*Whitehall, September 23.* The Letters from Edinburgh give an Account, that the Earl of Marr and the other Persons who were at the Meeting at Aboyn, are still drawing together their Forces; and that on the 16th Instant a Party of them entered Perth, Mr. Hay Son to the Earl of Kinnoull being at the Head of them, and there proclaimed the Pretender, as the Rebels have also had the Insolence to do in two or three other Places. The Earl of Marr since his setting up the Pretender's Standard, and proclaiming him King of Scotland, continues to stile himself Lieutenant-General of his Forces and to sign his Orders as such. The said Earl of Mar has published the following Declaration, and sent it together with a Letter to the Baillie of Kildrumnie.

OUR Rightful and Natural King James the 8th by the Grace of God, who is now coming to relieve us from our Oppressions, having been pleased to intrust us with the direction of his Affairs, and the Command of his Forces in this his ancient Kingdom of Scotland. And some of his faithful Subjects and Servants not at Aboyn viz. The Lord Huntly, the Lord Tullibardine, the Earl Marischall, the Earl of Southesk, Glingary from the Clans, Glenderule from the Earl of Broadalbaine, and Gentlemen of Argyleshire, Mr. Patrick Lyon of Auchterhouse, the Laird of Auldbair, Lieutenant-General George Hamilton, Major-General Gordon and my self, having taken into our Consideration his Majesty's last and late Orders to us, find that as this is now the time that he ordered us to appear openly in Arms for him, so it seems to us absolutely necessary for his Majesty's Service, and the relieving of our native Country from all its hardships, that all his faithful and loving Subjects and Lovers of their Country, should with all possible speed put themselves into Arms.

These are therefore in his Majesty's Name and Authority, and by virtue of the power aforesaid, and by the Kings special Order to me there'unt, to require and empower you forthwith to raise your fencible Men, with their best Arms, and you are immediately to March them to joyn me and I me other of the Kings Forces at the Invor of Bracmar, on Monday next, in order to proceed in our March to attend the Kings Standard, with his other Forces.

The King intending that his Forces shall be paid from the time of their setting out, he expects as he positively orders, that they behave themselves Civilly, and commit no Plundering nor other Disorders upon the highest penalties and his Displeasure which is expected you'll see observed.

Now is the time for all good Men to show their Zeal for his Majesty's Service, whose Cause is so deeply concerned, and the relieving of our native Country from Oppression and a foreign Yoke too heavy for us and our Posterity to bear, and to endeavour the restoring not only of our rightful and native King, but also our Country to its ancient

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
