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*Swansey, Nov. 28.*

**T**He 19th instant, a vessel called the *Success of Llanelly*, bound homewards from France, laden with Salt, and some Wines, was in sight of her Port forced on shoar by the violence of ill weather, within the Bay of *Rosilly*, about 12 miles distant from this place, all the men, except one, by a great providence, even beyond expectation, saved.

*Lisbonne, Nov. 11.* This Court is in daily expectation of the arrival of the Nuncio, designed hither, and of the Popes determination for the confirming of our Bishops. The Count *de Prado*, our Ambassador at *Rome*, being ordered to accept of the Bulls relating thereunto, in the Popes own form; the only obstacle at present is, that though the Pope excepts not against any of the Bishops, he is not pleased to allow the Prince, the power of nomination, but only of Recommendation of such persons as are to succeed in the vacant Sees.

*Cadis, Nov. 16.* The ships expected from *Newfoundland*, are not yet arrived, at which the Merchants seem more then usually concerned, they having staid much beyond the time in which they were expected.

Here lately arrived at this Port a Fleet of about 30 sail of ships from *Smirna*, *Zante*, and *Legorn*: of these 20 Dutch, the rest English, all of them well laden, and bound homewards.

Six Fregats belonging to *Algiers* are said to be lately passed without the mouth of the *Straits*.

*Vienna, Nov. 23.* We are on all hands confirmed in the belief, that the Turks are making great preparations for War, as well upon the Frontiers of this Empire, as in other parts of their Dominions: But that which makes us the less apprehensive of a present disturbance is, That the Princes of *Transilvania*, *Moldavia*, and *Walachia*, have lately received fresh Orders, not to give the least assistance or encouragement to any of the *Hungarian* Rebels, how fair soever their pretensions may appear, or how pressing or importunate soever they may be for protection: But on the other side, this does not make us to secure and negligent, but that the Emperor proceeds with all the precautions imaginable, to put all places upon the Frontiers, into a posture of defence, and to place such Garrisons in them, as may be able to make a stout defence, in case of an attempt; and this the rather, and with greater diligence, since we have advice, That the Grand Visier has given particular Order to the *Bassa of Offen*, to make a progress in person to all places upon the Frontiers, and to fill all his Magazines with all sorts of Provision and Ammunition.

The Turks designs are carried on with much privacy, but their preparations are not to be concealed, they are fitting up 200 vessels, which they call *Londres*, which may fitly serve them for the landing of 20000 men, in such places to which their Fleet cannot so conveniently approach, which gives no small apprehensions to several parts of Christendom lying near the sea.

The Fiscal of the Court of Justice, established for the Tryal of the principal offenders in the late Rebellion in *Hungary*, hath communicated his charge

against them to the Counsellors of the said Court; and ordered Copies thereof to be given to the Counts *Serini*, and *Nadasti*, and to the Marquess *Frangipani*, who, if they please, may have Counsel allowed to plead for them.

The Emperor hath been lately pleased to send an Expreſs to the Bishop of *Munster*, to press him to disband those Forces which he pretends to entertain for the service of the Empire.

The Emperor having intelligence that another Turkish Minister is on his way hither, hath sent to meet him on the way, to enquire whether the Grand Seigneur his Master hath any intention to fall upon *Poland*; and if so, to let him know, that he needs not put himself to the trouble of any further journey.

*Madrid, Nov. 25.* Don *Manuel de Bannuelles*, General of the Gallions, having been accused and found guilty of several misdemeanors, is lately sentenced to pay a considerable sum of Moneys by way of a Fine to the Queen, and to be suspended from the execution of his charge for the Two next ensuing voyages, whereof one is like to be made under the Command of the Prince *de Montefarchi*.

The Duke of *Lorraine* has sent his Credentials, with a Commission to Sir *William Cascart* an Irish Gentleman, and an eminent soldier, at present in this Court, to present to their Majesties an account of the late invasion of *Lorraine*, and to require the assistance of this Crown in order to his Restauration.

An antient Gentleman, formerly residing here with the Title of Secretary from the Duke of *Manhoua*, is now made Resident, and the like Character is conferred by the Duke of *Modena*, upon Don *Pedro Paulo Dini*, Nephew to the Abbot of that name, Resident from the Duke of *Savoy* in this Court.

The Marquis *de Gouea*, Ambassador Extraordinary from the Prince Regent of *Portugal*, about a week since arrived here from *Caramanchel*, where he had made his abode since his first coming into *Spain*, and is entertained for Eight days upon the Queens expence, according to the custome observed to persons of the same Character; which ended, he is to be conducted to his publick Audience.

This last week died Don *Francisco Medrano*, an Auditor of the Royal Council, but his Charge is not yet disposed of.

*Genoua, Nov. 26.* The *Rotterdam* Convoy refusing to salute this Port, had five shot which took place upon his ship, and besides other damage, killed Two of his men, and desperately wounded Six others; The Captain of that man of war, has been since very punctual in the delivery of all the Moneys which he had signified for this place, and treated all those who went on board him with more then Common Civility. Two days since he failed from hence towards *Legorn*, to deliver what Moneys he has committed to his trust for the Merchants of that place. This Republick has dispatch away their Letters to the States of the *United Provinces*, to give them an account of this affair, and till an answer be returned; the Convoy, which is fitting up for *Spain*, &c. will not find it convenient to put to sea.
