Which Address his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Dublin, Now. 19. On the 15th the House of Commons of this Kingdom ordered Heads to be brought in of a Bill to attaint James Butler, late Duke of Ormond, of High-Treason, and to vest his Estate in the Crown; and a Clause to be inserted in it, for giving a Reward to any Person who shall apprehend the same James Butler, in case he attempts to land in any Part of this Kingdom. The House likewise ordered Heads to be brought in of a Bill for the further Security of His Majesty's Person and Government, and for extinguishing the Hopes of the pretended Prince of Wales, and his open and secret Abettors. And also Resolved, Nemine Contradicente, That whoever advis'd the late Queen to prorogue the late Parliament in this Kingdom, at a Time when a Bill to attaint the Pretender was under the Consideration of the House of Commons, was an Enemy to the Succession as by Law Establish'd in the Illustrious House of Hanover, to the Protestant Interest of this Kingdom, and a Favourer of the Pretender and Popery. On the 16th the House read thrice, and passed, Nemine Contradicente, a Bill sent down to them from the Lords, intitled, An Ast for Recognizing His Majesty's Title to the Throne of Great Britain, France and Ireland.
