## A PROCLAMATION,

For putting the Laws in Execution against Papists and Non Jurors.

GEORGE R.

Whereas of late several Riots, Tumults, and unlawful Assemblies have been in many Parts of this Realm. to the Disturbance of the Publick Peace, and to the Endangering of all Order and Government; and there is great reason to apprehend that the same are very much Promoted and Encouraged by Papists, Non Jurors, and other Persons Disaffected to Our Government, Favourers of the Pretender: And whereas the said Pretender has Published a Traiterous Paper, under the Title of his Declaration of the Date of the Nine and twentieth Day of August last New Style, which hath been dispers'd in many Parts of Our Dominions, and in several Parts of Europe, in manifest Violation of Our Lawful and Rightful Title to the Crown of these Realms: And whereas, by an Act of Parliament made in the First Year of the Reign of the late King William and Queen Mary, Intituled, An Act for the better Securing the Government, by Disarming Papists and reputed Papists, It was Enacted That it should, and might be Lawful for any Two or more Justices of the Peace who should know or suspect any Person to be a Papist, or should be informed that any Person was, or was suspected to be a Papist to Tender, and they were thereby Authorized and Required forthwith to Tender to such Person, so known or suspected to be a Papist, the Declaration set down and expressed in an Act of Parliament made in the Thirtieth Year of the Reign of the late King Charles the Second Intituled, An Act for the more Effectual Preserving the Kings Person and Government, by Disabling Papists from Sitting in either House of Parliament, to be by him Made, Repeated and Subscribed, and if such Person so Required should Refuse to Make Repeat, and Subscribe the said Declaration, or Refuse, or Forbear to Appear before the said Justices, for the Making Repeating, and Subscribing thereof, on Notice to him Given or Left at his usual Place of Abode by any Person Authorized in that behalf, by Warrant under the Hands and Seals of the said Two Justices, he was in and by that Act Prohibited to have or keep in his House, or elsewhere, or in the Possession of any other Person to his Use or at his Disposition any Arms, Weapons, Gunpowder, or Ammunition, other than such Necessary Weapons as should be Allowed to him by Order of the Justices of the Peace at their General Quarter Sessions for the Defence of his House or Person; And that any Two or more Justices of the Peace, by Warrants under their Hands and Seals, by Virtue of that Act, might Authorize and Impower any Person or Persons, in the Day time with the Assistance of the Constable or his Deputy, or the Tythingman or Headborough where the Search should be to Search for all Arms, Weapons Gunpowder, or Ammunition which should be in the House Custody or Possession of any such Papist, or reputed Papist and Seize the same for Our

