For putting the Laws in Execution against Papists and Non Jurors.

W Hereas of late feveral Riots, Lumults, and unlawful VV Affemblies have been in many Paris of this Realm. to the Difurbance of the Publick Peace, and to the Endangering of all Order and Government; and there is great reason to apprehend that the same are very much Promoted and Encorraged by Papilis, Non Jurors, and other Perfons Difaffe ted to O ir Government, Favourers of the Pretender: And whereas se faid Pretender has Published a Traiterous And whereas we faid Pretender has Published a Traiterons Paper, under the Title of his Declaration of the Date of the Nime and twentieth Day of August last New Stile," which hash been disperse in many Parts of Our Dominions, and in several Parts of Europe, in manifest Violation of Our Lawful and Rightful Title to the Crown of these Realms: And whereas, by an Act of Parliament made in the First Year of the Reign of the late King William and Queen Mary, Inticuled, an Act for the better Securing the Go-vernment, by Difarming Papists and re utad Papists, Is was Enasted That it should, and might be Lawful for any Two of more Justices of the Peace who should know or suspect any Ferson to be a Papis, or should be informed that any 100 or more fusices of trefeace who proma know or fuspet any Person to be a Papis, or should be informed that any Person was, or was suspected to be a Papist to Tender, and they "where thereby Authorized and Required forshwith to Tender' to such Person, so known or su pected to be a Papist, the Declaration fet down and exp effect in an Act of Parlia-ment made in the Thirtieth Year of the Reign of the late King Charles the Second Initialed, Au ACt for the more Distribut Personant. Effectual Preferving the Kings Perfon and Governmen', by Difabling Papifts from Sitting in either Houle of Par-liament, to be by him Made, Reprated and Subscribed, and if fuch Person so Required should Refuse to Make Repeat, and Subscribe the faid Declaration, or Refuse, or Forbe ar to Appear before the fuid Inflices, for the Making Repeating, and Subscribing thereof, on Notice to him Given or Left at his usual Place of Abode by any Person Authorized in that behalf, by Warrant under the Hands and Seals of the faid Two Juffices, he was in and by that Att Pro-hibited to have or keep in his House, or elsewhere, or in the Possellion of any other Verson to his Use or at his Disposition. any Arms, Weapons, Gunpowder, or Ammunition, other than fuch Neceffary Weapons, Orapounder, or Animaticity, other than fuch Neceffary Weapons as should be Allowed to him by Or-der of the Juffices of the Peace at their General Quarter Seffons for the Defence of his House or Ferson, And that any Two or more Juffices of the Peace by Warrant under their Under a Scale by Warrant under their Hands and Seals, by Virtue of that Act, might southo rize and Impower any Perfon or Perfons, in the Day time with the Affiftance of the Conftable or his Deputy. or the Ty thingman or Headborough where the Search should be to Search for all Arms. Weapons Gunpowder, or Ammunition

