Baron Dalwick Minister of the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel, set out from hence for Paris, in order (as is given out) to compliment the French King in the Name of the Landgrave his Master, on the Conclusion of the Peace between the Empire and France. The said Minister is from thence to pass over to England, by the way of Calais, to Congratulate his Britannick Majesty on his Accession to the Throne. Count Effren, Minister of the Elector Palatine, waits still for Letters from his Court, before he proceeds to England for the same purpose. Lieutenant General Cadogan having delivered his Credentials to the States-General, and had two or three Conferences on the Subject of the Barrier, designs to make a Tour to Amsterdam, and from thence to go back to Antwerp. M. Vander Dussen and Count Recheren, their High Mightinesses Deputies for regulating the Barrier, having received new Instructions, will likewise set out to Morrow for Antwerp. We are informed, that the March of part of the Imperial Troops into the Provinces of Limbourg and Luxembourg, is suspended 'till further Orders, Don Lewis d'Acunha, Plenipotentiary of the King of Portugal, came hither this Morning from Utrecht, and his Colleague Count Tarouca is expected this Evening.

St. James's, November 16. This Day Count Gazola had a private Audience of his Majesty, to deliver his Credential Letter as Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of Parma, and to Congratulate his Majesty's happy Accession to the Throne.

Monfieur d'Elorme, Refident from the King of Poland, had alfo this Day a private Audience, in which he deliver'd his Letter of Credence to his Majefty, and afterwards delivering his Letter of Revocation, took his Leave. They were introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Vifcount Townfhend, one of his Majefty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell, Mafter of the Ceremonies.

St. James's, November 17. The Marquis Monteleon, Plenipotentiary from his Catholick Majefty, had this Day a private Audience of the King.

Prince Kourakin, Plenipotentiary from the Czar, had alfo a private Audience of his Majefty.

Count Neftitz, Envoy-Extraordinary from the King of Poland, had alfo a private Audience of his Majefty, to deliver his Letter of Credence. They were introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Vifcount Townfhend, one of his Majefty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell, Mafter of the Ceremonies.