Use; And further. That no Papist, or reputed Papist so refusing or making Default should or might have, or keep in his own Possession, or in the Possession of any other Person to his Use, or at his Disposition, any Horse or Horses, which should be above the Value of Five Pounds to be Sold; and that any Two or more Justices of the Peace, by Warrant under their Hands and Seals might and should Authorize any Person or Persons, with such Assistance as aforesaid where the Search should be to Search for and Seize for Our Use, all such Horse and Horses which should be above the Value of Five Pounds to be Sold: And whereas by another Act made in the said First Year of the Reign of their said late Majesties King William and Queen Mary, Intituled, An Act for the Abrogating of the Oaths of Supremacy and Allegiance, and Appointing other Oaths. All Persons, who should refuse to Take the Oaths therein directed to be Taken, after the Tenders thereby directed to be made, and should refuse to make and Subscribe the said Declaration in the said Act of the Thirtieth Year of the said late King Charles the Second, should suffer all Pains, Penalties, Forfeitures and Disabilities as a Popish Recusant Convict, and be taken and deemed Popish Recusants Convict to all Intents and Purposes whatsoever: And whereas, in and by one other Act made in the Parliament of Great Britain, in the Sixth Year of the Reign of the late Queen Anne, Our dear Sister, Intituled, An Act for the better Security of Her Majesty's Person and Government, It was Enacted That it should and might be Lawful for any Two Justices of the Peace, whereof One of them to be of the Quorums, with any of the Counties, Ridings, Divisions, Stewartries, Cities or Boroughs within our Kingdom of Great Britain, or any other Person or Persons, who shall be by Us for that purpose specially appointed by Order in Our Privy Council or by Commission under Our Great Seal, at any time or times to Summon and Convene before them all such Persons within the Limits of their respective Jurisdictions, Powers and Authorities, as they should or might suspect to be Dangerous or Disaffected to Us or Our Government and should and might Tender to every such Person and Persons the Oath in that Act mentioned, commonly called, The Abrogation Oath and should at the next Quarter Sessions of the Peace to be held for the County or Place to which the said Oath should be Tendered, certifye the Christian Names and Surnames and Places of Abode, of all Persons refusing to take the said Oath to be there Recorded, and shall be from thence certified by the Clerk of the Peace of such County, Riding, Liberty, Borough, Town-Corporate, or Place within England, into the Court of Chancery, or King's Bench at Westminster, and by the Clerk of the Peace of every Shire, Stewary, Borough or Place in Scotland into the Court of Session there, to be Recorded in the Register or Rolls of the said respective Courts; And if the Person so refusing and certified shall not within the next Term or Session after such Refusal, appear in the Court of Chancery, King's Bench or Session, where such Certificate shall be Returned and in open Court audibly and solemnly Take and Subscribe the Oath aforesaid and Endeave or Enquire his so doing upon the Certificate so Returned shall be from the time of such his Neglect or Refusal Taken, Estimated, and Adjudged a Popish Recusant Convict, and as such shall forfeit and Undergo such Penalties as a Popish Recusant Con-

will ought to do by the Law then in Force within England: And by an Act made in the Five and thirtieth Year of the Reign of Queen Elizabeth every Popish Recusant Convict is to repair to the Place of his usual Dwelling or Abode, and not at any time to remove above Five Miles from thence unless thereunto Licensed according to the Direction of that Act, or of a subsequent Act made in the Third Year of the Reign of the late King James the First: Now for the Preservation of the Publick Peace and for Preventing the like Traitorous Practices for the future, We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to Issue this Our Royal Proclamation hereby Commanding and Requiring all Our Justices of the Peace, and all others whom it may concern, That they do, with the utmost Diligence and Application put the said Laws strictly in Execution against Papists and Non-Jurors, and that they Tender to them the said Oaths and Declaration, and take thereof their Horses and Arms and use their Endeavours to Confine them to their usual Habitations, in such manner as by the said Laws is directed, And that they do also put strictly in Execution all other Laws made against Papists reputed Papists, and Non-Jurors. And We do further strictly Charge and Command all Popish Recusants, Natives and Denizens, who shall be above the Age of Sixteen Years That they do, according to the Statutes in that behalf made, Repair to their respective Places of Abode and do not thence Remove or Pass above the Distance of Five Miles unless thereunto Licensed according to Law; And the respective Justices of the Peace, and others concerned to Execute Our Commands herein, are hereby Required to Certifie an Account of what they shall do, pursuant to the same, to Us in Our Privy Council.

Whereas we have received an humble Application from the Arch-Bishops and Bishops of England, That a Day may be appointed for a Publick Thanksgiving to Almighty God for his great Goodness in bringing Us to a Peaceable and Quiet Possession of the Throne of Great Britain, and thereby Disappointing the Designs of the Pretender, and the wicked Contrivances of his Adherents to Defeat Us of Our Undoubted Right to the Imperial Crown of this Realm and to Subvert the Establish'd Constitution in Church and State: We being well Pleased with this Instance of the good Affections of our People and deeply sensible of this Signal Providence of God which Calls for the most Thankful and Solemn Acknowledgments both from Us and Our Subjects, have thought fit by the Advice of our Privy Council, to Issue this Our Royal Proclamation hereby Appointing and Commanding, That a General Thanksgiving to Almighty God, for these his Mercies be Observed throughout England, Wales, and the Town of Berwick upon Tweed, on Thursday the Twentieth Day of January next, And for the better and more Orderly Solemnizing the same, We have given Direction to the Most Reverend the Arch-Bishops and Right Reverend the Bishops of England, to Compose a Form of Prayer suitable to this Occasion to be Used in all Churches and Chapels, and other Places of

