St. James's, November 4. The following Addresses have been presented to His Maje. y.

An humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder, Principal Burgesses, Assistants, Freemen, Freeholders, and other Inhabitants of the Corporation of Oakhampton in the County of Devon, having been sent up by Mr. John Ellacott, Mayor, and Edward Harris, Esq; one of their Representatives in Parliament, and Recorder of the said Corporation, was presented to his Majesty by the Right Honourable the Vice-Chamberlain of his Majesty's Household.

An humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder, Jurats, Minister, Chamberlain, Town Clerk and Freemen of the Corporation of Queenborough in Kent; presented to his Majesty by Colonel Thomas King and Philip Jennings, Esq; their Representatives in Parliament, introduced by the Right Honourable James Stanhope, Esq; one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Address of the High Sheriff, Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, Clergy, Gentlemen and Freeholders of the County of Anglesey; and also of the Mayor, Bailiff and Burgesses of the Borough of Newborough in the said County; presented to his Majesty by William Lewis of Llysduelas, Esq; who had the Honour to kiss his Majesty's Hand, being introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Address of the Bailiff, High Steward, Recorder, Justices of the Peace and major part of the Capital Burgesses of the Borough of Leominster in the County of Hereford; presented to His Majesty by George Caswall Esq; who had the Honour to kiss his Majesty's Hand, being introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend, one of His Majesty's principal Secretaries of State.

Which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Genoa, Octob. 22. Yesterday arrived here the Mary Ann William Salmon Mailler from Lisbon. She touched at Gibraltar, and left there Admiral Baker with the British Squadron under his Command. The Fox, a British Ship of War commanded by Captain Baker, will sail from hence the first

fair Wind for Port Mahon, and thence proceed to join the Squadron at Gibraltar.

Dresden, Nov. 2. Sir Richard Vernon, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Great Britain, arrived here on the 23d inst, and on the 28th had Audience of the King of Poland.

Paris, Nov. 9. The Regent having been acquainted by the Earl of Stair, Minister of the King of Great Britain, that the Pretender was come to a Place three Leagues on this side of Chateau Thierry in Champagne, gave Directions yesterday to the Duke de Guiche to dispatch M. de Contade Major of the Regiment of French Guards and Major General, with strict Orders to keep him from proceeding further, and to oblige him to go back into Lorraine. Accordingly M. de Contade set out at five this Morning, having besides his private Instructions a Warrant in the ordinary Form, commanding all Civil Magistrates and Officers of Justice to be aiding and assisting if required.

Nimwegen, Nov. 7. N.S. All the difficulties which have so long retarded the Conclusion of the Barrier Treaty, are now happily got over, and the several Instruments will be signed by the Plenipotentiaries as soon as they can be writ over fair, and compared together. The Transport Ships, Provisions and all other things necessary for the Embarkation of the Troops at Offend are intirely ready, and those Troops are making such diligence in their March from their several Quarters that they will be all arrived and ready to go on Board by the 12th Instant, N.S. and may sail with the first fair Wind that presents afterwards.

Edinburgh, Octob. 30. This Morning we had Advice, that the Rebels upon Notice of General Carpenter's being on the March towards them retired from Kello to Jedburgh; where receiving further Intelligence yesterday Morning that he was advancing with all Expedition, and would soon be up with them, they consulted what Course to take: The English Rebels being all of them Horse proposed to retire into Northumberland, but the Highlanders would not agree to it, and were so incensed that they drew out, and threatening to fire upon his Highness, compelled them to keep with them. Then they marched from Jedburgh towards Hawick, being so diligently followed by General Carpenter, that he was within eight or nine Miles of them last Night. The Rebels with the Earl of Mar continue at Perth: Those which appeared before Inverary are marched off to Strathern. The Duke of Argyll with his Majesty's Forces is still encamped at Sterling.

Carlisle, Oct. 31. On the 29th the Rebels marched from Jedburgh to Hawick, and on the 30th to Langham about 14 Miles from hence; they cannoned their Horse, but kept their Foot in that Town. Early this Morning Brigadier Stanwix with 60 of our Militia Horse went out from hence to Longton, and had thence a certain Account that the Rebels marched before Day from Langham, taking their way towards Dumfries; but whether they will proceed directly thither, or turn towards Moffat which is a mountainous Country, is yet uncertain. General Carpenter arrived at Jedburgh the 30th in the Morning; and will continue his Pursuit of the Rebels with all Diligence.

He was afterwards conducted by the Master of the Ceremonies to Audience of their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales, in their respective Apartments.
