*Vienna, May 15.* The 13th Instant being appointed for Prince Eugene of Savoy's giving publick Audience to Ibrahim Aga, his Highness's Coach ferched that Envoy from his Lodgings, a Chiaia on Horseback preceded the Coach, carrying in his Hands the Credential Letter; and the Aga's Retinue attended about the Coach, some on Horseback others on Foot: The March was begun by a Company of Soldiers of our Garrison, and closed by another. The Aga arriving at the Prince's House, was received at the top of the Stairs by two Commissaries who complimented him on the part of his Highness in the German Language, and he answer'd them in Turkish, an Interpreter assisting. Then the Chiaia passed forwards, carrying the Credential Letter, two other Turks walking by him; and the Aga supported by two of his Retinue and preceded by the Interpreter, was conducted by the Imperial Commissaries to the Hall of Audience. The Rooms through which he passed being filled with General Officers and other Persons of Distinction all in magnificent Habits. Prince Eugene, who was sitting in an Elbow Chair under a Canopy of Crimson-Velvet, rose up at the Aga's Approach and stood uncovered while he made his Bows, and then sat down with his Hat on. The Aga took the Letter from the Chiaia, kissed it, laid it to his Forehead, and then with a low Bow presented it to his Highness, who gave it to M. d' Ertel Counsellor of War. The Aga at the Prince's Invitation sat down on a Chair, and after a short Conference which they held together by help of the Interpreter, he withdrew, and was reconducted to his Lodgings in the same manner. Stores of Artillery and Ammunition, and Horses for remounting the Cavalry, continue to be sent to Hungary, and a number of Masons are sent to work on the Repair of the fortified Places.

*Ratisbon, May 20* Count Metternich the King of Prussia's Minister is on his Departure for Vienna, having received by the last Post from Berlin his full Powers and Instructions for the Affairs which he is charged with to the Imperial Court, where he is to receive the Investiture of the Electorate of Brandenburg. Letters from Buda of the

10th of this Month give an Account, That a considerable Number of heavy Pieces of Cannon was arrived there by Water, but without Carriages, on which Men were set to work with all Diligence; and a Detachment of 2000 Men from several Regiments was soon expected, to be employed on the Repair of the Fortifications of that Place. 'Twas advised the 2d Instant from Peterwaradin, that the Sultan and Grand Vizier were on their March to Adrianople, and that the Aga of the Janisaries was advanced before with a Body of Troops towards the Morca. They propose to open the Campaign by the Siege of Napoli di Romania, and their Fleet is to advance thither to favour the Attempt. The Turks on the Frontiers of Hungary behaved themselves very Peaceably and Friendly, and no new Troops were yet come into the Neighbourhood of Belgrade. 'Tis advised from Vienna, that the Lord Cobham having had Audience of Leave of their Imperial Majesties on the 12th Instant, left that Court the 16th, and is on his Return to England by the way of Strasbourg and Paris.

*Hague, May 28.* On the 24th Instant a Letter was sent by Direction of the States-General to Rear-Admiral de Veth, with Orders to put to Sea for the Baltick, and Instructions for his Conduct there. He had with him at that time in the Texel nine Men of War, being the Quota furnished by Amsterdam and by North Holland: Two other Men of War, furnished by the Chamber of Admiralty of the Maese, and one from Zealand, have since sailed with the Merchant Ships bound from those Parts to the Baltick, to join the others in the Texel: But we have no Advice yet of this Fleets being all joined and sailed.

William Falkner and Whitlocke Bullstrode, Esqs; to be Commissioners for carrying on, finishing and adorning the Cathedral Church of St. Paul London.