Publick Worship, and to take Care for the timely Dispersing of the same, throughout their respective Dioceses. And We do strictly Charge and Command, That the said Publick Day of Thanksgiving be Religiously Observed by all Our Loving Subjects, as they Tender the Favour of Almighty God, and upon Pain of Suffering such Punishment, as We can justly Inflict upon all such who shall Contemn or Neglect the same.

For a Publick Thanksgiving.

GEORGE R.

Whereas We have Received an humble Application from the Commission of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, That a Day may be Appointed for a Publick Thanksgiving to Almighty God, for his great Goodness in bringing Us to a Peaceable and Quiet Possession of the Throne of Great Britain, and thereby Disappointing the Designs of the Pretender, and the wicked Contrivances of his Adherents, to Defeat Us of Our undoubted Right to the Imperial Crown of this Realm, and to Subvert the Establish'd Constitution in Church and State; We being well Pleased with this Instance of the good Affections of Our People, and deeply Sensible of this Signal Providence of God, which Calls for the most Thankful and Solemn Acknowledgments both from Us and our Subjects, have thought fit, by the Advice of our Privy-Council, to Issue this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby Appointing and Commanding, That a General Thanksgiving to Almighty God, for these his Mercies, be observed throughout that part of Our Kingdom of Great Britain, called Scotland, upon Thursday the Twentieth Day of January next. And we do strictly Charge and Command, That the said Publick Thanksgiving be reverently and decently Observed by all Our Loving Subjects in Scotland, on the said Twentieth Day of January next, as they Tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid his Wrath and Indignation, and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly Inflict on all such as contemn or neglect the Performance of so Religious a Duty. Our Will and Pleasure is therefore, and We Charge, That incontinent, this Our Proclamation seen, ye pass to the Market-Cross of Edinburgh, and all other Places needful, and there in Our Name and Authority, make Publication thereof that none pretend Ignorance. And Our Will and Pleasure is, That Our Solicitor do cause Printed, Copies hereof to be sent to the Sheriff of the several Shires, Stewarts of Stewarties, and Baillies of Regalities, and their Clerks, whom We ordain to see the same Published, and We appoint them to send Doubles thereof to the several Paroch Churches within their Bounds, That upon the Lord's Day immediately preceding the Day above mentioned, the same may be Published and Read from the Pulpits immediately after Divine Service.

*St James's, December 10.* The following Addresses have been presented to His Majesty.

An humble Address of the Freemen and Burgeses of the Corporation of Morpeth in Northumberland; presented to his Majesty by Oley Douglas, Esq; one of their Representatives in Parliament, who had the Honour to kiss his Majesty's Hand, introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Orrery.

An humble Address of the Magistrates and Town-Council of Dumbarton; presented to his Majesty by his Grace the Duke of Montrose, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Address of the Burgh of Kirkcubright; presented to his Majesty by his Grace the Duke of Montrose, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Address of several of the Aldermen, Common-Council, and principal Burgeses of the Corporation of Tenby in the County of Pembroke; presented to his Majesty by Sir Arthur Owen, Bart. introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Pembroke, Lord Lieutenant of South-wales, and Custos Rotulorum for the said County.

An humble Address of the Inhabitants of the Borough of Cirencester in the County of Gloucester; presented to his Majesty by William Masters, Esq;

All which Addresses his Majesty was pleas'd to receive very graciously.

