Yesterday being the Birth-Day of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, the celebrating it was deferred till this Day, when there was a very numerous and splendid Appearance at Court of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction; and at Night there were Illuminations and other Publick Demonstrations of Joy.

The following Addresses have been presented to his Majesty.

An humble Address of the Mayor, the Mayor Elect, Aldermen, Sheriffs, Sheriffs Elect, Deputy-Lieutenants, Gentlemen, Council-house-men, principal Traders and Inhabitants of the City of Coventry; presented to his Majesty by Adolphus Oughton, Esq; one of their Representatives in Parliament, introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Sunderland, Lord Privy Seal, and Recorder of the said City.

An humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, free Burgesses, and other principal Inhabitants of the Borough of Helfone in the County of Cornwall; presented to his Majesty by the Right Honourable the Earl of Godolphin, Cofferer of his Majesty's Household, and Recorder of the said Borough.

An humble Address of the Mayor, Justices of the Peace, Aldermen, Grand-Jury, Freeholders and principal Inhabitants of the Town and County of Haverford-West; presented to his Majesty by Brigadier Ferrers, in the Absence of John Barlow, Esq; their Representative in Parliament, introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

Which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Hambourg, Nov. 1. Letters from the Confederate Army in Pomerania give an Account, that the Kings of Denmark and Prussia were gone to Grypswalde, to see the Troops designed for the Descent on the Island of Rugen imbarck, which 'tis reported they are to do this Day, above 700

Vessels being provided for that Service. The said Troops consist of 39 Squadrons and 24 Battalions. The Prince of Anhalt is to command them in chief; the Generals Dewitz and Wilken, the Lieutenant-Generals Count Danhoff and Baron Dorfling; the Major-Generals Juel, Boifler, Grumbkow, Prince of Wirtemberg, Hackborn, and Brigadier Sponeck are to command the first Line: The Lieutenant-Generals Schwertzel and Nulecau, the Major-Generals Bourgdorff, Prince of Hesse Philipsthal, Borck, Watenau, and Brigadier Budde, are to command the second Line. The Persian Ambassidor who was at the Court of France, is come hither from Copenhagen, designing to proceed by Sea to Petersbourg, and thence by Land to Ispahan. On the 24th past arrived here M. Bourk, an Irish Papist, who is going to the King of Sweden at Stralsund, in the Quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Spain. The Swedish Fleet, consisting of 18 Men of War of the Line and 2 Frigates, was out at Sea a few Days ago, but our last Advices tell us that Fleet has been obliged to return to Harro within 4 Leagues of Carlscrona: The Danish Fleet has its Station between Moen and Steffens, to observe the Swedes and hinder their approaching the Coasts of Pomerania and landing Troops there.

Edinburgh, Octob. 25. Letters from Inverary of the 22d Instant give an Account, that on the 20th a Detachment of the Rebels came in View of that Town, and continued there on the 22d. The Earl of Ilay, who is in that Place, has made such Preparations for its Defence, that the Rebels will meet with a very warm Reception if they should attack it, for which they had not made any Disposition when the Letters came away. By an Express come in this Morning from Sirling, we learn, that
