Ere are now in the Downs (besides divers others) 12 sail of Dutch Merchant ships, with Two men of war, their Convoys, bound for Spain: his Excellency the H er Van Beverning, their Ambailador to the Court of Spain, who was embasked upon one of the men of war, came this day on shoar, with several Commanders and Masters of ships to refresh himself, intending to take the opportunity of the first fair wind to sail in pursuance of his voyage.

Rome, Nov 26. Yesterday arrived he e the Am-balladors of Obedience from the City of Bologna, who (upon some notice given of their approach) were met upon the way and attended into Town by

a Train of more then Fourty Coaches.

Don Pedro d'Arragon, Viceroy of Naples, defigned Ambassador of Obedience from his Catholick Majesty, has sent hither before him, many of his Horses with the Servants belonging to his tables, and part of his baggage, but will not arrive in per-fon to foon as was expected, He having deferred his departure from Naples, till the end of December. He intends to make his appearance in this City with traordinary splendor and Magnificence, every way fuitable to the Dignity of his person, Character and Employment, attended by a Train of above Two hundred persons, and will continue Two Moneths here, and afterwards to return home for spain, where he is defigued to one o' the Three Charges, either of Governor to the young King, Great Ma ster of the Houshold, or Moster of the Horse, befide the Command as Colonel to the Regiment of

This last week was held a long Congregation about the affairs of Portigal, which were ther de bated much to the sati section of their Amball d r, and tis beli ved the Pope will find an expedient to satisfy the Pri ce Regent in the Confi mat on of i the Bishops nominated for the succession in the so long vacant Sees of that kingdom. This Congregar on ending a Courier was imm diat ly dispatche to Segnior Ravizza, to order him to go forwards on his way for Lisbonne, where he is to aviear with the Character of the Popes Nuncio.

The Extraordinary Ambassad r rom Savoye has not yet taken his leave, nor do we hear any thing as yet of the departure of the Fl rence Ambassador Extraordinary, which tis supposed, depends upon the return of the Couriers, which both those M ni-flers have la ely sent to the Princes their Mast rs, to give them accounts of the late disputes between

them in point of precedency

The Savoye Ambassador has not yet been admitted to an Audience from the Pope, fince his retufal to take out a Brief of Absolution from the Excommunication he incurred for thelate breach of the peace, in which refulal he yet perfifts, though the Commander Solari has strongly pressed him to a compliance in that, upon the account of Religion.

Cardinal Cerry is gone to exercise his Charge as Legate, to Urbin. and Cardinal Buon compagno, to his Archbishoprick of Bologus.

In Naples, the whole City is full of joy upon the arrival of a Courier from herce, bringing them the news of a Decree passed by the Pope in Congregation, for the Canonization of a ne Saint, Cajetan. for whom they have a great veneration, he being one of the Protections of that City; upon which occasions the Vicercy, with all the Councils Royal, met the 16 h instant in the Great Church of Si Paul, where Te Deum was sung with excellent Musick, and at the same time all the Great Guns were fired from the feveral Forts, and the Foot, who were drawn up

in divers Battalions, gave several volleys of shot.

Madrid, Nov. 26. His Excellency the Marquis de Gouea, Ambassador Extraordinary from the Prince Regent of Portugal, is now Treated upon the account of his Catholick Majesty, which according to the custome of this place, to persons of his Character, is to continue for Eight days, after which he is with the usual Ceremony to be conducted to his folemn Audience. The Count de Humanez has at the lait accepted of the employment, as Ambassador to the Prince of Portugal, in order whereunto he is making due pr paration, and may in few days be in readiness to set forwards on his way towards Lis-

Tis not yet certainly known who is to succeed in the Vice Royalty of Gallicia, the Option whereof has been given to Alexander Prince of Parma, who is not yet resolved, whether it be his interest to accept of that Charge, and to leave that which he has long enjoyed, of Lieutenant-General of the Horle.

The Marquis Corsini, Envoye from the Great Doke of Tuscans, has this day had his last Audience, to take his leave of their Majesties in order to his return home; he seems much satisfied with his entertainment in this Court; he was the last week very liberally entertained by the Archbishop of Tlolouse, the French Ambassador Extraordinary, and after dinner diverted with a Com dy.

The Bull-Feasts, and other sports, intended for the diversion of h s Majesty and the Court, are deferr d, by reason of the hadnes of the weather

The Queen has been lately pleaf d to confer the Honour of Counts of Cast. lle, upon several persons, a nongli whom are Dom Pedro Fernandez del Campo, Dom Maria Ronquillo, Dom Sarmiento 2 Nephew to the Inquisitor-General, and Dom Fernando de

The Constable of Custille has lately made a Prefent to his Majesty, of a little Coach, very artificially made of Silver, and richly furnisht, drawn by Six little black horf's excellently shap d, and Three Dwarfs, Two whereof seive in the place of Coachman and Postillion; and what added much to the Present, the Coach was filled with several sorts of Rarities and Cur ofities.

Verlice, Dec. 6. Our Letters from the Levant inform us, that the plague is much abated in all parts of the Turkish Dominions, which encourages the Turks to fit up their broken Army, and return againto the management of their Trade, to repair the loffesthey received, not only by this years infection, but by the longer interruption occasioned by the late wars with this Republick.