*Naples, November 13. N. S.* Two Jews of Pezaro were some Days ago Myrthered here by two Assassins, who fled for Sanctuary into a Church. The Magistrates placed Guards of Sbirri, jointly with the Officers of the Ecclesiastical Court, at the Doors, and in the Avenues of that Church, to prevent the Escape of the Criminals. 'till Answer should be returned from Rome upon the Information of the Fact which was sent to that Court. The Answer came, and is said to import, that those Assassins ought to have the Benefit of the Ecclesiastical Immunity. Hereupon, the 7th at Night 100 Sbirri, and a like Number of Grenadiers, advanced to the Church-Door, and an Officer who was within causing it to be opened, let them enter, and they seized and brought out the Criminals. Among the Sbirri were some Persons masked, reported to be Officers of Justice, who pronounced Sentence on them, their Prayers having been made secretly, upon legal and clear Proofs of the Murder. They were carried to the usual Place of Execution, and before they were put to Death were allowed two Hours to prepare and confess themselves: Then they were led, one near to the Convent of Nuns of the Trinity, the other towards Christo Grande, and were dispatched with as many Wounds, and in the same Parts of the Body, as the Jews were whom they had assassinated; Thence their Bodies were removed and exposed, one before the House where the Crime was committed, the other before that where the Jews had lodged. This Act of Justice, so extraordinary in the Form and Circumstances, is applauded by all the People, who exceedingly commend the Viceroy and the Collateral Council for it: But Cardinal Rignatelli our Archbishop, has fulminated the Censures of the Church against those who forced the Assassins out of a Place of Immunity.

*Madrid Nov. 24. N. S.* The Letters from Barcelona tell us, that an Order was actually Published there, commanding all Catalians, Arragouians and Valencians, who had sided with the Enemy, and followed them into Catalonia, to depart the Dominions of Spain within ten Days. 'Tis now said, that the new Plan of Administration which was projected, is thrown aside, upon consideration of several Inconveniences that might arise

from its being put in Execution, so that no considerable Change will be made at present any where but in the Government of Catalonia. M. Baraha, who is in great Favour with Monsieur Orry, set out Post from hence the 24th for Cadiz, being appointed Inspector General of Marine Affairs, of Commerce, and of the Customs: He is also one of the principal Persons who have undertaken to erect and furnish Store-houses for constantly supplying and maintaining a Fleet. Last Week a Proclamation was Published, by which the King, as Protector of the Faith, prohibits divers Books that were introduced into the Kingdom with the Foreign Troops which entred it in the Years 1706 and 1710. as being contrary to the Roman-Catholick Religion: As this is a matter that was always reckoned to fall properly under the Jurisdiction of the Inquisition, the Novelty of the Council of Castile's assuming the Cognizance of it in the King's Name, occasions much Discourse.

