

the diversion of watercourses and the execution of other works on watercourses; use by the Secretary of State in connection with the said construction and improvement of highways and the execution of other works mentioned above; and the mitigation of adverse effects which the existence or use of certain of the highways to be constructed or improved would have on their surroundings.

Proceedings on the draft Scheme and Orders are being taken concurrently in accordance with section 257 and paragraph 20 in Schedule 1 to, the Highways Act 1980.

The Inspector will hear representations from statutory objectors, as defined in (the Compulsory Purchase by Ministers (Inquiries Procedure) Rules 1967 so far as concerns the Order numbered 5 above, and in the Highways (Inquiries Procedure) Rules 1976 so far as concerns the Scheme and other Orders named above. He will also, at his discretion, hear representations from any other persons who may desire to appear and be heard.

Objectors are reminded that the substance of any objection or representation may be communicated to other people who may be affected by it; that it will be passed to the Inspector holding the inquiries; and that he may be required to disclose at the objection or representation and, unless there are special reasons to the contrary, the identity of the author.

The Secretary of State for the Environment and Transport hereby direct that any person who intends at the inquiries submit:

- (a) that any highway or proposed highway to which the draft Scheme or any of the Draft Orders relates should follow an alternative route, or
- (b) that instead of improving, diverting or altering a highway in accordance with any of the draft Schemes or any of the draft Orders, a new highway should be constructed on a particular route.

shall send to the Secretary of State for Transport at the Department of Transport, South West Construction Programme Division, Room 503 Tollgate House, Houlton Street, Bistol BS2 9DJ, not later than 30th July 1992, sufficient information about the alternative route or the route of the new highway to enable it to be identified. Failure to comply with this direction will enable the person holding the inquiries and the Secretary of State to disregard so much of any objection as consists of such a submission.
