St. James's, October 24. The following Addresses have been presented to His Majesty.

An humble Address of the Lord-Lieutenant, Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, Clergy, Gentlemen and Freeholders of the County of Rutland; presented to his Majesty by the Right Honourable the Lord Finch.

An humble Address of the Mayor, Bailiffs, Aldermen, Recorder, Town-Clerk and Burgeses of the Corporation of Hedon in the County of York; presented to his Majesty by William Pulteney, Esq; his Majesty's Secretary at War, in the Absence of Hugh Cholmley, Esq; their other Representative in Parliament.

Which Addresses His Majesty was pleas'd to receive very graciously.

Hambourg, Oct. 25. On the 19th Instant the Trenches were opened before Stralsund with good Success; and Letters of the 23d from the Confederate Army tell us the Approaches were advanced very near to the Swedish Intrenchments. On the 21st the Troops designed for the Descent on Rugen, began to March to Eldena near Gripswalde, where Boats lay ready for their Imbankation.

Brussels, Oct. 21. Mr. Cadogan arrived at this Place last Night from the Hague, and immediately dispatched proper Persons to Bruges and Ostend, to provide Shipping for the Transportation of 6000 Men which the States-General have resolv'd to furnish for the Service of the King of Great Britain, pursuant to the Treaty of Guarantie for the Protestant Succession, and the Barrier of the United Provinces. Mr. Cadogan was this Morning in Conference with Count Koningseck, and they both design to go to Morrow to Antwerp, where the States Deputies are expected on the 23d, in order to renew the Conferences for settling the Treaty of Barrier.

Antwerp, Octob. 29. Mr. Cadogan and Count Koningseck came hither from Brussels on the 22d, and have since had several Conferences with the Deputies of the States General on the Affair of the Barrier. Yesterday M. Geldermalsen one of the States Deputies set out for the Hague; he is to return in 8 Days, and 'tis believ'd the Barrier-Treaty will be signed in a few Days after. The 6000 Men which the States General are to furnish for the Service of his Britannick Majesty, are expected in a very few Days at Ostend, where Shipping and all other Necessaries are prepared for their Imbankation.

Edinburgh, October 19: The Rebels having quitted the Citadel of Leith on Sunday Morning, marched to Seton-House, in such Disorder that some Horse being sent out after them took several Prisoners and picked up many Deserters. The same Day his Grace the Duke of Argyle receiving Advice that the Earl of Mar and the Rebels with him were marching from Perth, he returned on Monday to Sterling to observe their Motions; leaving 100 Dragoons and a like Number of Foot of those which had been detached from Sterling, under the Command of Major-General Wightman, to join with the Volunteers and Militia for the Security of this Place. The Rebels continued at Seton-House till this Morning, when they marched towards the South. Letters from Fife relate, that the Parties sent out by the Earl of Mar had committed great Disorders in that Shire; particularly that a Party went to Lestry the chief Seat of the Earl of Rothes, where after searching the House for Arms, they forced open the Church-doors, and finding no Arms there they brake into the Burial-Place of the Family of Rothes and digging up the Ground tore open the Coffins in the most barbarous manner. 'Tis reported that the Earl of Mar is advanced towards Dumblaine; but the River Forth not being passable, it is not doubted that if he march round by the Head of it the Duke of Argyle will give him a good Reception, for before that time his Grace will be reinforced by Evans's and Wightman's Regiments from Ireland, and by some Militia and Volunteers from about Glasgow.

Berwick, October 21. We have an Account from Wooler in the County of Northumberland, that the Rebels of that County,