*Paris, Dec. 15. N. S.* An Arrêt of the King's Council of State, dated the 8th Instant, is published, ordaining, that for the speedier procuring the Advantage which must result to Commerce by the lowering of the Coin to its real intrinsic Value, a gradual Diminution shall be made every two Months, till the 1st of August 1725. when the Louis d'Or shall be finally reduced to and remain current at 14 Livres, and the Crown at 3 Livres 10 Sols. An Express is arrived from Stralsund, with a Letter for the King, notifying the King of Sweden's safe Arrival in Pomerania: The Count de Croissy, Brother of the Marquis de Torcy Minister and Secretary of State, is nominated to go Ambassador to his Swedish Majesty. M. Amelot set out the 10th Instant for the Court of Rome: The King has augmented a Pension, which he already had for Life, with an additional Annuity of 10000 Crowns, and given him 20000 Crowns for his Journey: He is accompanied by M. Terny, deputed on the part of the Clergy. The Duke of Orleans being advised by his Physician to use the Waters of Balaruc in Languedoc, for the perfect Recovery of his Health, which is impaired by a late Fit of Apoplexy, will shortly be going thither. The last Letters from Barcelona tell us, that the French Troops in those Parts, together with 20 Spanish Battalions, are to embark for Majorca, in order to reduce that Island to the Obedience of his Catholick Majesty. 'Tis reported, that Letters from Constantinople by the way of Markeilles give an account, that the French Ambassador at the Port has been used very ill by the Grand Vizier's Order, for having spoken in a Threatning Stile to that Court upon the Armament they are making. The King has given 100000 Crowns to the Knights of Malta; he has also ordered into their Service 100 Gunners and a like number of Bombardiers; and given leave to every Knight, who upon Summons from the great Master of the Order shall repair from France to that Island for its Defence, in case of a Rupture with the Turks, to take with him seven Grenadiers chosen out of his Forces. Letters from Rome of the 20th of last Month relate, that the Chevalier Ferrerri Commander in chief of the Gallies of the Ecclesiastical State, was ordered to give Direction for their being made fit for Service, and for providing them with all necessary Stores, that they may put to Sea in the Spring for Malta. The Chevalier Falconeri was raising the Battalion of 500 Men, which is to be sent and maintained there at the Expence of the Church, and also 1000 Men to be maintained at the Charge of the Order of Malta. From Venice 'tis advised the 24th past, that Directions were given for casting Iron Guns in the Territory of Brescia; and that the Governor was ordered to make Draughts of the most serviceable Men out of the Troops quartered there, which with a chosen number of Gunners and

Bombardiers, are to be sent to the fortified Places of the Morea and of Dalmatia.

*Windfor, Decemb. 9.* This Day the most Noble Charles Duke of Bolton, John Duke of Rutland; the Right Honourable Lionel Earl of Dorset and Middlesex, one of the Gentlemen of the Bed-Chamber to his Majesty, and the Right Honourable Charles Earl of Halifax, first Lord Commissioner for executing the Office of Treasurer of the Exchequer of Great Britain, were severally Installed Knights Companions of the most noble Order of the Garter, in the Chapel Royal of St. George, within the Castle of Windfor, by the most noble William Duke of Devonshire, Lord Steward of His Majesty's Household, John Duke of Argyll, and Henry Duke of Kent Constable of the said Castle of Windfor, Knights and Companions of the said Order Commissioned there-to by the Sovereign, under the Great Seal of the Order with the usual Ceremonies, the Achievements of the late Duke of Beaufort having been first offered by the Knights Commissioners. And after all the Ceremonies in the Chapel were performed in the accustomed Manner, the Sovereign's Commissioners aforesaid, and the new Installed Knights with their Caps and Feathers on their Heads, and their Trains born up by the Children of the Chapel (being preceded by the poor Knights, Prebends, Officers of Arms, and Officers of the Order) passed down the Body of the Church, up the South Isle, and so out at the great South Door, from whence they marched up to the Castle, the King's Kettle-Drum and Trumpets beating and sounding before them all the way to the Passage leading up the great Stairs to St. George's Hall; from thence they went to the great Guard Chamber, where there was a most splendid Dinner provided at the new Knights Charge for the Knights Commissioners, the Officers of the Order, and a numerous Company of the Nobility and other Persons of Quality, who were present on this Occasion; and a Table in another Room was also provided for the Ladies, as others were for the Prebends and Officers of Arms, who attended at this Solemnity. And in the Evening the new Installed Knights gave a Ball and Entertainment at the Castle, where there was a great Appearance of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction of both Sexes.

*St. James's, December 8.* This Day Count Gyllemborg, Minister from the King of Sweden, had a private Audience of his Majesty, to Congratulate his happy Accession to the Throne. He was introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell, Master of the Ceremonies.

*St. James's, December 9.* His Majesty has been pleased to appoint Robert Lowther, Esq; to be Captain-General and Governor in Chief of the Islands of Barbadoes, St. Lucia, Dominico, St. Vincents, and the rest of his Majesty's Islands, Colonies and Plantations in America called the Charibbee Islands, lying to the Windward of Guardaloupe.
