B. NEW GENERAL LICENCE

LICENCE No. (A) TAY/GEN/94/881 (in England)
(B) WOAD/GEN/94/40 (in Wales)

Subject: Fresh/refrigerated poultry meat carcasses/part carcasses and/or offal derived from domestic hens, ducks, geese, guinea fowl and turkeys.

Country of origin: Austria, Finland, Norway and Sweden.

Conditions attaching to licence:

- Each consignment must be accompanied by:

EITHER

- A commercial document issued in accordance with the terms of Article 3 1A(i) of Council Directive 71/118/EEC as amended and updated by Council Directive 92/116/EEC.

OR

- In the case of consignments intended for a Member State or region of a Member State recognised as being free of Newcastle Disease or a Member State after transit through a third country, each consignment must be accompanied by a health certificate in accordance with Council Directive 91/494/EEC amended by Council Directive 92/116/EEC, signed by an official veterinarian of the country of origin stating;

(i) Details of the consignment i.e. species, nature of cuts, nature of packaging, number of cuts or packages, month(s) and year(s) when frozen, net weight;

(ii) Address(es) and veterinary approved number(s) of the slaughterhouse(s), cutting plant(s) and cold store(s);

(iii) Destination of meat (place of loading, country and place of destination, means of transport - for railway wagons or goods vehicles the registration number should be given, for aircraft the flight number and for boats the name) names and addresses of consignor and consignee.

(iv) Health Attestation.

I the undersigned official veterinarian, certify that the poultrymeat described above satisfies the requirements of Council Directive 91/494/EEC of 26th June 1991 on animal health conditions governing intra-Community trade in and imports from third countries of fresh poultrymeat and also the requirements of the second subparagraph of Article 3(A)(1) of that Directive, if such meat is destined for a Member State or region of a Member State that is recognised as being free of Newcastle Disease.

C. NEW GENERAL LICENCE

LICENCE No: (A) TAY/GEN/94/865 (in England).
(B) WOAD/GEN/94/41 (in Wales).

Subject: Minced meat or meat preparations derived from bovine animals, swine, sheep and goats.

Country of origin: Austria, Finland and Norway.

Conditions attaching to licence:

A. Each consignment must be accompanied by a certificate in accordance with the terms of Council Directive 88/657 on the trade in minced meat and meat preparations signed by an official veterinarian of the Government of the exporting country stating:

- (a) Details of the consignment;
- (b) Address(es) and veterinary approval number(s) of the slaughterhouse(s)/cutting plant(s)/cold store(s);
- (c) Destination of meat including means of transport;

2. Health Attestation

"I, the undersigned official veterinarian, hereby certify that:

- the meat described above was obtained under the conditions governing production and control laid down in Directive 64/433/EEC on health problems affecting intra-Community trade in fresh meat and that it is, therefore, considered to be fit for human consumption;
- the minced meat or meat preparations described above was/were obtained under the conditions of production and inspection laid down in Directive 88/657/EEC laying down the requirements for the production of, and trade in, minced meat and meat preparations and amending Directives 64/433/EEC, 71/118/EEC and 72/462/EEC."

B. The certificate required above must be the original certificate except in the case of products entering Great Britain via another Member State which, in accordance with Council Directive 90/675/EEC (?) may be accompanied by a copy of the original certificate authenticated by and provided by the official veterinarian at the border inspection post of entry to the Community, together with a document signed by the official veterinarian at the border inspection post of entry to the Community confirming that veterinary checks have been carried out to his or her satisfaction. However, in the case of products transported by air or sea which have been transhipped in a port or airport in another Member State and which, in accordance with Article 8.4 of Council Directive 90/675/EEC, have not been subject to veterinary checks in that Member State the certificate must be the original certification.