U/e; And further. That no Papift. or reputed Papift fo re-fujing or making D fault should or might have, or keep in his own Fossession. or in the Possession of any other Person to his Ule, or at his Difpolition, any Horle or Horles, wh.ch should be above the Value of Frue Pounds to be Sold; and that any Two or more Justices of the Peace. by Warrant una der their Hands and Seals might and should Authorize any Perfon or Perfons. with such Affiftance as aforefaid where whe Search Should be to Search for and Seize for Our Uje, all fuch Horje and Horjes which should be above the Value of Frue Pounds to be Sold : And whereas by another Aft made in the faid First Year of the Reign of their faid late Majesties King Williams and Queen Mary, Intitued, An Act for the Abrogating of the Oaths of Sup-emacy and Allegiance, and Appointing other Oaths. All Perfons, who foculd refuse to Take the Oaths therein directed to be Takm, after the Tenders thereby directed to be made, and should refuse to make and Subscribe the faid Declaration in the faid Act of the Thirtieth Year of the faid late King Charles the Second, should suffer all Pains. Penalties Forfeitures and Difabilities as a Popifb Recufant Convict, and be taken and deemed Popish Recufants Convict to all Intents and Purpofes what foever: And whereas, in and by one other Act made in the Parliament of Great Britain, in the Sixth Year of the Reign of the late Queen Anne, Our dear Sister, Inteuled, An ACt for the better Security of Her Majelty's Perfon and Government, It was Ehacled That it should and might be Lawful for any Two Juffices of the Peace, whereof One of them to be of the Quoruti, with n any of the Counties. Ridings, Division, Stewarties, Cuses or Boraughs within our Kingdom of Great Britains or any other Perfon or Perfons, who shall be by Us for that purpose specially appointed by Order in Our Privy Council or by Commillion under Our Great Seal, at any time or times to Sum-mon and Convene before them all , uch Perfons which the Ls. mits of their respective Juri'di Tions; Powers and Authorities, as they should or might suspect to be Dangergus or Disaffected to Us or Our Government and should and migh Ten der to every fuch Perfon and Perfons the Oash in that Act o mentioned, common y called. The Abjurati n Oith and should at the next Quarter Seffions of the Reace to be held for the County or Place in which the faid Oath florld be Tendred, certifie the Christian Names and Simames and Places of Abode, of all Perfons refufing to take the faid Oath to the there Recorded. and shall be from thence certified by the Clerk of the Peace of such County, Ridiag, Liberty, Borough. Town-Corporate, or Place within England. into the Count of Chancery. or King's Bench as Weftminster, and by the Clerk of the Peace of every Shire. Stewarty, Borough or Place m Scotland into the Court of Seffion there to be Recorded in the Register or Rolls of the fais respective Courts; And if the Perfon so refusing and certified shall non wishin the next Term or Seffion after fuch Refusale appear in the Court of Chancery. will ought to do by the Laws then in Force within England 1 And by an AB made in the Frue and thirtieth Year of the Reign of Queen Elizabeth every Popific Recufant Convict is so repair to the Place of his ufual Dwelling or Aboae, and not at any time to rentive above Eive Miles from thence unless thereants Litensed according to the Direction of that Act, or of a subjequent At mille in the Third Year of the Reign of the late King James the Eirst: Now for the Refer Vation of the Publick Peace and for Preventing the like Traiserous Practices for the future, No have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to Iffne this Our Royal Proclamation hereby Commanding and Requiring att Our Justices of the Peace, and all others whom is may con cern, That they do, with the utmost Diligence and Application put the faid Laws strictly in Execution against Papists and Non Jurers, and that they Tender to theth the faid Oaths and Declaration, and take from the Refufers thereof their Horfes and Arms and use their Endeavours to Confine them to their usual Habitations, in such manner as by the faid Laws is directed, And that they do alfo put firitiy in Execution all other Laws made against Papists reputed Papists, and Non-Jurors. And We do further firstly Charge and Command all Popific Recufants, Natives and Dinizens, who shall be above the Age of Sixteen Years That they do, according to the Statues in that bihalf made. Repair to their respective Places of Abode and do not thence Remove or Pafs above the Diftance of Five Miles unlefs thereunto Licenfed accordong to Law; And the respective Justices of the Peace and others concerned to Execute Our Commands herein, are hereby Required to Certifie an Account of what they shall do, purfuant to the fame, to Us in Our Privy Council.

That a General Thankfusioning to Almighty God, for thore his Mercies be Observed throughout England, Wales, and the Town of Betwick upon Tweed, on Thuriday the Twentieth Day of Jinuary next. And for the better and more Orderly Solemitizing the fame, We have given Directions is the Bischops of England, to Comple a Rights Reverend the Bischops of England, to Comple A Form of Prayer faitable in this Occasion to be Viel in all Churches and Onspiels, who other Places of

Publick Worship; and to tale Care for the timely Dispersing of the same, throughout their respective Dioceses. And We do strictly Charge and Command, That the said Publick Day of Thank/giving be Religiously Observed by all Our Loving Subjects, as they Tender the Favour of Almighty God, and apon Rain of Suffering such Pusishment, as We can just y Inflict upon all such who shall Contemn or Neglect the fame.

