Westminster, July 23.

HIS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers; and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne, with the usual Solemnity, Sir William Oldes, Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

An Act to empower his Majesty to secure and detain such Persons as His Majesty shall suspect are conspiring against His Person or Government.

Brussels, July 20. The Marquis de Miraval, Ambassador of Spain to the States General, arrived here some Days ago from France, and proceeded on his Journey to the Hague. He was not received here with any Ceremony, but at Mons (where there is a Dutch Garrison) he was saluted with Cannon, and had Sentinels placed at his Door. He had also Sentinels at Antwerp, by M. Vandenberg's Orders to the commanding Officer of the Dutch Battallion there. Count Maldeghem returned hither last Night from having demanded the Subsidy of the States of Flanders, and there is ground to hope that those States will give a Supply proportioned to the Necessities of the Service: They have already promised to accept the Assignments made to those who have advanced the three Months Pay which they are in Arrear to the Walloon Troops on their Repartition, and this will encourage those Persons to give those Troops Credit for their further Subsistence.

Hague, July 26. The Marquis de Miraval, Ambassador of Spain, being arrived here, made his Visits on the 22d to the great Pensionary and to the President for this Week of the Assembly of the States; and has delivered his Credentials.
