St. James's June 24.

THE following Addresses having been transmitted by Robert Hunter, Esq; Governour of New-York and New-Jersey, were presented to his Majesty by the Right Honourable James Stanhope, Esq; one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Address of the Grand-Jury for the City and County of New-York in America, assembled at the Supreme Court of Judicature held in the said City on the 13th Day of October 1714.

An humble Address of the Justices of the Peace, Sheriff and Grand Jurors of the City and County of New-York at Quarter Sessions held for the said City and County in America.

An humble Address of the Governour and Council of the Province of New-York in America.

An humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen and Assistants of the City of New-York in the Province of New-York in America, conven'd in Common Council.

Which Addresses his Majesty was pleas'd to receive very graciously.

At the Court at St. James's, June 17, 1715.

His Majesty having been pleas'd to appoint the Right Honourable Richard Earl of Burlington, Lord Lieutenant of the East-Riding of the County of York; his Lordship this Day took the Oaths appointed to be taken instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy.

This Day by his Majesty's Command Daniel Harvey, Esq; Lieutenant-General of his Majesty's Forces, was Sworn Governour of his Majesty's Island of Guernsey.

This Day James Vernon, Jun. Esq; was Sworn one of the Clerks of his Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council in Ordinary.

St. James's, June 21. This Day Patents passed the Great Seal appointing the Right Honourable Richard Earl of Burlington Custos Rotulorum for the North Riding in the County of York. As also For the West-Riding in the said County.

St. James's, June 23. This Day the Marquis Rinuccini, Envoy Extraordinary from the Grand Duke of Tuscany, had a private Audience of Leave of his Majesty; to which he was introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell, Master of the Ceremonies.

He was afterwards conducted to their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales, by the Master of the Ceremonies.

His Majesty has been pleas'd to appoint the Right Honourable Richard Earl of Burlington to be High Treasurer of the Kingdom of Ireland.

Barcelona June 8. The Negotiations for an Accommodation with the People of Majorca having not been brought to a good Conclusion, an extraordinary Courier arrived here the 4th Instant from Madrid, with Orders for the Fleet to Sail on the Expedition so long intended against that Island; and 'tis believed it will put to Sea on the 11th or 12th. It consists of 300 Sail, including the Men of War and the 6 Gallies of Spain. 12 Battalions of French, 12 of Spaniards, and 1000 Horses, with Gunners, Bombardiers and Miners are imbarking; and will be followed by 20 other Battalions, half French half Spaniards: All these Forces are commanded in chief by Lieutenant-General Hasfeld. The Majorcans have made all possible Dispositions for their Defence, having placed Cannon on Redoubts and Intrenchments thrown up at those Parts of the Island which are of easiest access for landing a number of Men. They are reported to have 800 Horse or Dragoons of regular Troops, with some regular Foot, and to have armed all their Militia.

Venice, June 14. 'Tis advis'd from Naples, that the Launceston a British Man of War, Captain Pooley Commander, which lately came thither from Port-Mahon to take Provisions, is sail'd again for Minorca; as also that the Blake Galley was sail'd for Alicant, the Sultan for Tunie, and the Amelia for London. We have an Account from Rome, that General Marsilii had been ordered by the Pope to retire to Bologna, and to confine himself to his own House there till his Holiness's further Pleasure be signified to him. That General was intrusted with the Distribution and Command of the Troops sent to Sinigaglia, and other Places on the Coast, for opposing the Corsairs who might attempt to land, as they lately did near Loretto: But going to Ancona, he happened to have a great Contest with Monsignor Stampa the Governour, who is a Prelate of a noble Family of Milan; high Words and mutual Threats pass'd between them; and the Pope being inform'd of the whole Dispute, has disgrac'd the General. Last Night died at Padoua the Procurator Giustiniani, who was formerly Bailo from this Republick at Constantinople; to morrow the Senate will proceed to the Choice of a Procurator in his room.

Francfort, June 20. Letters from Swisserland of the 16th Instant advise, that the Count du Luc had notified to the Canton of Berne, the Renewal of the Alliance between the King of France and the Roman Catholick Cantons, offering to communicate the Treaty to the Regents of Berne by one of his Secretaries if they desired it, and adding that the King his Master had very much at Heart the seeing Peace and Tranquility re-established in Swisserland. The Regents of Berne returned Answer in very obliging Terms to the Count's Notification and Offer, adding that since the Roman Catholick Cantons had thought fit to renew their Alliance with France, without communicating any thing of it to the Protestant Cantons, the latter did not concern themselves much about it; that however, if the Count was dispos'd to let them the said Regents of Berne see it, they desired to have it in Writing, to the End they might communicate it to the other Protestant Cantons; they concluded by expressing some Surprize at the Care and Concern his most Christian Majesty is under for the Re-establishment of the Peace and Tranquility of Swisserland; since they have been some Years settled by the Peace concluded between the Parties who were at Variance, to the Articles of which Peace they the said Regents of Berne were determin'd to adhere inviolably. 'Tis advis'd from Geneva, that the King and Queen of Sicily were suddenly expected at Thonon, a small Town in the Chablais on the Side of the Lake of Geneva, there to reside for the Benefit of the Air during the Summer Heats.

Ratisbon, June 24. The Count du Luc, Ambassadour of the French King in Swisserland, is expected here in a few Days, in his Way to Vienna. The Count de Gergy, appointed to reside here as Plenipotentiary of France, will not come till the End of next Month. M. Fuchs, Brother-in-Law to the Bishop of Wurtzbourg, and to Count Mollard at Vienna, is design'd to be the Imperial Commissary in the Circle of Lower Saxony, in the room of Count Schonborn, who is made a Cardinal.

Paris, June 29. The Prince de Cellamare, Ambassadour Extraordinary from the King of Spain, arriv'd here on the 19th Instant; and on the 22^d he went to Marly, where he had a private Audience of the King. He presented to his Majesty the Marquis de Miraval, who came with him from Madrid, and is to proceed to the Hague in the Quality of Ambassadour of Spain to the States General.

Hague, June 28. The States of the Province of Holland and Westriseland met again on the 25th Instant, and having dispatched several Affairs that lay before them, will ('tis said) end their Session to Morrow. The Reform of the Forces of this State, is voted by the Pro-
