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Dublin, December 27.

Esteplay happened here a very unfortunate accident, most of the Nobility and Gentry being at a Play, at the publick Play-house, the upper Galeries on a sudden fell all down, beating down the Second, which, together with all the people that were in them, fell into the Pit and lower Boxes. His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant with his Lady, happened to be there, but thanks be to God escaped the danger without any harm; part of the Box where they were, remaining firm, and so resisting the fall of what was above; onely his two Sons were found quite buried under the Timber; the younger had received but little hurty but the eldest was taken up dead to all appearance, but having presently been let blood, and other remedies being timely applyed to him, he is at prefent past all danger. There were many dangerously burt, and Seven or Eight killed outright. Here is lately dead the Bishop of Dromore, and its thought that Doctor Essex Digby may succeed him in that

Lishonne, Dec. 16. The Prince Regent Don Pedro is at Villa Franca, a small Town, distant Six Leagues from this place, with the Queen, who in her way to Salvaterra fell sick there, and as it is said, miscarried, after having been Two months with Child; she is at present well recovered again, and expected here so soon as the Palace is resitted to receive her.

Vienna, Dec. 17. The report we had here of the taking of the Fortress of Kaswar, hath been contradicted upon the arrival of an Express dispatched hither by the General Major Heyster, who says, That the place defends it self still, and that the Count de Tekeley, so whom it belongs was dead fuddenly. He farther adds, that before the decease of the said Count, the inhabitants of the Two neighbouring Counties came to his assistance, and in a skirmish had killed several Germans, so that the success of that enterprise remains still doubtful. We receive daily advice of the great preparations the Turks are every where making, so that we have just ground to apprehend a war the next Spring with them, his Imperial Majefty has hereupon given order for the making of new Levies in feveral parts of the Empire, and is fending Commissioners to visit his Magazines, to the end, stores of all kinds may be provided. The 12th instant Prince Charles de Lorrdin returned hither from Mayence, and has fince been with the Emperor to give him an account of what passed between him and his Unclear their conferences there.

Venice, Decemb. 27. A Veffel arriving here two days ago from Constantinople, brings advice, that Monsieur Nointel, Ambassador from His most Christian Majesty was arrived there, and had made his publick Entry with a great deal of pomp and magnificence; and that the Grand Seignior under pretence of Hunting approaches every day nearer to Constantinople, and some suspects with a design of coming unexpectedly by some stratagem of the Visitas into that City, and so on a sudden to crush the

faction of the Sultanes, who in the mean time omits not any thing for the strengthning her, arty, which is of late grown very confiderable. The Proveditor General Bernardo continues very follicitous to be recalled home, to which the Senate seem not very forward, but in a very kinde and gracious Letter have desired him to femain there for some short time longer, in order to the surther effecting some designs now on foot.

Letters from Dalmatia tell us, That the Bassa of Bossina was faln very ill of an Apoplexy, which had put some stop to their proceedings, for regulating the limits; but withal, that so soon as the said Bassa was in any degree recovered, that affair would be concluded, as was hoped, to the satisfaction of both parties. They surther add, That the General Barbaro was resolved to have driven the Turks by force out of Deuitz and d'Obbruaz, but had received peremptory Orders from the Senate, to forbear all kinde of hostility.

Yesterday being the Feast of S. Stephen, the Duke according to custom entertained at dinner the Four-score Senators, and all the Ministers from Foreign Princes

Marfeilles, Dec. 30. We have late advice from Spain, that Sir Edward Spring was gone towards Argiers and that they were daily expecting to hear what success he had met with. That those Corfairs begin to cool, and to defire a peace with the English, but that it was thought they would suddenly fall out with the French, they having already plundered some Barques of theirs, coming from Spain, of several Bags of Plate and other rich Commodities.

Paris, Jan. 10. The King hath by an Order of
Council thought fit to forbid all His Subjects, under
great Penalties, to sell any Salt, Wine, or BrandyWine, to any of the Subjects of the States General of
the United Provinces.

The Archbishop of Sens, who for some time hath lain dangerously ill, is at present somewhat better, but he of Narbonne, is past all hopes of recovery. The fixth instant died here, Facques Charles Amelos, First President of the Court of Aydes, in the Thirty seventh year of his age, much lamented for his great Parts and Abilities, which he had given long testimony of in the discharge of that place.

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The King hath been pleased of late to make several promotions of Bishops, having nominated the Sieur de Resmadec, Bishop of Vannes, to the Archbishoptick of Tours; and the Sieur de Vautorte; Bishop of Leysoure to succeed him in that See. The Sieur de Bar, Bishop D'Acqs, to the Brishoptick of Leytoure; the Sieur de Guron, Bishop of Tulles to that of Cominges; the Sieur Seguier; Bishop of Lambez, to that of Nismes; the Abbot Biscarra, Bishop of Lodéve, to the Bishoptick of Beziers; Dom Cosme, General of the Fueillans, to that of Lombez; the Father Mascarron, to the Bishoptick of Tulles; the Abbot de Chaumont to that of Acqs; the Abbot le Camus to that of Grenoble; the Abbot Amelot, to that of Lauaur; and the Abbot Gaillard to that of Gapt.

Monsieur Caillet, who hath been several times in Poland, employed in the affairs of the Prince de Goude, died here some days 200, and was buried

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by Order of his Highness with much pomp and magnificence. Out of Lorrain they write, that the Mareshal de Crequi was arrived at Barre to visit the winter Quarters there, having been likewise to visit those about Nancy, where he had been detained for some time, by reason of the waters that are of late much out, occasioned by the great Rains in those parts.

