Whereas by an Act past this present Session of Parliament it is enacted, That from and after the 1st of October next no Person, being a Peer of this Realm, shall be capable of Acting or Serving as Lieutenant or Deputy Lieutenant in that part of Great Britain called Scotland, unless he or they shall first before six Lords of His Majesty's Privy-Council for the time being, or such other Persons as shall be Authorized by his Majesty by Order in Council, to Administer the same, take and subscribe the Oaths of Allegiance and Abjuration, and subscribe the Assurance appointed by Law for Persons having Offices or Places of Trust. His Majesty this Day in Council is pleased to Authorize and Impower the Courts of Justiciary, Session and Exchequer, and all and every Sheriff or his Deputy in the respective Shires or Stewarties in Scotland, to Administer the said Oaths and Declaration to any Peer in pursuance of the foresaid Act.

Ratisbon, September 5. On the 2d Instant the Archbishop of Mecklin arrived here, and on the 4th proceeded on his Journey to Vienna. The taking of Napoli di Romania by the Turks is confirmed, with the following Particulars. An Armenian having discovered to the Turks a proper Place to lay a Mine under the Fortrefs of Mount Palamida, they sprung it with so much Success that a good part of the Wall was blown up, and the Garrison in great Consternation endeavouring to retire into the City was attacke b the a-



nifaries under the Gate, who entred with them and put moit to the Sword, making the Women and Children Slaves. All the Priests and Monks both of the Greek and Latin Church were cut to Pieces. The Proveditore-General surrendered himself to the Seraskier, and was sent to the Grand Visier: But the Captain-General retired to a Fortrefs on the Sea-side, and what became of him afterwards is not yet known. 'Tis said the Turks having rested themselves 12 Days, were gone to attack Napoli di Malvasia. All the Letters from Vienna, confirm the News of the Empress's being with Child; and add, that on the 28th being her Birthday Count Konigseck was declared Ambassador to the French Court, and Count Fuchs Plenipotentiary at Hambourg to the Circles of Westphalia and Lower Saxony; and that on the 30th Count Staremberg, formerly Councillor of the Administration of Bavaria, was declared the Emperor's chief Austrian Commissary at Ratisbon.

From a Board his Majesty's Ship the Cumberland off of Danzig, August 22. The 14th Instant the Merchant Ships from Petersburg under the Convoy of the Men of War, which waited for them at the Island of Hoghland, came and join'd us at Nargan near Revel; they were brought in with a Storm of Wind at E. N. E. and at two the same Morning a Dutch Man of War of 200 Men and 44 Guns called l' Huys le Warmelo, which was one of the Convoy, and commanded by Captain Groot, unfortunately struck on an unknown Rock. Seventy five of the Men saved themselves on Board some of the Merchant-Ships in the Warmelo's Boats, but we fear that the Commander with the rest of his Crew were all lost with the Ship. The 16th the Weather being grown more calm and moderate we sailed from Nargan with our Men of War and the Trade we had got together. We left the Muscovite Fleet still at Anchor before Revel, and it was reported there that those Ships were to be laid up for this Year as soon as the Weather would permit them to return to their Port. The 20th we arrived off of this Road, having had a very stormy Passage: We found here the Trade from Riga with their Convoy, who came four Days before us. In our Way hither we detached two Dutch Men of War and a Sloop to meet and join those Ships from Riga, we hope they will return to us very soon, and then with the first Opportunity of a fair Wind we shall set sail with the whole Fleet from hence.

Hague, September 13. Three Troops of the Regiment of Horse Guards, making together 100 Men were sent on the 9th Instant to North Holland to assist the Collectors in levying the Excises; the Magistrates in the Towns of that Quarter having required that Assistance, in Consequence of the Provisional Treaty. Sir Richard Vernon his Britannick Majesty's Envoy to the King of Poland arrived here on the 11th. Two Conferences about the Treaty of Barrier have been held this Week at Antwerp.
