Stockholm, August 2. O. S. The Prince of Hesse finding that the Country suffered much by keeping the several Regiments which compose the Army encamped in one Body, has cantoned them all except three in different places at some Leagues di ance, yet in such a manner that they may be drawn together in a short time. His Highness keeps a ma ificent Table in the Camp, and has his Head-Quarters at a Place called Finotr. A Muscovite Galley which brought Major-General Horn, formerly Governor of Narva, with seve-ral other Swedish Oshcers, Prisoners in Russia, under pretence of exchanging them, has been fiezed with the whole Crew, by reason that ha-ving cruised along the Coast some Days before, is seemed as if the said Galley came to spy and get intelligence, rather than to exchange Prisoners. Those Officers report, that the Ezar has at least 20000 Foot quartered in the Neighbourhood of Abo, and that there are a great number of Galles, and feveral Men of War lying ready near that Town, from whence they conclude that the Muscovites will soon make some Descent, and it is believed their first Attempt will be upon the Island of Gotlard.

Stralfund, August 6. O. S. On the 3d Instant arrived here Major Bodenbroke, being dispatched from the Swedish Fleet, with an Account of the late Engagement at Sea; importing, that the Danish Fleet having the Wind came full sail up with the Swedes, who had disposed themselves in a Line of Battle, and lay ready to receive them: The Fight began about 1 a Clock in the Asternoon, and lasted till near 8 at Night, when both Fleets ceased cannonading, and the Danes returned to the Coast of Rugen, the Wind not serving then to carry them homewards: About two Hours after the Danes were gone, the Wind proving fair for the Coast of Sweden, the Swedish Fleet expecting some Transports with Provisions from thence, took that Opportunity to go to meet them. The said Major relates, that the Ship is which he was received in her Hull above 200 Cannon-ball; that the Swedish Admirals Lillie and Henek were killed, and Vice-Admiral Ankerstierna wounded; and that the Fleet will return hither as foon as the Ships are repaired, and the Sick and wounded (of which there was a great number) disposed

in the Evening Trenches were opened before the Fort of Penemunde; Barreries were raifed the same Night, and began to fire on the 19th. On the arst in the Morning a Detachment of 1000 Pruffians and Saxons, commanded by Colonet Liebe, stormed the Fort Sword in hand; the Swedes received them with great Bravery, and the Dispute was very obstinate and bloody for 3 Hours; but in the End the Place was casried, the Garrison consisting of 400 Swedes being put to the Sword, except 90 who were made Prifoners of War, with the Loss of about 400 of the Beliegers killed or wounded, among them several Officers: The Swedish Lieutenant Colonel Kuse, who commanded in the Fort, and the Major named Charac, were both killed. The Swedish Commisfary General has written to the Danish Commissary, that the King his Master will no longer hold himself obliged to observe the Cartel formerly made between the two Nations. M. Lintelo, Minister of the States General of the United Netherlands, has at length obtained Leave of the Kings of Denmark and Prussia to go into Stratsund for one Day. We have Advice, that the Danish Squadron commanded by Vice-Admiral Scheftedt, has been joined by another Prame carrying 48 Guns, as also by 3 Gallies and several Iransports; and that on the 25th or 26th Infant he will attempt to force his way through the Passage called the New Deep, in order to facilitate the Attack of the Island of Rugen.

Whitehail, August 22. On Saturday last arrived from Calais a Gentleman fent by the Earl of Pewith such Parsiculars as had been written thither from Paris concerning the French King, viz that finding he was drawing to his End, he had appointed the Duke of Orleans to take on him the Regency immediately after his Decease, made several Dispositions relating to the young Dauphin his Successor, and died on the 27th

London, August 16. This Day Signor Tron, Ambassador in Ordinary from the most serene Republick of Venice, made his Publick Entry. He was received at Greenwich by the Earl of Bristol and Sir Clement Cottrel Matter of the Ceremomonies, accompanied by the Gentlemen of his Ma-jesty's Privy Chamber. From thence he was brought by Water, together with all his Train, in his Majesty's Barges to the Tower: At his landing he was received by the honourable Hatton Compton Lieutenant of the Tower; and the Guard being drawn out upon the Wharf faluted his Excellency as he pailed by. The Royal Standard was display'd upon this Occasion, and the Guns were fired as foon as his Excellency was gone off the Wharf. From thence they moved on in the following manner. The Earl of Brillol's Coach, 16 of the Ambassador's Footmen walking two and two, & Pages, and the Gentleman of the Horse mounted on Horse-back; then came the King's Coach of State, in which was the Ambassador, the Earl of Brittol, the Master of the Ceremonies, and the Secretary of the Ambassy; this was followed by another of the King's Coaches, as was that by one of his Royal Highnesses the Prince of Wales, in these came the 6 Gentlemen of the Privy Chamber; afterwards came 3 of his Excellencies Coaches, the first drawn by 8 Horfee, which were followed by a numerous Train of Coaches of the Nability and Gentry, with 6 Horses each. Thus they proceeded to his Excellency's House in St. James's Square, where the Earl of Bristol sook his Leave: Soon after came the Lord Saunderson with his Majesty's Compliment of Welcome to the Ambassador; as did the Lord Harvey, Gentleman of the Bedchamber to his Royal Highness in waiting; and Mr. Pulteney Vice-Chamberlain to her Royal Highness, both sont

ed by his Majeity for the publick Audience of his be regularly proceeded against; and the said Per-Excellency Signor Tron, Ambassador in Ordina-ry from the most Serene Republick of Venice, the

ther of the Ceremonies, with 6 Gentlemen of his Majesty's Privy Chamber, brought him from his House to St. James's in his Majetty's Coach, follewed by the Ambassador's Coaches in the same Order as was observed at his Entry. His Excelleney was received at the Palace Gate by the Deputy-Knight Marshal. His Majesty's Foot Guards were drawn up in the Court, and the Officers faluted his Excellency with Pike and Colours, and afterwards with their Hats as he passed by, the Drums beating a March. was received at the Door of the Guard Chamber by Mr. Charlton, Lieutenant in the Absence of the Earl of Uxbridge, Captain of the Yeomen of the Guard, and conducted by him to the End of his Command. He was received at the Door. of the Room of Audience by the Duke of St. Albans, Captain of the Band of Gentlemen Pensioners, who were ranged on each Side of the Room; and conducted by the Right Honourable Thomas Cooke, Esq; Vice Chamberlain in the Absence of his Grace the Duke of Bolton, Lord Chamberlain of his Majesty's Houshold.

Afterwards his Excellency was conducted by the Maser of the Ceremonies to an Audience of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales: He was received at the Door of his Guard Chamber by the Earl of Hertford, Gentleman of the Bed Chamber to his Royal Highness in waiting: At the Door of the Roum of Audience, his Royal Highness's Presence Chamber, he was met and. conducted by the Duke of Argyl, Groom of the

Stole to his Royal Highness.

From thence his Excellency went to her Royal Highness the Princess's Apartment; at the Door of the Guard Chamber he was met by Mr. Pulteney, Vice Chamberlain to her Royal Highness; and, entring into the Room of Audience, by the Earl of Bridgewater her Lord Chamberlain.

Before he returned home his Excellency paid his Compliment to the young Princesses in their Aparement; and then was reconducted to his House by the Earl of Rochford and the Master of the Ceremonies, with the same Attendance as

abovementioned.