Madrid, Dec. 10. Here is a report that the French have made themselves Masters of Santo Domingo in the West Indies, but this seems hard to be believed, though tis certain that several French ships are gone that way on some unknown designe. His Catholick Majesty hath sent Orders to Cadiq and Biseay, for the sitting out Twenty sive men of way, to be ready against the next Spring. The Marquis de Gouvea, Ambassador from the Prince Regent of Partugal, had yesterday his sirst Andience of their Majesses.

In few days Monsieur Contarini, Ambassador from the Republick of Venice, will have his Audience, and is in the mean time making very splendad preparations. The Marquis Corsini, Envoye from the Great Duke of Tuscany, is gone hence, having been presented by Order of the King, to the value of 500 Pistols. The Count de Melgar is departed hence for Barcelonne, and so to Milan, to take possission of the Government of Mortara, which the King has been pleased to confer upon him.

Rome, Des. 16. The 9th inflant was kept here the Anniversary of Clement the X. in the Chappel of the Palace Quininal, where the Pope was pleased to be present, together with the Sacred Colledge. The next day was likewise performed a solemn Service in St Peters Church, where was present the whole Colledge of Cardinals. The 11th, the Ambassadors from the City of Bologna had Audience of the Pope, where they made their submissions to his Holiness in the name of the said City. The 12th happened here an unhappy accident, occasioned by a violent Lightning, which taking fire in a Barn filled with Hay, near Campo Vaccino, notwithstanding all the endeavors that were used to quench the same, burnt that and several other neighboring houses and Barns, the whole loss being valued at a hundred thousand Crowns.

Legorn Dcc. 5. Yesterday arrived here Sir John Harman, in His Majeslies ship the St David from Zante, having seen his Convoy of Merchant men bound to Venice and those parts, out of danger; in his way hither hedpake on the 12th past off Cape Spartivento. with a Tripoli man of war, who with great assurance, after he had made the ship to be English, came aboard him, informing him among other things, that there were Six other men of War of Tripoli then abroad.

Legorn Dec. 18. From Florence they write, that the Funeral of the late Great Duke had been there celebrated with extraordinary pomp and folemnity; and that the present Great Dutchess was with Child, to the great joy of his Highness and the whole Court.

Copenhagen, Des. 20. The Queen Mother intends in few days to return again to the Isle of Falfter, because of the great mortality here, which is so universal, that it is feared it carries somewhat of infection in it. The King hath given order for the setting out several men of war against the Spring, to which end he hath caused a Survey to be taken of what seamen are in this Town, and finding that there is not a sufficient number for the service of the Fleer, hath sent Orders to Norway to have the number compleated from thence.

Hambourgh, Dec. 21. Several ships have through the late storms and bad weather been lost near the River Elbe, in most of which, this Town was concerned, so that their Trade hath suffered very much thereby. From Hanouer they write, that there hath been an Assembly at Borgtorf of the Duke of Brunfwich Wolfembutel, the Bishop of Osnabrugh, and the other Princes of the House of Lunenburgh, about the pretensions of the Bishop of Munster upon the Town of Hoxster, where they resolved to assist the said Duke of Wolfembutel with all the forces they are able; yet after all it is hoped that the said Bishop may accept of the Mediation of the States General of the United Provinces, and this affair be brought to an amicable compositive.

Turin, Dec. 27. The 22 instant artived here the Abbot Servient from the Mountains of Brigue and Triore, where he had been on the part of his most Christian Majesty, to endeavor, together with the President de Gonterey, the Duke of Savey's Commissioner there, an accommodation between this Duke and the Republick of Genoua, which they have concluded to the content and fatisfaction of both parties; the 24th he had Audience from the Duke, who received him with great acknowledgements of his discreet management of this affair, and with all other marks of kindness and esteem; and to shew how how far he was sensible of the good Offices of the faid Abbot in this accommodation, hath presented him with a Cross richly set with Diamonds and Rubies of great value; it is thought that so soon as the faid Abbot hath the Dukes Ratification of this Treaty, which is to be fent to his most Christian Majesty, he will take his way for Rome.

Amsterdam, Jan. 9. By a ship larely arrived here from the West Indies, we have news from Antegoa of the 2d. of September, that there hath been lately in those parts a very violent Hurricane, which lasted but Four hours, but in that time did very great damage to that Island, and the ships that were in the Road, several Houses having been beaten down, and especially in the New Town called St Fohn's, most part of which is quite thrown down to the ground; the ships lost in that Harbor were the Robers of Ireland, William Cocks Master, another of the same place, called the Merchants Adventure, the Margaret Pinck coming from Tangier, a great ship called the Five Islands, and several other small vessels which came from the other Islands for shelter there; there was likewise driven on shoar a wrack, wherein was only found a dead boy, some quantity of Palm Oyle, and Elephants Teeth, which makes men judge it to have been a vessel coming from Guiny, they have also suffered very considerable damage at Meavis, several ships having been there loft, the Providence of Briftol, a ship of London, whereof one Blake was Master, and a New-England vessel which had brought Horses thither; besides these there has been lately cast away at Sancta Cruz, a Guiny vessel coming from Meavis, laden with Sugar, and several others have of late-been lost in those parts.

Deal, Jan. 7. A Flemish vessel of 80 Tuns, bound for St Sebastian, laden with Canvas, Cables, Powder, and Anchors, unfortunately run on shoar near Sandown Casse, but by the timely assistance of the Boats belonging to this Port, was got off again and brought into the Downs. Another Hambourgh vessel of One hundred Tuns, great part of her lading having been Powder, was in the same storm almost stranded, but by the help of several Deal Pilots, was brought off, yet so, as she is left unsit for any further service.
