St. James's, October 7. The following Addresses have been presented to His Majesty.

An humble Address of the Gentlemen of the Grand-Jury at the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace holden at the Castle of Winton for the County of Southampton; presented to his Majesty by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, in the Absence of his Grace the Duke of Bolton.

An humble Address of the Arch-bishop, Dean and Chapter of Canterbury; presented to his Majesty (in the Absence of his Grace the Archbishop) by the Reverend the Dean of Canterbury, introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Address of the High-Sheriff, Grand Jury, Justices of the Peace, Gentlemen and Clergy of the County of Glamorgan, assembled at the Grand Sessions held for the said County; presented to his Majesty by Mr. Wright and Serjeant Whitaker, his Majesty's Justices of the said Grand Sessions, introduced by the Right Honourable James Stanhope, Esq; one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, Gentlemen, and other principal Inhabitants of the Borough of Penryn in the County of Cornwall; presented to his Majesty by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, in the Absence of the Right Honourable Hugh Boscawen, Esq; Comptroller of his Majesty's Household.

Which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Ratisbon, October 3. On the 30th past the College of Princes took into Consideration the Request of the Dukes of Saxe-Weymar and Eysenach, concerning the Sums which they and their Countries have disbursed on extraordinary Occasions, and which they desired might be passed in Accompt as part of the Contributions which they were to pay to the Empire; and it was resolved, that these and all other Pretensions of the like Nature, should be produced and examined here by the Dyet, in order to be allowed. The Minister of Treves, whose Master is also Bishop of Spire, has distributed an Answer here, in the Name of the Bishop and Chapter, to the Complaints lately made by the Protestants of that Town against the Proceedings of the Roman Catholics.

Hambourg, October 8. Letters from the Confederate Army before Stralsund, dated the 6th Instant, advise, that on the 5th an Account was brought that the Transport Ships were provided with every thing that was necessary for imbarcking the Cavalry, and that those Transports would

soon be at Gripswald, in order to the Enterprize on Rugen. On the 6th 40 of the Prussian Cannon were expected in the Camp, and the rest in a Week or 10 Days. Letters from Stockholm of the 3d past relate, that Dispatches from Stralsund had brought repeated Orders from the King of Sweden to proceed to the coining of a Million of Copper Pieces, about the Bigness of an English Farthing, which are to be current in Sweden for Half a Rix Dollar: Yet as that King's Direct on do still need some Explanation, so that the Bank at Stockholm, to whom the Order touching this Affair is given, will be oblig'd to write to know his Majesty's further Pleasure in some Particulars, it will be some Time before they begin to coin those Pieces. These Letters add, that the Duties at all the Ports of the Kingdom, except Stockholm and Gottenburgh, are now farmed; and that the Farmers who are different at each Place, are by their Contracts left at Liberty to accept of what Duties of Importation and Exportation they think fit, provided they do not exceed what has hitherto been established.

Brussels, October 8. The ordinary Deputies of the States of the Province of Flanders, who brought hither the Act for the Subsidy to commence on the first of the next Month, went back on the 5th Instant, after having obtained from the Regency the Act of Acceptation of the same, and their Answers to the Conditions on which it was granted. Count Konigseck has sent to Vienna the Representation made by the Province of Flanders against giving up any Part of that Country to the States General by way of Extention of Limits: The said Count having received some Days ago an Express from Vienna with Dispatches relating to the Barrier-Treaty, sent them forward to Baron Heems at the Hague.

Westminster, October 6. This Day the Parliament met, and further adjourned until Thursday the 20th Instant.

Whitehall, October 7. His Majesty having been pleased to appoint George Dodington, Esq; Lord-Lieutenant of the County of Somerset: He this Day in Council took the Oaths appointed to be taken instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy.

St. James's, October 7. His Majesty has been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable Frederick Hamilton, Esq; to be Lieutenant General of his Forces.
