Madrid, Nov. 12. N.S. Two Days ago the Peace concluded between this Crown and the Sales General of the united Provinces of the Netherlands, was proclaimed here in the usual Places, and in the accustomed Form: But no Illuminations or other publick Demonstrations of Joy were ord red to be made, it being given out that the Ministry will regulate the Rejoicings here according to what shall be advised to have been practised on the ame Occ. sion at the Hague. The to h came Advice of the Queen's having proceeded from Marfeilles on her way hither. Her Aunt the Qu en Dowage hehas Permission to go from Bayone to l'au the Canital of Bearn, to make her Majesty a Visit in her Passige, and tis reckoned her Majesty will arrive at Pumpelons the 20th of this Month. The Duke of Berwick-set out from hence for France the 4th in the Morring; the following Night a Cabinet-Courier arrived from Versailles, with Letters for Monsieur Orry to be communicated to that Duke; wh reupon Monfieur Ory went away the next Morning with all Expedition to overtake him; and on the 6th returned with him hither, The Advices from Catalonia continue to relate that all is quiet there, they tell us likewife, that two Perf ns having been hanged at Manrela, for not delivering up their Arms, but concealing them in Difbedience to the Proclamation issued on that Subject, the People taking warning by their Example, had without farther Delay brought in all their Arme, to which they were besides induced by the Distribution of the French and Spanish Troops into Quarters all over the Country to keep turbulent Spirits in Awe. Prince Tierclass de Tilly entred Barcelona the 28 h of last Month, having been met at some distance without the Place by the principal Officers and Nobility: Workmen were empl. y'd in undermining the Fortifications of that City, which are to be blown up and razed, and a Citidel is to be built with the Materials. The Hopes we had of the immediate Submission of Majorca are vanished; Don Pedro de 1 s Rios, who with & Ships and some Land-forces was fent to Summon that Island and take Possession of it; being returned to Barcelona with Anfwer from the Governor, that he cannot give up his Trust without an Order from the Court of Vienna: Some Advices add, that the Majorcans having applied to the Governor of Port-Mahon for Assistance, were retu-sed, at least 'till the Pleasure of the Court of Great-Bri-tain thereupon be known. The Marquis de Mulazzani, Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of Parma, having made his Master's Compliments to the King on his Marriage, is set out on his return Home. Mr. Burch, his Britannick Majelty's Secretary here, had an Audience of his Catholick Majesty the 10th, being introduced by the Marquis de Grimaldo Secretary of State; and delivered a Letter from the King of Great Britain notifying his Accession to the Throne.
