**T**HIS Day the Right Honourable James Earl of Derby, and Henry Earl of Lincoln, were, by his Majesty's Command, Sworn Lords of his Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council, and took their Places at the Board accordingly.

*St. James's, October 28.* The following Addresses have been presented to his Majesty.

An humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, Capital-Burgesses, Deputy-Recorder, Grand-Jury, Gentlemen, Merchants, and other principal Inhabitants of the Borough of Bideford in the County of Devon, at the General Sessions of the Peace held for the said Borough on the 20th of October 1715; presented to his Majesty by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, in the absence of the Right Honourable the Lord Carteret.

An humble Address of the Alderman, Recorder, Capital Burgesses, Town Clerk and Burgesses of the Common Council of the Borough of Bury St. Edmunds in the County of Suffolk; presented to his Majesty by the Right Honourable the Lord Harvey and Colonel Porter, introduced by the Right Honourable James Stanhope, Esq; one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

*Hague, Novemb. 5.* The States General passed a Resolution on the 1st Instant, for dispatching immediately to the several Admiralties, and to the Governors of Places on the Coasts and Frontiers, Orders for searching and stopping any Vessels having Arms or Ammunition on board that may be suspected to be designed for the Rebels in Great-Britain, and for securing all Persons suspected of corresponding with, and endeavouring to assist those Rebels. The 6000 Men which their High Mightinesses have ordered to be embarked for the Service of his Britannick Majesty, are drawing down to Ostend with all Expedition.

*Edinburgh, Octob. 22.* We have Advice from the North, that the Earl of Sutherland with the Lord Rea and Mr. Monroe of Foulis, having drawn together about 1800 Men, advanced on the 8th of this Month to Alneth, in order to attack the Earl of Seaforth who had assembled the Clans of the Mackenzies, Macleods and others. But upon a near View of the Rebels on the 9th, they appeared to be much superiour in Number; and therefore it was judged proper for the Earl of Sutherland to retire, which he did accordingly in good Order and without any Loss: He is now in his own Shire, augmenting his Forces, and preparing to come forward again, being assured of Assistance from the Graunts and Rosses of Culraick and o-

ther Parts, and from some of the Frasers. In the mean time these Motions of the Earl of Sutherland kept the Earl of Seaforth from joining the Earl of Mar, who has not yet made any Attempt, either to pass the Forth or march round by the Head of that River. The Duke of Argyle has been reinforced in his Camp at Stirling by part of Evans's Regiment, and his Grace having left here a sufficient Force for the Defence of this Place, is with the rest of his Troops observing the Motions of the Rebels under the Earl of Mar, and ready to lay hold on the first Occasion to engage them. The Rebels with the Earl of Seaforth, as well as those with the Earl of Mar, commit great Disorders and Barbarities in the Country about them, laying waste Gentlemens Estates, and plundering Houses: Even in demanding what they qualify with the Name of a Tax, they begin to shew the Benefits that attend a Popish and Arbitrary Government, having imposed 12 Months Cess (that is 6 Shillings in the Pound) universally, and 24 Months Cess (that is 12 Shillings in the Pound) on the Estates of such as do not join them, besides a Capitation of 100, 200 Pounds Sterling and upwards, which they will levy by Military Execution. The Prisoners taken from the Highlanders in their March from Leith to Seron-Houle, are put into our Castle; they are poor miserable Wretches. The Dragons and Foot which were left here by the Duke of Argyle when he went back to Stirling, are ordered away thither, Brigadier Grant's Regiment being come in to supply their Room.

*Newcastle, Oct. 25.* General Carpenter having received Intelligence that the Rebels were on the 23d at Kelso, he set out this Morning for Morpeth on his March towards them, with five Troops of the Royal Regiment of Dragoons, and Hotham's Regiment of Foot. Four Troops of Moleworth's Dragoons arrived here last Night, the other two will be here to Day; and to Morrow Colonel Moleworth with his whole Regiment, and Colonel Churchill with his, which will come in to Day likewise, will follow General Carpenter. By all Accounts the Highland Rebels who came over the Frith are in a very poor Condition; the greatest part of the Northumberland Rebels who joined those Highlanders at Duns are Papists, and many of them are Servants and Fellows of the meaner sort. The Highlanders put the Country under Contribution, have plundered and spoiled several Gentlemens Seats, and committed horrid Outrages; but they appear to be exceedingly dispirited, and their Number daily lessens by Desertion.

*Dartmouth, Oct. 25.* On Saturday last this Place was alarmed by a Rumour, that a French Man of War of 40 Guns, laden with Arms, lay off this Port. Hereupon a Justice of Peace, in the Absence of the Mayor, ordered a Number of Men to watch and be upon the Guard, which they continued to do till they had received Intelligence that the suspected Ship was gone off the Coast. Our Mayor coming to Town yesterday Morning, made a strict Inquiry into this Matter, and found the Report and the Town's Fears to be altogether groundless; and that the Vessel which was seen was a Smuggler, laden with Wine, Brandy and Cloth.
