#### Westminster, August 2.

IS Majefty came this Day to the Houfe of Peers; and being in His Royal Robes feated on the Throne, with the usual Solemnity, Sir William Oldes, Gentleman-Ufher of the Black Rod, was fent with a Meffage from His Majefty to the Houle of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the Houfe of Peers. An humble Address of the Deputy Licutenants of the City and County of No w ch; preferted to his Majefty by Waller Bacon, Efq; one of th ir Reprefencatives in Parliament, introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Vifcount Townshend, one of his Maje 'y's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder, Alde men, Sheriffs, Common Council and Citizens of the antient and loyal City of Cheffer, presented to his Majesty by Sir Henry Bunbury, introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Cholmondeley, Lord-Lieutenant of the faid City.

An humble Address of the Justices of the Peace, Gentlemen Heretors and Commissioners of Supply for the Shire of Stirling, met the 28th of July 1715.; prefented to his Majefly by his Grace the Dake of Montrofe.

Which Addresses bis Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Stackholm, June 25. O. S. Admiral Lillie who had been appointed to cruize with his Squadron near Hangudd on the Coast of Finland, in order to observe the Motions of the Muscovites, received lately the King's Infiructions to quit that Station, and accordingly on the 14th he arrived with the Ships under his Command at Carlscrona, and immediately fet all hands to work Night and Day to fit out what Ships remained in that Port, fo that it is reckoned when he gets his whole Fleet to Sea, it will confift of 21 Men of War; there was fo great a fcarcity of Men to put on board these Ships, that not only three Regiments of Soldiers were taken to fupply the place of Seamen, but all the Fishermen and Peasants along the Coast in the Neighbourhood of Carlicrona were forced \* into the Service on this occasion. The King has lencies M. van Duvenvoirde and van Borsele, given the Command of this Fleet to Admiral Claes Sparre. Some Days ago the Muscovite Ge-

The laft Mail from Stralfund brought the King's Orders to his Attorney-General to take back from the feveral The laft Mail Senators the Articles of Accufation which he had delivered to each of them in his Majesty's Name, that they might return their Anfwer, fo that it is now expected that there will be no further Proceedings in that Bufinefs.

From the Camp before Stralfund, August 3. The Pruffian Troops have not only poffeffed themfelves within these few Days of the Town and Castle of Wolgast, but have likewise attacked successfully the Island of Usedom. Two thousand Foot under General Arnheim, and some hundreds of Dragoons were imbarked near Wollin at 3 in the Morning in Imall Boats; but they were forced to Iwim their Horfes over. As foon as those Troops had landed, they were opposed by 600 Swedes in a square Battalion, who received them with a very great Fire; but the Prussian Dragoons breaking in among them, defeated them, and most of them fled with Precipitation towards the Fort of Penemunde, leaving behind them their Cannon which were placed on Redoubts at certain Diffances. The King of Sweden, as the Peafants report, was perfonally in this Action; but observing the uccess was like to be against him, he encouraged his Men to make a desperate Desence, and then etired to the Fort of Penemunde. Thus we became Masters of all the open Country of the Island of Uledom, 130 Swedes being killed and 43 made Prisoners. The Prussians lost between 50 and 60 Men, among them a Major and a Captain killed, and 17 Horses. Preparations are making for at-tacking the Fort of Penemunde. The Swedistr Prisoners and Deferters report, that his Swedish Majefty being with General Meyerfeld in a Shal-1 p, to fae the Danish Squadron under M. Sche-fledt cannonaded, that General was killed with a Cannon Ball. P. S. General Arnheim has fent Advice, that he has taken 300 Men more, who, endeavouring in small Parties to retire into the Fort of Penemunde, were intercepted. The taking of Usedom is the more advantagious to us, because the Swedes are now prevented from attack-

ing M. Sehefledt's Squadron in the Rear. Paris, Mugu/t 9. The Duke of Ormond came Paris, Augult 9. The Duke of Ormond came to this Place on Wednefday last from Dieppe, where he landed the Sunday before with one Renauld his Domeflick Servant. The next Day after his Arrival he dined with the Marquis de Torcy, and the Day following with the Duke d'Aumont : A great many People of Quality came from Marli to Paris to wait upon him; as did also the Marshal Duke of Berwick from his Houfe rear Clermont. He hath taken no Notice of the King of Great Britain's Minister at this Court. He went to the Opera with the Duke d'Aumont, and he and my Lord Galmoy fupt that Night at the Vifcount Bo-lingbroke's: And this Day the Duke of Ormond and the Lord Bolingbroke are to dine at the Duke de Laufun's with the Marshal of Berwick.