Naples, November 13. N. S. Two Jews of Pe fara were some Days ago Murthered here by two Af faffins, who fled for Sanctuary into a Church. The Magifigates placed Guards of Shirri, jointly with the Officers of the Ecclefiattical Cours, at the Doors, and in the Avenues of that Church, to prevent the Efcape of the Criminals, 'till Anfwer fhould be returned from Rome upon the Information of the Fact which was fent to that The Answer came, and is faid to import that Court. those Affaffins ought to have the Benefit of the Ecclefia-Itical Immunity, Hereupon, the 7th at Night 100 Sbirri, and a like Number of Grenadiers, advanced to the Church-Door, and an Officer who was within caufing it to be opened. let th m enter, and they feized and brought out the Criminals. Among the Sbirri were fome Perfonsmashed, reported to be Officers of Inffice, who pronounced Sentence on them, their Praceis having been m de fegretly, upon legal and clear Proots of the fur ber. They were carried to the usual Place of Execution, and before they were put to Death were allowed two Hours to prepare and confeis themselves: Then they were led, one near to the Convent of Nuns of the Trinity, the other towards Chaifto. Grande, and were dispatched with as many Wounds, and In the fame Parts of the Bodyn as the Jews were whom they had allallinased. Thence their Bodies were removed and expoled. on before the Houle where the Crime was committed, the other before that where the lews had lod, ed. This Act of Juffice, to extraordinary in the Form and Circumstances, is applauded by all the People, who exceedingly commend the Viceroy and the Collateral Council for it; But Cardinal Pignatellis your Archbilliop, has tulminated the Centures of the Ghurch against thouse who torced the Atlastins out of a Riace of humanism.

St Fames's, Disembers of The following Address have from its being put in Execution. So this no considerable Change will be made at prefent any where but in the Government of Catalonia. M. Baralla, who is in great Favour with Monfieur Qrey, fet out Past from hence the 2ath for Cadiz, being spreinted Isspector Gene-ral of Marine Affairs, of Cummerce, and of the Cuftoma: He is allo one of the principal Persons who have undertaken to creect and furnish Store-boules for constantly supplying and maintaining a Fleet. Last Week a Proclimation was Published, by which the King. as Protector of the Faith, prohibits divers Books that were introduced into the Kingdom with the Foreign Troops which entred it in the Years 1706 and 1710, as being contrary to the Roman Casholick Religion. As this is a matter that was always reckoned to fall properly under the Jurifdiction of the Inquilition, the Novelty of the Council of Caffile's affuming the Cognizance of it in the King's Name, occlions much Dilcourfe.

Paris, Dec. 15. N. S. An Arret of the King's Council of Stare, dated the 8th Instant, is published, ordaining, that for the speedier procuring the Advantage which must result to Commerce by the lowering of the Coyn to its real intrinfick Value, a gradual Diminution shall be made every two Months, till the 1st of August 19 19. when the Louis d'Or shall be finally reduced to and temain current at 14 Livres, and the Crown at 3 Livres 10 Sols. An Express is arrived from Stralfund, with a Letter for the King, notifying the King of Sweden's Iafe Arrival in Pomerania: The Count de Croiffy, Brother of the Marquis de Torcy Minister and Secretary of State, is nominated to go Ambassador to his Swedish Majefty. 'M. Amelot fet out the 10th Inftant for the Court of Rome: The King has augmented a Pension, which he already had for Life, with an additional Annuity of 10000 Crowns, and given him 20000 Crowns for his Journey: He is accompanied by M. Terny, deputed on the part of the Clergy. The Duke of Orleans being advifed by his Phylician to use the Waters of Balaruc in Languedoc, for the partect Recovery of his Health, which is impaired by a late Fit of Apoplexy, will flortly be going thinker. The last Letters from Barcelona tell us, that the French Tro ps in those Parts, together with 20 Spanish Battallions, are to imbark for M jorcas in order to reduce that Island to the Obedience of his Catholick Majelly. 'Tis reported, that Letters from Constantinople by the way of Marfeilles give an account, that the French Ambaffador at the Port has been ufed very ill by the Grand Vizier's Order, for having fpoken in a Threatning Stile to that Cours upon the Armament they are making. The King has given rooobo Crowns to the Knights of Mahas he has also ordered into their Service 100 Gunners and a like number of Bombardiers, and given leave to every Knight, who upon Summons from the great Master of the Order shall repair from France to that island for its Defence, in case of a Rupsure with the Turks, to take with him laven Grenpliers choice out of his Forces. Letters than Rame of the aoth of laff Month relate, that the Chevelier Ferretrin Communder in shiel of the Gallies of the Eccletian state, was or-pered to give Direction for their being made fit for Service, and for providing them with all noenflary Stores, that they may put to Sta arthe Spring for Malta. The The Chevaller Felconieri was raising the Battalioni of 500 Men, which is to be first and maintained there at the Expense of the Church, and also 1000 Men to be mainained at the Charge of the Order of Malta. From Vepice is advited the 24th path, that Directions were girl en for salting Iron Guns in the Territory of Brelen i and that the Governor was ordered to make Draughts of the most ferviceable Men out of the Troops quarterid there, which with a chosen number of Gunners and BonnMorea and of Dalmatia.
